## Crowell Public Schools Opened Last Monday Morning with an Enrollment of 618; New Cafeteria in Operation

The Crowell Public Schools opened last Monday morning with an enrollment of 618. This is about the same number who enrolled on the first day last year. The enrollment by grades is as follows: 62 in the first grade; 55 in the second grade; 48 in the third grade; 62 in the fourth grade; 49 in the fifth grade; 58 in the sixth grade; 52 in the seventh grade; and 37 in the eighth grade. This makes a total of 423 in grade school, which is a few less than last year. The High School enrollment is 195 which is about fifteen more than last year. Most of this increase is in the senior class.

**School Board Meets**

The Crowell School Board met last Saturday night and decided to take up at eight o'clock each morning and turn out at one o'clock for a few days on account of the extreme heat. This abbreviated schedule will be discontinued some time next week.

**New Cafeteria Open**

Meals were served in the new cafeteria last Tuesday with 308 eating the first day. This new cafeteria is a modern brick building situated between the High School and Grade School buildings. It will take care of about 150 children at one time. The meals are 30c for pupils in the first four grades and 35c in the other two departments.

Eleven of these boys are lettermen from last year's squad, nine are squadmen, and the remaining ten are reporting for their first time.

Eight of these lettermen are regulars from last season's squad. The nine squadmen are Wayne Borchardt, Gerry Knox, Robert Kincaid, Robert Graves, Gordon Thompson, Jimmy Harper, Joe Don Thompson, Jimmy Everson and Don Smith. Borchardt and Everson have the best chance of breaking into the lineup of this group. The ten rookies are Gaylon Whitley, Ronny Fox, Chun Gafford, Jackie Walker, C. T. McDaniel, Rudy Hinkle, Robert Love, Dwayne Boren, Don Kidd and Billy Joe Naron. Walker is looking the best of this group.

Lee Roy Bice, letterman from last year and a good prospect for a starting berth on this year's team, is not able to play due to an injury received in spring training. He might be able to report by the middle of the season.

## Area Farm Bureau Leaders to Meet Here Saturday

County Farm Bureau leaders from this area will gather in Crowell on Saturday, September 6, for a sub-district meeting. This is one of 24 such sessions being conducted throughout the State by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, it has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, of Tye, president of the organization. In attendance will be Marvin Carter, Federation organization director, and O. R. Long, Field Representative, American Farm Bureau Federation.

Loys D. Barbour of Iowa Park, state director for this district, will preside. The all-day meeting will be held in the district court room here beginning at 10 a. m.

In announcing the sub-district meetings President Hammond emphasized the importance of county leaders meeting with state officers and staff members to discuss current issues and policies vital to farm and ranch people. Mr. Long will discuss the organization's program of work this year and the responsibilities of local leaders. Mr. Carter will present the enrollment plan which has been developed by the State organization and recommended to counties for use in their annual membership enrollment drive scheduled for the week of October 10-17.

The sub-district meetings have been planned to discuss four major things, Hammond said. (1) State and national issues pertaining to agriculture; (2) to have expression from local leaders; (3) how to raise money to finance state government; (4) plans for enrolling 75,000 members in 1952.

August was probably the hottest month on record for Foard County in many years. Most of the days during the month, the temperature topped the 100 degree mark, with several being over 110. Precipitation was negligible during the month, and was the exact opposite of August of 1950 when it rained nearly all month and the weather more resembled that of Colorado than of Texas.

Upon entering the store, customers realize the still coolness of the two 5-ton refrigerated cooling system, which prevails throughout the store. Overhead circulating heating units are located in the front and back to insure patrons of comfortable conditions in the cold seasons. The store is light green cement plus and the eighty-foot, 3-strip fluorescent lighting furnish the interior with a well lighted appearance. The ladies' apparel on the left and the men's wear on the right occupy the blond fixtures of Senora wood. Conveniently situated in the rear is the ladies' ready-to-wear and the shoe department. Red plastic chairs have been added to the shoe department to comfortably seat customers in that part of the store. Latest fall fashions and styles decorate the fall lodge trim in this store, quality merchandise.

