Contract Awarded for Foard County Highway Repair

A contract for 11,668 miles of construction on State Highway 283 in Foard County has been awarded to a Plainview firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Bryan and Hoffman submitted the low bid of \$274,223 on the project. Reconstruction grading, structures, foundation course and two-course surface treatment constitute the work involved.

The job is expected to take 150 working days, according to Palmer Massey, District Highway Engineer at Childress. Howard W. Bartley, Resident Engineer at Quanah, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Qualified voters of Crowell will go to the polls next Tuesday, April 2, to elect a mayor and three aldermen to serve for the next two years.

Henry Black is seeking his second term as mayor, Recie Womack is seeking a second term as alderman; and J. T. Hughton and Robert Kincaid are candidates for the council also.

Mrs. C. C. McLaughlin will serve as presiding officer, and she will be assisted by two clerks.

Every qualified person who has attained the age of 21 and who has resided within the city limits for six months preceding the date of the election and is a qualified voter under state laws is entitled to vote.

The two aldermen who are not seeking re-election are Johnny May and A. B. Calvin. Hold-over members of the council are Guy Todd and Leon Speer.

Oh, Those Shots!

"Oh, my poor arm!" "Hey, watch the arm. It's sore!" "My Snick test turned red. Looks like I'll have to take all my shots." These are familiar words in the halls of CHS now. They became popular last Monday after the annual immunization shots were taken the Thursday before. A surprising number of the small pox vaccinations proved positive, and many students have swollen, sore arms—myself included.

Because our arms are sore and unsightly, we complain of course about them. Few of us stop to

consider that just a few years ago, masses of people had these multiple sores all over their bodies. The few who didn't die were disfigured for life. The single tiny sore that we suffer is unworthy to mention compared with their's.

Today we take immunization for granted. We complain about the shots and discomfort, but we know that these shots will protect us and our loved ones from pain and death. The dread diseases that half a century ago took the lives of millions are not feared today. There are many facts which brought this about—higher standard of living, improved sanitation, education—but the greatest cause is immunization shots.

Everyone—adults as well as students—should make it a point to be protected against communicable diseases, and each should have his immunization checked and, if needed, renewed periodically.

We would like to express appreciation to the Crowell doctors for making the immunization program possible, to Mrs. Kralieck who gave the shots, and to Karen Shirley, Dena Todd and Mike Manard who assisted in numerous ways.

YOUR FAIR SHARE...

Most Texans, we believe, are fair-minded folks. They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception.

People in 26 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected... all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510—so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure to each landowner his FAIR SHARE.

A tremendous boom in nursing home construction is underway in Texas during the first two months this year. The State Health Department has reviewed 54 sets of plans covering new construction, and during 1962, a total of 333 plans were reviewed. Currently, there are 709 nursing and custodial care homes licensed, providing a total of 22,644 beds.
