

## Former Crowell Resident Kills Escaped Panther

Thousand Oaks, Calif.—Song-writer Stuart Hamblen tracked an escaped panther to its hideout under a zoo building last Friday, crawled underneath and killed the ungle-bred beast in semidarkness. Hamblen is a former Crowell resident and son of Rev. J. H. Hamblen, former Methodist pastor here, who now lives in Abilene.

The 70-pound female cat, brought to Jungland Animal compound just three weeks ago from Thailand, had been the object of a big hunt for 36 hours. It was described as extremely dangerous. It was valued at \$2,000.

Hamblen, 54, onetime hillbilly musician and 1952 Prohibition party presidential candidate, volunteered in the search because "I was thinking, if he goes out and catches a child it would be a terrible shame."

He and a friend were checking an area of the compound previously searched when their dogs detected the cat under the building. The friend, Ronnie Page, carrying a flashlight and pistol, and Hamblen, carrying a 30-30 rifle, crawled under. In the back corner, they spotted a gleaming eye and heard a snarl.

"Page held the light on him and I killed it with my old lion huntin' rifle," Hamblen said, reverting to the animal as "he" though it wasn't. "When he backed his ears, I knew he was going to charge. I didn't want to kill him. I wanted him alive."

He said he wasn't scared because he has killed a lot of mountain lions. "What scared me," he said, "was that when I fired, a lot of other hunters came around ready to start shooting."

Hamblen, 6-foot-2, had only 10 inches clearance between the ground and the building's floor above. He said he had to lie on his side to shoot at a range of 30 feet. The first bullet hit the cat in the head and he fired three more for good measure.

When he crawled out, the zoo owners handed him a check for \$1,500 which he had posted as reward. Hamblen said he hadn't thought about the money when he hunted, and it was raised in just five minutes before he had his shot.

A panther similar to the one which escaped killed a keeper at this year at the San Diego zoo. Townspeople in Thousand Oaks had been told to keep their children off the streets until the animal was killed.

Other dogs had failed to trace the missing animal when Hamblen arrived from his Hollywood home with his trained hunting hounds. Most of the other hunters were hunting nearby hills.

"I circled the compound completely," Hamblen said, "and the dogs couldn't pick up the scent. I knew that if they couldn't pick up, the cat had to be inside somewhere."

His dogs led him to the building, which has no collar. There wasn't room to drag the dead animal out from under the building he way Hamblen and Page entered. The floor of the structure had to be cut open so the body could be lifted out.

Jungland trains animals for movies and television and sells them to zoos. The panther escaped by climbing out through a lead bin door which was found unlocked.

Hamblen for years was leader of a western band in Hollywood, acted in films, had a string of records and wrote songs. One of his best known is "This Old Town."

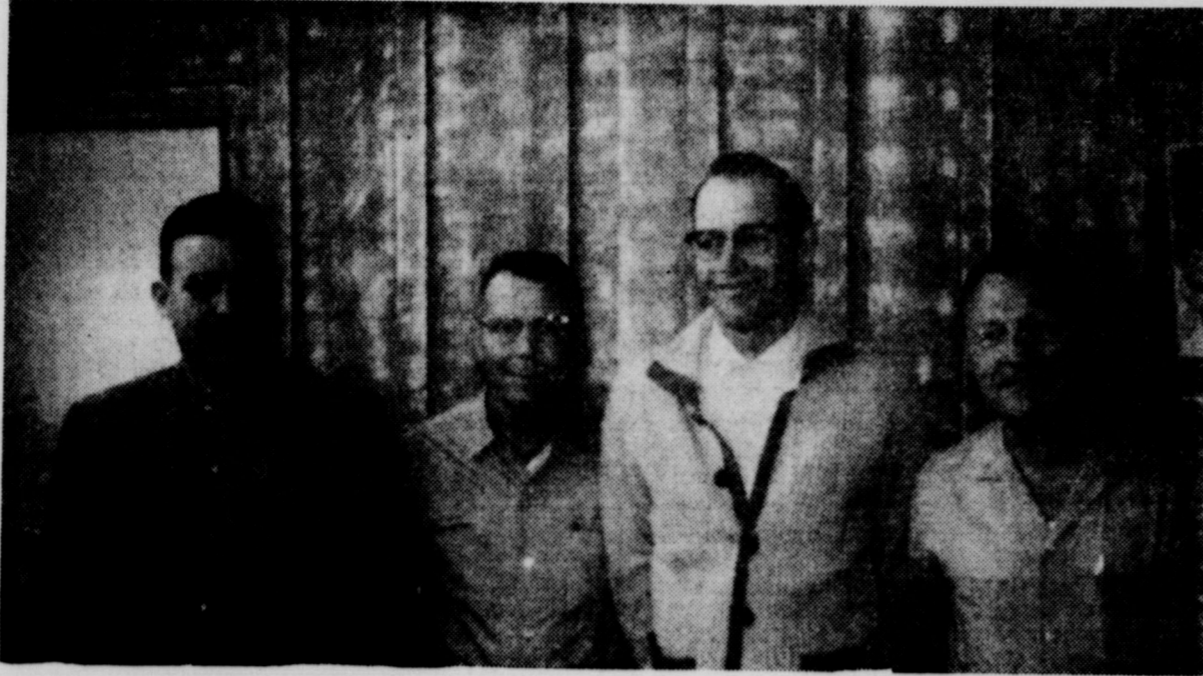
He has said he was an alcoholic in the 1940's until he was converted by Evangelist Billy Graham. He quit show business, began speaking for religious causes and for a time was connected with the Prohibition Party.

