FOARD 4-H BOY NAMED STATE AWARD WINNER

Arlos Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover Moore of the River community in Foard County, has been named State winner in Danforth 4-H Awards Program, according to an announcement made Wednesday by Joe Moore, county agent.

The state award is an all-expense educational trip to the American Youth Foundation Training Camp to be held August 15 through 28 at Aniwana on the beautiful shores of Lake Michigan.

United Gas is the donor for the Junior Leadership Training Camp in Texas, and the trip to the 1960 Youth Foundation Training Camp is a responsibility for paying the registration and attendance cost.

of the camp which is \$110.00. In addition to this, United Gas will give Arlos another \$150.00 to use for transportation or any other expenses which he might have.

This is a fitting climax for 8 years of outstanding leadership in 4-H work for young Moore.

The award is given to the most outstanding four-square 4-H boy in the state each year, based on his leadership in 4-H Club work, character, scholastic standing, and athletic activities.

Arlos has won many outstanding honors during his years in 4-H Club work. In 1958 he won an all-expense-paid trip to the Texas Junior Leadership Lab at Bastrop. He was the winner of the State Fair Award of Honor in 1959.

He has won the following medals for outstanding leadership in 4-H Club work: garden, soil and water conservation, entomology, poultry, achievement, field crops, boys' agricultural, citizenship, leadership, and Gold Star.

In addition to the above, he has been a delegate to the county and district 4-H Council for the past two years.

Foard Savings Bonds Sales in March Are \$7,029

March E and H Savings Bonds sales in Foard County totaled \$7,029, according to George Self, chairman of the county savings bonds committee.

Sales for the first three months of 1960 were \$39,203 which represents 35.6 per cent of the county's 1960 goal. First quarter sales in Texas were \$45,480,326 or 27.5 per cent of its 1960 goal of \$165,500,000.

Foard County Trapper Weighs Coyotes for Test

Government trapper Dick Blackburn of Foard County has completed his assignment in a project designed to determine whether North Texas coyotes are larger than South Texas coyotes.

Just how this knowledge is calculated to contribute toward the betterment of agricultural economy has not been officially announced.

At any rate, Mr. Blackburn's assignment was to weigh the next 190 coyotes he captured. The weigh began Dec. 10 and was completed prior to March 15.

During this period he bagged 46 females, averaging 29 pounds in weight, and 55 males that averaged weighing 33 pounds. Unfortunately no comparative report from South Texas is immediately available.

Nevertheless, Mr. Blackburn can show that he removed a total of 3,125 pounds of trouble for ranchers in Foard County during this period.

His work is supervised by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife and financed by that agency, Texas A&M College and Foard County, through Texas Predatory Animal Control Association.

Team Wins Tenth In International Judging Contest

The Foard County 4-H Land Judging team won 10th place in the International Land Judging Contest held in Oklahoma City last week. There was a total of 675 contestants representing 27 states and 19 foreign countries.

Bob Borchardt was high point man on the Foard County team and seventeenth place individual in the contest. Others on the team were Don Welch, Bennie Hopkins and Jerry Setliff. The Foard County team scored a total of 532 points out of a possible 600. The winning team scored 573 points which was only 41 points more than the Foard County team.

The team was sponsored by the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District who paid their expenses.

Joe Burkett, county agent, said that he would like to express his thanks to the LPRSD, the SCS personnel, and Marvin Myers, vocational agriculture instructor, for all the help they gave.

Voters are urgently requested to bring their poll tax receipts when they come to cast their ballot. The receipt will be stamped by the election judge showing that the person voted in the Democratic primary, and it is necessary that anyone attending a precinct convention must have voted in the primary.

County Democratic Chairman Ray Shirley stated that the election board will be located on the north steps of the court house, and tabulations will be posted as soon after the polls close as possible. He also added that the election officials can pick up their ballot boxes and all other election supplies at the county clerk's office at a meeting scheduled for 7:30 p. m. Friday.

