1.2 Inches Rain Recorded Here During Past Week

April 15 Is Deadline For Securing Auto Inspection Sticker

Inspection Sticker!—Deadline?—Saturday midnight, April 15, 1961. Motorists are warned there is less than two weeks for procuring their new 1961 inspection sticker. This announcement was made by Captain Alan Johnson of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Johnson pointed out that of the 544,419 vehicles registered in the 60 counties of this region only a little more than half of them have been inspected and approved. This means that in the last few days of inspection, there will be long lines of cars and trucks waiting to be inspected.

Motorists are reminded that the inspection law prohibits inspections being made when it is raining or the streets are wet. So, it is possible that inclement weather would prevent inspection these last few days. "There will be no extension of the April 15 deadline for inspection," Johnson stated.

Anyone operating a motor vehicle after midnight April 15 without displaying a 1961 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and subject to a fine not to exceed \$200.00 plus court costs.



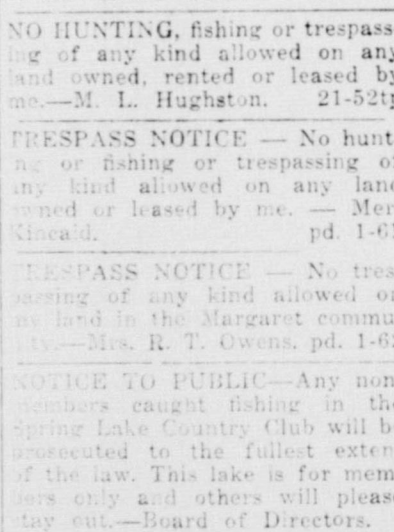