**English Likely to Become Universal Language of Future**

The ancients had a dream of a universal language. Although still

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in the future, the idea is close to realization. Over the centuries, in trying to find a universal language some three hundred tongues have been tried. Today, scholars say that the world language of the future is likely to be English.

One reason for this assumption is that English already has 270 million native speakers on the continents, plus the largest number second-language speakers.

Almost all countries, even countries hostile to the United States, teach English as a compulsory course in their schools. This year we have had exchange students in our school who have confirmed the statement that English is required in Germany and Portugal. Among the factors favoring the acceptance of English is its relatively uncomplicated grammatical structure. It also has a tremendous vocabulary suitable for the scientific and technological communication of the future.

The man who proposed the theory of English as a universal language, Dr. William Marquardt, says that it is up to the English teachers of today to help people have a clear understanding of the structures and potentialities of the language. I wonder if Mr. Washington, Mrs. King and Mrs. Manard agree? They probably do.

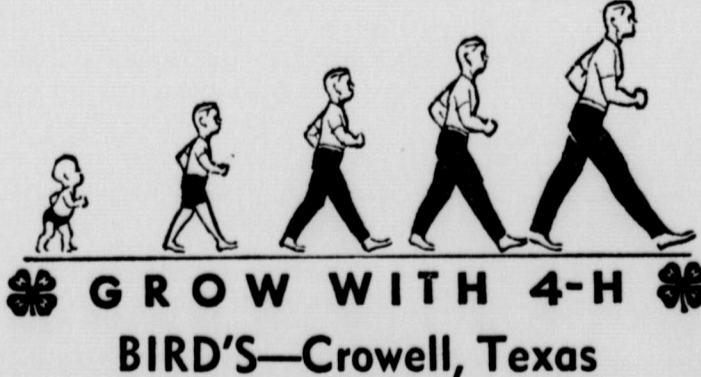

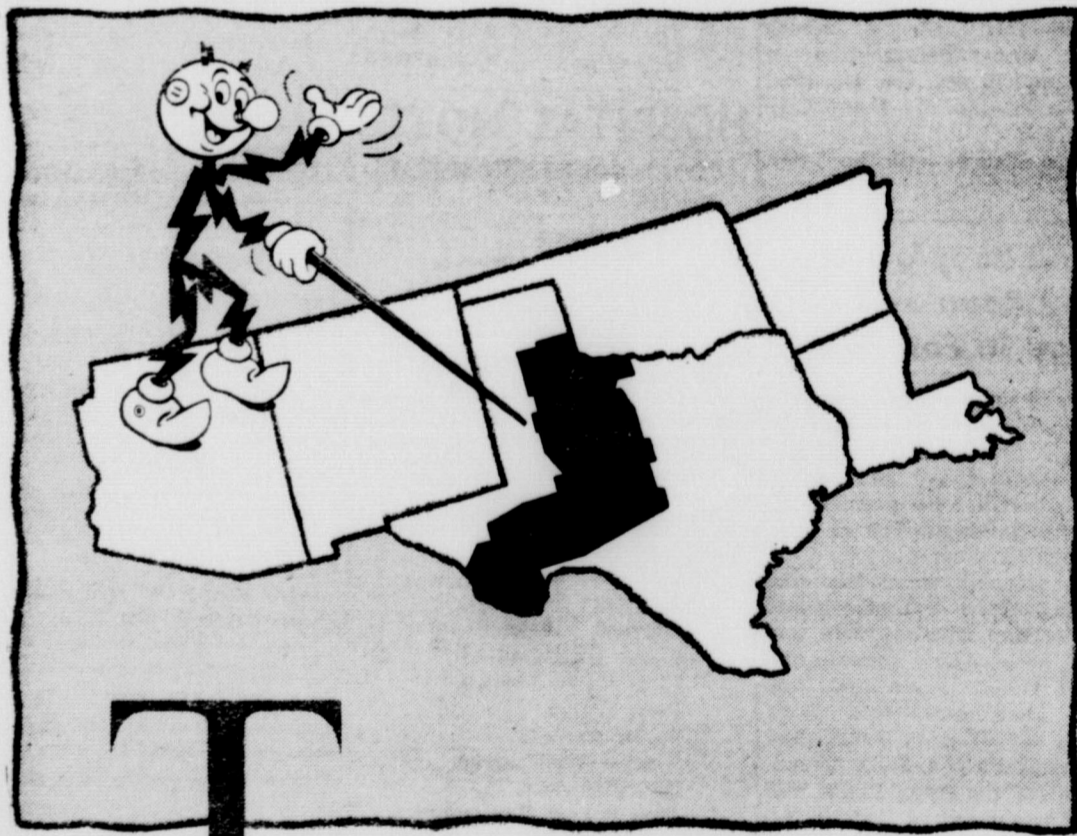

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Austin, Tex.—According to a description given the House Appropriations Committee relative to the governor's mansion, it's in bad shape. Howard Rose, executive assistant to Gov. John Connally says:

"On the north side, the mansion is settling so much, there is a gap of several inches between the floor and the bottom of the front door." He added, "There are cracks in the wall and ceiling; a good deal of furniture needs re-stuffing; and the stove won't work right four days in a row."

"Also," says Rose, "we have only one coffee table in the house. If you don't want to hold your coffee cup, you either put it on the floor or balance it on your knee. In the Green Room, there are no pictures. And we don't have eight complete sets of silver."

This prompted Appropriations Committee Chairman Bill Healy of Paducah to comment "I know we've spent between \$100,000 and \$125,000 on the mansion in the last six years."

Governor Connally has not requested any money for major repairs. He is asking for \$32,872 for each of the next two years to operate the mansion, including \$5,000 for utilities; \$1,500 for telephone expenses; and \$2,200 for "other supplies."

