

## ard Copper Deposits Noticed Explorers

There is much interest in copper mining in Foard County at the present time, it is noted that these deposits were noticed by Spaniards, and according to the "West Texas Geological Association Year Book" 1954, some of the nuggets used by the Indians.

According to the information in publication, Captain Randolph Pease was stationed at Camp Upton in 1850. In the Wichita Mountains he found copper deposits and later he traced them to this area as far south as Stonewall County. He believed that the railroad would one day be extended through this area, he concentrated his efforts in this area and employed George B. McClellan to explore the copper possibilities. Mr. McClellan and Mary's daughter, according to the "West Texas Historical Association Year Book," before any plans were carried out, McClellan joined the Union of the War Between the States where he attained the rank of general.

Some of the copper was used for percussion caps for Confederate cartridges.

An article from "West Texas" April, 1932, gives an account of McClellan's expedition more in detail.

McClellan organized his expedition in Philadelphia, but a personal investigation of copper ore and the probable location of the deposit.

In 1877 that everything was ready to begin the expedition and the veteran army of some 200 men, accompanied by a large number of mules, they had a large ship of equipment, including many for an ore crushing mill, expedition was outfitted for a 90 mile trek. Led by former commander, Captain L. P. Pease, it was one of the most extensive expeditions ever seen in the history of the state. It consisted of 200 or more men, many of whom were experienced miners. Bringing up the rear many wagons loaded with supplies.

Eastern potatoes ever traveled more luxuriously than the ones that McClellan had on that expedition. One of the wagons carried a large metal bathtub for personal use, but along the way there was such water shortage that the General took a bath. McClellan slept in his private tent which was carried and finely furnished. He had servants to do his personal work. Another wagon was loaded with champagne and various kinds of wines and liquors.

A copper mine was located and that is now owned by M. L. Speer and Paul Bax Ecken. According to the information there were more than a dozen frame buildings at the scene. A futile attempt for water resulted in a well being drilled and after proving to be a failure, a dam was erected on Canal Creek. Although the expedition had to be abandoned because of the many difficulties that it encountered in getting the mill and transporting metal to the smelter, General McClellan never lost his faith and belief in the success of the industry when conditions were more favorable. He listed the obstacles as the lack of water, and railroad communications.

In 1900 there have been efforts from time to time to re-open the mine and it is hoped that one day in the future that McClellan's prophecy of a century may become a reality.

## Local Post Office Personnel "Organize" for Negotiation

The Crowell post office has taken official action to implement the Post Office Department's new program for negotiation and consultation on grievances, working conditions, personnel practices and other related matters. Postmaster Alva Spencer reported this week.

The move—developed by the Postal Service under President Kennedy's historic Executive Order 10988 of Jan. 17, 1962—officially recognizes federal employee organizations for the first time. Recognition is based on results of the largest nationwide labor management election, held June 15-July 1, 1962 in which 451,000 postal employees participated. Official results were issued to each post office by the Post Office Department in Washington.

Here are the results at the local post office: United Federation of Postal Clerks and National Rural Carriers Association received exclusive recognition.

"Exclusive" recognition was acquired by employee organizations having a clear majority of the vote in a particular craft unit under prescribed voting procedures.

The postmaster will negotiate with these organizations, holding regular meetings and working out written agreements on matters affecting all employees in the craft unit represented regardless of employees' membership status.

National agreements give local employee organizations the right to deal with the postmaster on local working conditions, personnel practices and in resolving interpretations under the local agreements.

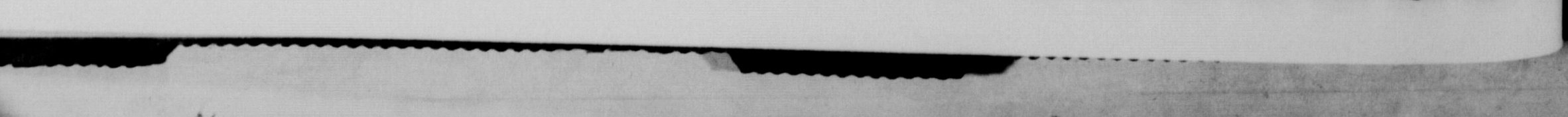

### Registered Nurses Have Meeting

A program on recent developments in obstetrical care of mother and baby was presented by Mrs. Shirley Covington and Mrs. Frances Ross to the sub-district No. 11, Texas Graduate Nurses Association, at the Community Center in Crowell on Tuesday evening.