A sample ballot is being printed in this issue of the News. The only difference between the sample ballot and the official ballot is that where all precincts are listed on the sample, only those offices which apply to the individual precincts are printed on the official ballot.

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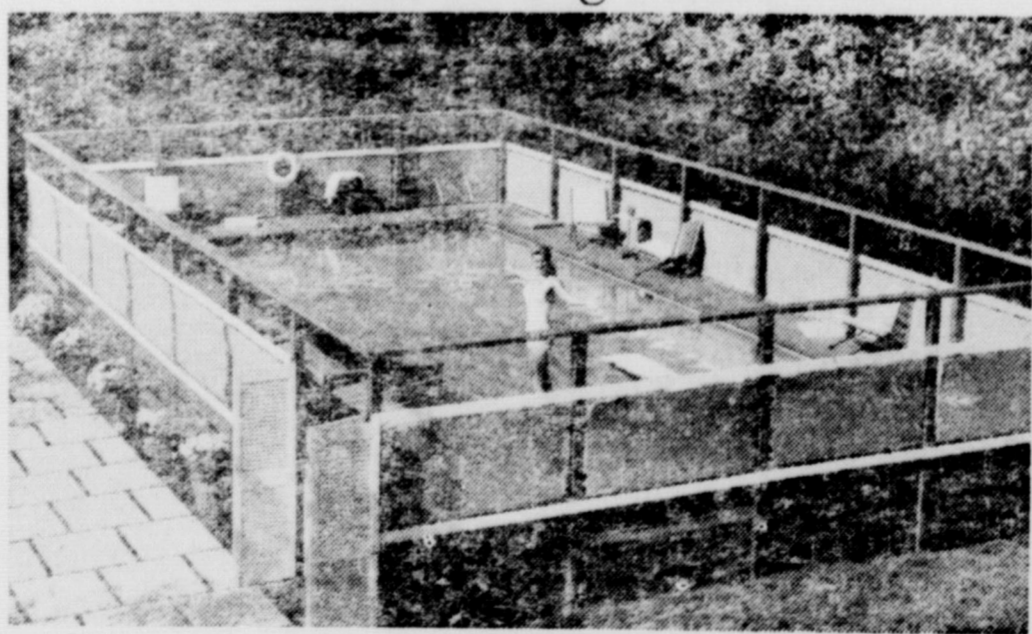
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On whom, then, can a man depend? The answer — on his friend (s).

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Austin, Tex. — A 30-member committee appointed by Gov. Price Daniel will meet May 16 to begin work on a tall task.

Assignment of the State Finance Advisory Committee will be to suggest every possible economy in state government and recommend a tax program to put the state on a sound financial basis.

For the immediate future, the tax program is to wipe out the general revenue fund deficit, which

the governor estimates will be \$40,000,000 at the end of this fiscal year, and provide \$35,000,000 for teacher pay raises.

Committee is to be made up of leading citizens in both public and private life. Six already have been named. They are Secretary of State Zollic Steakley who will be chairman; Jess Irwin, the governor's budget director; Jon Ford, administrative assistant to the governor; Dr. John R. Stockton, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research; John R. McKee of Dallas, Ford Motor Co. executive; and Hugo Lowenstein, Amarillo real estate man.

Gov. Daniel said he would ask the committee to search for revenue sources other than a general sales tax or state income tax.

He hopes, said the governor, that the committee will work out some recommendations soon so that a special session can be called

this year to pass teacher raises. Under Texas' requirement for pay-as-you-go financing, the legislature would have to pass taxes to wipe out the deficit before it could vote funds for the school improvement program.

TEACHER RAISE ENDORSED
—Nearly three-fourths of the candidates for the legislature this year have told the Texas State Teachers Association they favor a pay raise for teachers.

Some qualified their statements to indicate that getting the pay raise might be an easier-said-than-done proposition.

Of 401 candidates for the Senate and House, 336 answered TSTA's questionnaire, and 293 said they approved the Hale-Aikins school program.

Asked if they would vote the necessary taxes for it, 252 promised support outright. Others added conditions on the kinds of taxes they would approve.

