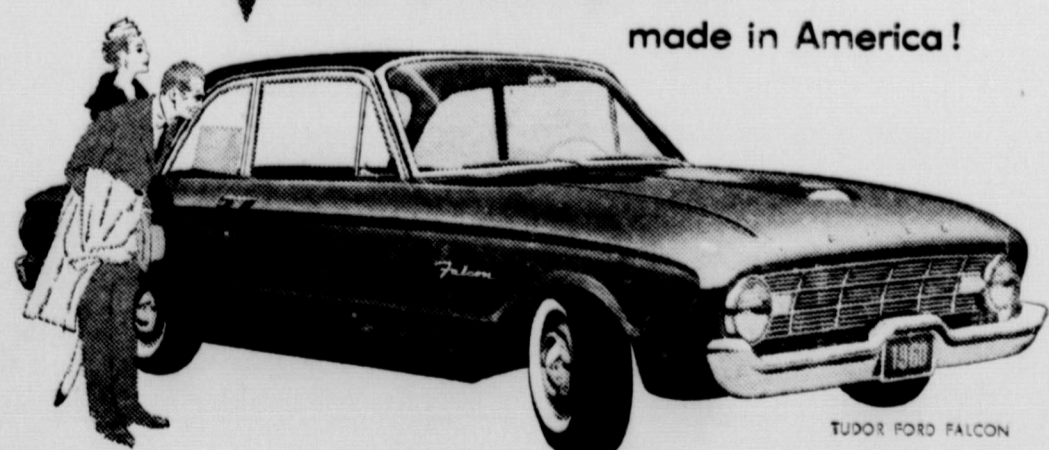

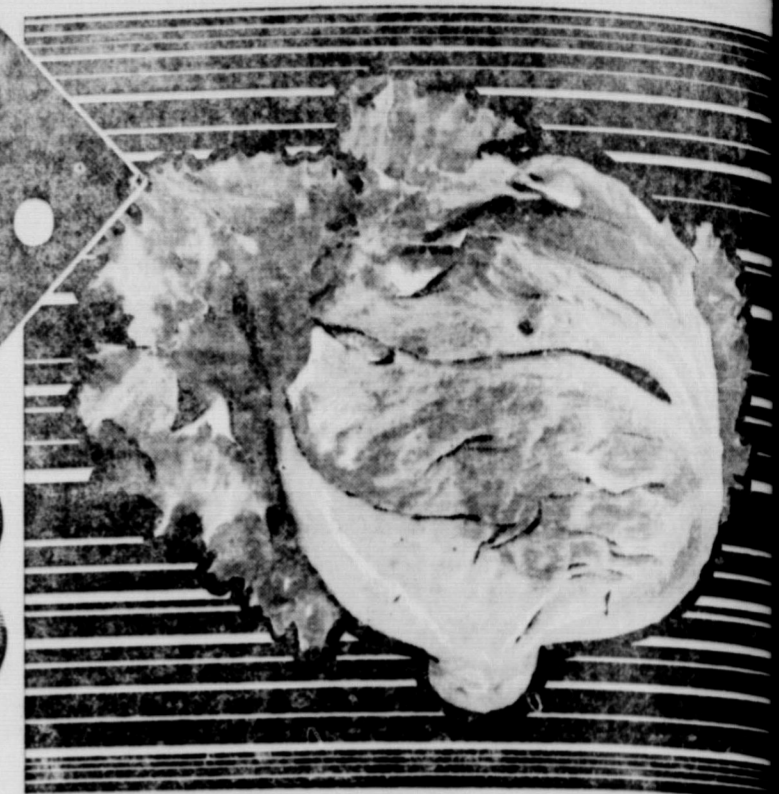

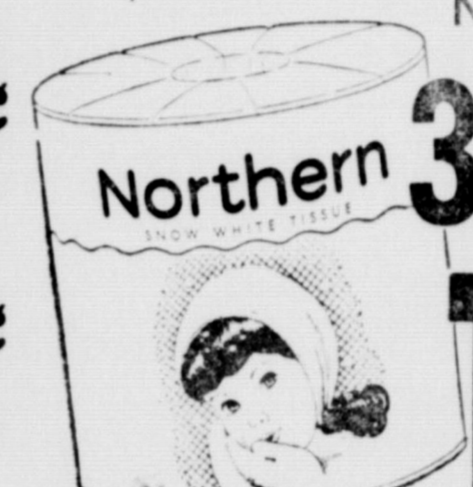

This program deserves the support of all citizens, and we can show our intentions to cooperate, right off, by observing the rules of safe driving over the week end of the Fourth.

The sergeant also warned against trying to cover too many miles in too short a time and driving at speeds too fast for conditions. He gave the following tips for a safe visit:

1. Don't try to cover too many miles.
2. Be prepared for heavy week end traffic.
3. Leave early, and pause for rest occasionally.
4. Drive within speed limits.
5. Leave your drinking off.
6. Remember that the application of common courtesy to traffic situations does prevent many accidents.