Mr. Bird stated that his regular staff will include Mesdames Evelyn Campbell, LaVerne Russell and Ruby Wallace as sales ladies, all of whom are well grounded and experienced in the dry goods business.

The Bird Dry Goods Co., established by the late D. N. Bird in 1938 has been under the management of Mike D. Bird since his return from the armed services in 1946.

In charge of construction of this plant was A. L. Kelly, local contractor. The Southwestern Glass Co. of Wichita Falls installed the glass. Painting and electrical work was done by J. Hartrich and Paul Wallace, respectively, and tiling and roofing was provided by the Bonded Roofing Co. of Vernon. The West Texas Utilities Co. furnished and installed the air conditioning system.

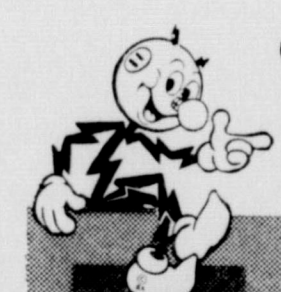

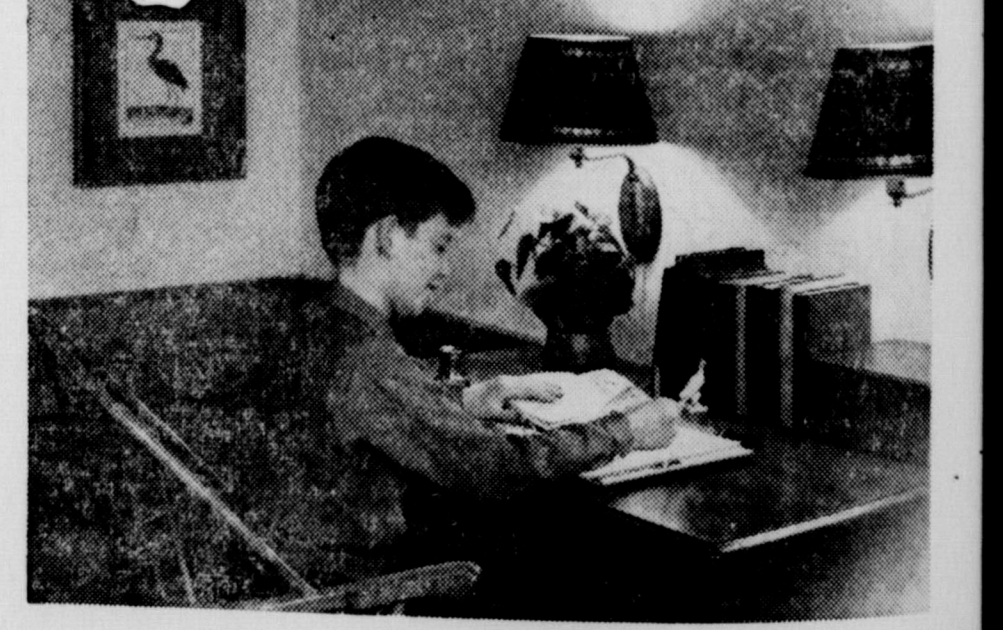

H. D. Agent Tells How to Save Shade Trees

Shade trees in Texas are in poor condition now as a result of two extremely cold winters out of the last four and two years of unprecedented drought, says Mrs. Mary D. Brown, Acting County Home Demonstration Agent.

To improve the condition of trees, they should be watered and fertilized. To accomplish this, build a circular dike of soil around the tree sufficient to hold water 4 inches deep in the basin thus enclosed. The diameter of the basin should equal that of the shade canopy of the tree. For very small trees or shrubs a diameter of 6 feet is suggested.

Spread a commercial fertilizer over the soil within the dike. The formula and rate of application will depend on the inherent fertility of the soil. As a starter, one pound of 5-10-5 or 8-8-8 per 100 square feet of soil surface is sug-
