



New Grain Cars



Good news for grain shippers is coming from Cleburne, Texas, where Santa Fe Railway crews are producing three specially-equipped cars a day on an assembly line. Nearly 450 are being built, featuring a double-plug door with a leakproof gasket, instead of old-style doors that must be backed with a removable grain door or liner to keep loss to a minimum. The small upper portion of the door is used for loading and provides access for sampling by grain inspectors, while the bottom remains tightly sealed until unloading. The new door expedites loading and virtually eliminates loss in transit, the railroad reports.