LOAN PLAN DISAPPROVED
—Third Court of Civil Appeals has held the certificate plan used by some loan companies is unconstitutional.

Loan companies involved in the test case are expected to appeal to the State Supreme Court.

Under the certificate plan, the borrower of \$100 would agree to repay his loan through monthly payments on an investment certificate for \$110. This, according to the Attorney General's Department, forces the borrower to pay more than the permitted 10 per

cent interest because the interest does not drop as he pays off the principal.

Loan companies, which won the first round in district court, contend that the same procedure is used by banks, saving and loan associations and other lending institutions.

Attorney General's Department replied that there is no specific provision prohibiting other institutions from computing interest in this manner.

SCHOOL BUYING CRITICIZED
—Clothing purchases at the Texas Blind, Deaf and Orphan School for Colored in Austin were far in excess of use during the past 18 months, State Auditor C. H. Cavness reported.

Cavness said his audit turned up excessive clothing purchases totaling \$3,824. In all, he said, 3,042 articles of clothing were bought, but only 75 articles were issued to the children.

He said he had received no "reasonable explanation" for the discrepancy. Cavness suggested that the Texas Youth Council, which oversees state schools for needy and handicapped children, make an inventory and transfer surplus items to other schools.

CITIZENS INTEREST URGED
—Texas Law Enforcement Foundation has called on individual citizens to feel responsible for the way the law is observed in their communities.

Citing no specific instances, the

TFEF executive committee said that "a breakdown in citizen responsibility must precede any breakdown in law enforcement."

Three new members have been elected to the TLEF executive committee. They are Neill Masterson Jr. of Houston, Weldon Jones of San Angelo and Radeliffe Killam of Laredo. Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde is new secretary of the committee.

Plans are under way to expand the foundation's board to include representation from every part of the state and to set up a program to assist families of law enforcement officers killed on duty.

DON'T WORRY ABOUT IT
—State Supreme Court has again refused to get involved in a dispute as to whether a Dallas district judge can hold a railway president in contempt of court because trains blocked a Dallas street.

However, the high court repeated, with emphasis, its belief that the district court order is void and "no trial judge will attempt to enforce" it.

Dallas District Judge Jack Thornton sentenced MGT President W. N. Derramus to 240 days in jail and levied a \$4,000 fine because Katy trains blocked a street for more than five minutes at a time, against the judge's order. Since then, an underpass was begun.

Derramus, a St. Louis, Mo., resident, has sought to avoid coming

Calvert Is Only Candidate With Court Experience

One of the important races to be decided in Saturday's election will be for Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court.

Associate Justice Robert W. Calvert of Hill County is one of the two candidates for this position.

Judge Calvert has been on the Supreme Court since 1950, and is the only member of the court who is a candidate to succeed the present chief justice, who is retiring, and is the only candidate for chief justice with Supreme Court experience.

"Judge Calvert has served with great distinction as associate justice for almost ten years," Gaynor Kendall of Austin, state campaign manager, said. "He therefore knows from actual experience the additional administrative duties which he must assume as chief justice, and he has demonstrated by his service with the other judges his ability to furnish the leadership the court requires."

Be Careful, Snake Season Back Again

Beware of snakes. This is the report coming in from game wardens all over the state, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

With the advent of warm weather, the snake movement has begun throughout the state.

There are four kinds of poisonous snakes in Texas. They are the moccasin, copperhead, coral snake and the rattler. Naturally the moccasins are found around water; the copperheads like cool places around old rock piles, barns and stacks of old lumber; coral snakes also are found around old tree stumps, under vines and shrubs; the rattler likely will be found most any place. Many of them are killed crossing highways.

Because there are so many non-poisonous snakes, many persons may take a chance. For instance, near Rockport last week, a group of school children found a snake swimming along the beach. They stuffed it in a bag, believing it to be a harmless hognose. Later, however, it developed the snake was a massasauga rattler.

Many of the harmless snakes have value as nice catchers and should not be molested. In fact, the director warns, it is best to leave all snakes alone, except to kill off the poisonous ones.