**DELEGATIONS REORGANIZE**—Texas' two largest delegations in the 58th Legislature have organized for the purpose of working closely together "for better representation" of their regions.

An 80-member East Texas delegation elected Rep. John Allen of Longview as chairman.

About 30 West Texas legislators chose Rep. Richard C. Slack of Pecos as their leader.

**COURT SHUFFLE PROPOSED**—Rep. Henry Stollenwerk, young attorney from Dallas, appears to be the most active of the seven Republican members of the House.

He is an aggressive participant in the five committees he's assigned to, and has co-sponsored several bills by Democrats. Stollenwerk feels he's been able to take an active part without defecting from the Republican political philosophy to which he adheres.

After Governor Connally chided Republican legislators for "obstructionism," Stollenwerk said, "The boys joke with me about what the governor said, and I just joke back and say I would be awfully disappointed if I thought he was talking about me."

He is author of a bill to move 12 district courts from places where filings and caseloads are meager, to more populated locations with heavy caseloads.

District courts in this state have not been reapportioned since 1907. Several bills have been introduced by big-city legislators who claim their towns need additional courts.

Stollenwerk said some East and Central Texas courts he proposes to move had only 150 filings in 1961, compared to 1,500 filings in many other district courts.

**GAME AND FISH MERGER HOT TOPIC**—Rep. James Cotton's bill to merge the Game and Fish Commission with the State Parks Board—originally proposed by Governor Connally and the Legislative Budget Board—hasn't come out of committee yet. It's a most controversial subject.

Legislators are beginning to feel pressure from all directions. The South Texas Chamber of Commerce sent them copies of a resolution opposing the merger. Then the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas issued a statement in favor of the plan.

If the Weatherford representative's bill passes, some of the six members of the Parks Board and nine members of the Game and Fish Commission will lose their posts, since the composite commission would be limited to three members. So some legislators are torn between loyalty to local appointees and a desire to "streamline" state government.

**BUDGET TRIMMED**—Meanwhile, the current Game and Fish Commission ran into trouble with the Legislative Budget Board. Commission's executive secretary, Howard Dodgen, requested that during 1963 it be allowed to spend the \$9,199,000 it will have available.

But the budget board recommended a biennial appropriation of \$3,662,000 less than the agency requested.

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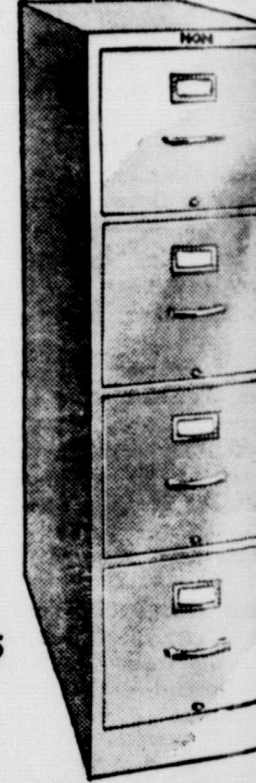