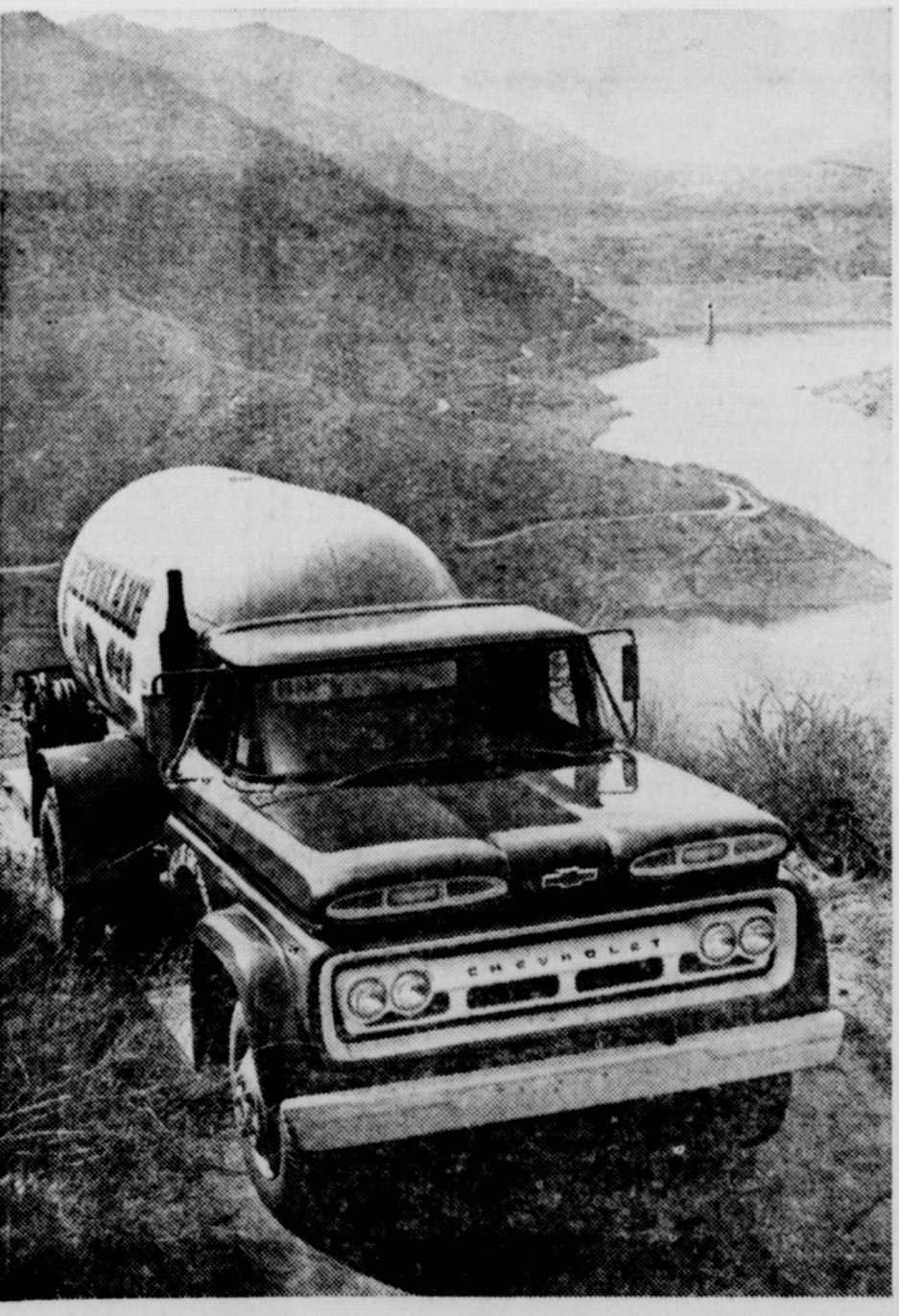

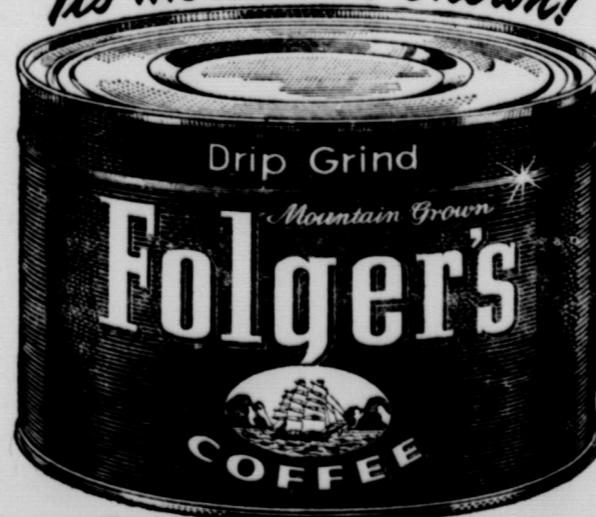
