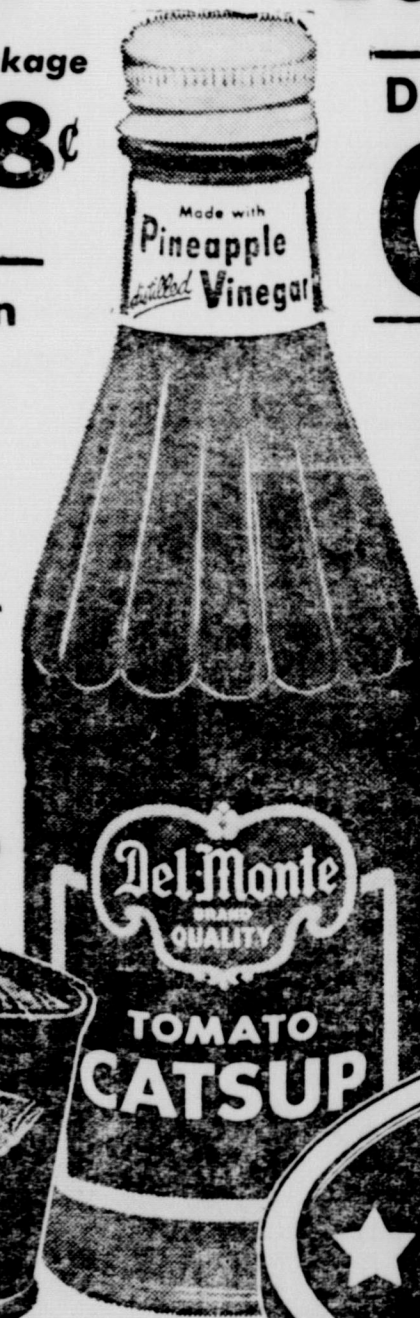

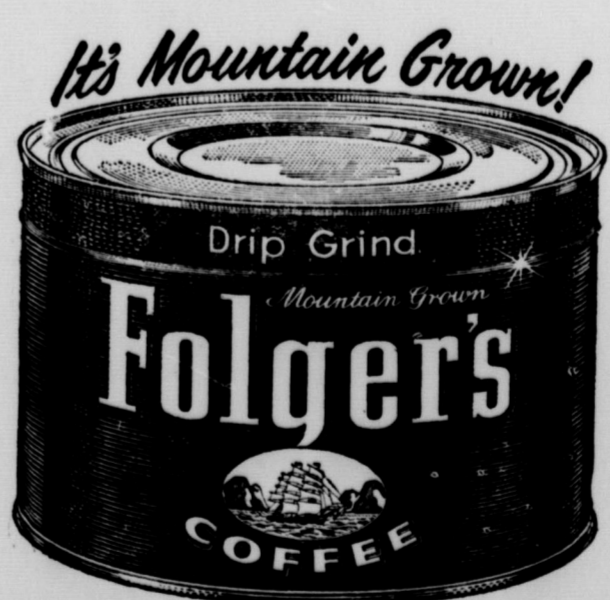

Khrushchev Shows Anti-Semitism

Dr. Bela Fabian writes in the Saturday Evening Post: "Few people know that in the Soviet Union under Nikita Khrushchev, Jews must carry passes with the word 'Yevrei' (Jew) stamped on them, a serious handicap in employment and in other respects. Khrushchev has a long-standing record of anti-Semitism. When after the Nazi withdrawal in 1944, Khrushchev became the Prime Minister of Ukraine and the First Secretary of the Ukrainian Communist Party, his rule was marked by a series of anti-Semitic incidents."

Quail Season Modified for Several Areas

The quail season in a number of Texas counties under regulatory control has been modified by the Game and Fish Commission, according to W. J. Cutbirth Jr., assistant executive secretary. Biologists reported an "abnormal" quail year throughout the state, with a spotted population. Generally, however, the season was liberalized in those counties not under general laws.