Mrs. Covington, public health nurse from Wichita Falls, discussed improvements in maternal care which have reduced the maternal death rate from 67.3 per cent in 1930 to 2.8 per cent in 1957. Many factors have contributed to this progress, the two most important being better prenatal care of mothers and an increase in the number of babies delivered in hospitals. In 1935, only 37 per cent of the mothers entered hospitals for delivery; but in 1957, 84 per cent were attended by physicians in the hospitals.

The greatest problem which is now presenting itself for solution by the medical profession is the rapid increase in population (3.5 million per year) while there is little or no increase in the number of doctors who enter general practice or obstetrics. Much discussion has been held in medical centers throughout the U. S. regarding schools of midwifery; but thus far, only two of these schools have been established in the U. S. although they are very common and successful in some countries of the world.

Mrs. Ross, in-service director at Wichita General Hospital, discussed advances in the nursing care of obstetrical patients. She stressed the importance of the professional nurse in her role of teacher of other nurses and lay personnel assigned to the obstetrical unit. She offered suggestions on setting up in-service training for personnel coming into the obstetrical unit in any hospital.

Mrs. Mildred Riall, chairman of the sub-district, conducted a short business meeting following the educational program. Mrs. Charlene Inman, president of District 11 in Wichita Falls, was present to aid in planning future programs. Plans were made for the next program on care of the cardiac patient to be held in Quannah on May 7.

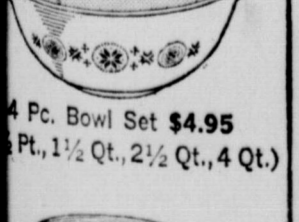

## More on Upcoming Wheat Referendum

by Jean L. Reeder, Foard County ASC Office Manager

Any thinking farmer will agree that we cannot continue to operate a program based on the old 1938 minimum acreage allotment of 55 million acres.

The ever-increasing per-acre yields have utterly destroyed the theory of that figure, and continuing to use it as a basis for a modern grain program would re-

sult in accelerated chaos. Farmers would literally become buried under their own surpluses.

Accepting that, Secretary Freeman and the Congress, in the proposed 1964 program, want to adjust the allotment to a more realistic ratio of yield to acreage.

Let's see what has happened over the years in respect to yields.

Foard County farmers, for example, produced an average per acre yield of 15.4 bushels of wheat for the period 1952 thru 1961.

Yet in the five year period from 1958 thru 1962 they made an average of about 19.1 bushels.

It was the same nationally. Average per acre yields in the period 1934 through 1938 was only 12.4 bushels. This formed the basis for the 1938 agricultural adjustment act under which we're still operating.

Yet, per-acre yields progressively increased, thanks to the development of new fertilizers, insecticides etc. In 1948-1952, they jumped to 16.7 bushels. In 1953 the average was 17.3. In 1958, it was 27.5 bushels.

Whatever the reasons, this is the chief fallacy in the farm program as set up now, and the fallacy the secretary and the congress aim to eliminate in the 1964 program.

And how do they hope to eliminate it?

Well, first, neither the government nor the farmers have any quarrel with increased per acre yields. Higher yields are good; to be encouraged, rather than discouraged.

But something must be done to correct the glaring error in the program brought about by the increased yields. This new program seeks to do by setting the allotment at between 49 to 50 million acres.

Farmers' gross income from wheat from the adjusted acreage will not decline, while surplus stocks will be reduced.

The reduction in acreage will have other good effects. It will help bring the surplus to the desired 600 million to 700 million bushel carryover, thus eliminating the depressing factor in the mar-

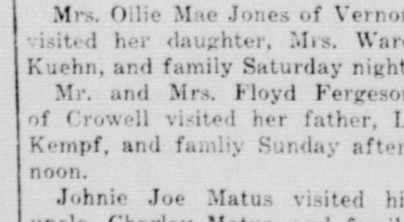
