#### No Absentee Votes Cast with Deadline May 29

Either all Foard County voters plan to be at home on Saturday, June 2, or else fail to vote in the second primary as no absentee ballots had been requested in the office of Mrs. Cornelia McDaniel, county and district clerk.

Apparently, because of lack of any runoffs in county races except for chairman of precinct 3, voters' interest here is nothing compared to what it was in the first Democratic primary.

The Democratic second primary ballot has four posts to be voted on—governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, and Congressman-at-large.

Candidates for governor are John B. Connally and Don Yarborough; lieutenant governor candidates are Preston Smith and James A. Turman; attorney general candidates are Tom Reavley and Waggoner Carr; congressman-at-large candidates are Joe Pool and Woodrow Wilson Bean.

Anyone who wishes to vote absentee in person must do so not later than Tuesday, May 29th.

#### ROTARY TAKES LEAD

As of Thursday night, May 17, after one week of league play, Rotary's Braves, with two consecutive victories over V. F. W., were leading the league.

Foard County Mill, victorious over Farmers Elevator by a 4-0 shutout on Tuesday night, saw the Yankees come back on Thursday night to win by a 7-5 score. These two teams are therefore tied for second place.

The league made its official opening on Tuesday night, May 15, with a big parade led by Sheriff Percy Taylor and featuring the Crowell Wildcat Band led by Earl Hesse. Then, at 6 p. m., in the season opener, Rotary jumped out front on V. F. W. 8-0 in the first three innings on the pitching of Lynn Rader and the hitting of Davis Barrera. Then, in the last three innings, Bob Bird pitched shutout ball for V. F. W. and hit three-for-three to tighten up the margin to its final score of 8-4.

In the 8 p. m. contest, Larry Hughton and Joe Mike Fish collaborated in a four-hit shutout and beat Farmers Elevator by a 4-0 score. This contest was much closer than the score might indicate as each team had four singles for its hitting total. Larry McBeath, Gary Toole, Joe Mike Fish and Jimmy Johnson each got a single for the Cardinals. For the Yankees, Rocky Wisdom and Ronnie Everson each came up with two.

Thursday night, May 17, 6 p. m.: Farmers Elevator, going into the sixth inning trailing 5-2, batted around and scored five runs to defeat Foard County Mill by a 7-5 score. The Cardinals scored all their runs in one big inning (the second) wherein they scored all their five runs. A double by Larry McBeath and a single by Larry Hughton helped drive the runs across, but these two hits were all the Cardinals could garner in the entire ball game. Rocky Wisdom and Leslie Hopkins, with two hits each, led the Yankee hitters, with Daniel Santos, Buddy Myers and Steve Gray each getting one hit.

In the 8 p. m. game, a merciful curfew alarm clock ended proceedings as Rotary's Braves scored 9 runs, still only had one man out, as they racked up a total of 19 to VFW's 7. VFW made one sensational scoring splurge, featuring a grand-slam home run by Bruce McRae, adding four runs to a home run hit previously by Bob Bird. Bob was two-for-two that night; Terry Bird and Rudy Magee each hit a single.

For Rotary, Charles Nichols hit three-for-four; Gary Eddy, Lynn Rader and Larry Woodard hit two-for-four; and Joe Burkett and Davis Barrera each came through with a double.

#### Antone Kajs of Riverside Brings in First Load Wheat

Antone Kajs of the Riverside community brought the first load of 1962 wheat in Foard County to the Farmers Elevator in Crowell Saturday afternoon about 6:30 o'clock.

The load contained 253 bushels, tested 62 pounds, and had a moisture content of 12.

The wheat was cut from non-irrigated land, and Mr. Kajs was estimating the yield at 19 bushels per acre.

#### Foard County Mill Receives First Wheat Monday

The first load of 1962 wheat was brought to the Foard County mill Monday afternoon by R. L. Taylor. The load contained 273 bushels, tested 61 pounds and had a moisture content of 12.

Cecil Carroll brought in the first load of barley to the Mill Tuesday afternoon. It tested 49 pounds, with a moisture content of 11.63 and there were 304 bushels in the load.

#### Civil Defense Film to Be Shown Tonight at Community Center

A Civil Defense film, "Are You Safe at Home?" will be shown at the new Community Center on Thursday night, May 25 (tonight). Starting time is 7:30 p. m., and all Foard County residents are invited and urged to be present.

The program is being sponsored locally by the West Side and Gambelville Home Demonstration Clubs.

Tornadic winds, heavy rains and hail did many thousands of dollars worth of damage to Foard County crops and residences in a storm which struck this area Sunday afternoon around 5 o'clock.

The storm came up from the west and traveled in an easterly direction across the county a few miles south of town. The combination of extremely high winds and heavy hail completely destroyed all the wheat in a section about 4 to 5 miles wide and extending across the county west to east. Of the 50,000 acres planted to wheat in this county, estimates of the loss run as high as 30,000 acres completely and partially destroyed. The loss from the grain hailed out in this section will total many hundreds of thousands of dollars to Foard County farmers. The hail storm apparently began in the Antelope Flat community, went north of Foard City, just south of Crowell, through Thalia and on east into Wilbarger County.

The vicious winds and heavy fall of hail did a complete job of wiping out the wheat. The stalks of the grain were cut off practically at the ground and hurled against the fences where they caught on the wires. Wheat stalks were littered across the highways in the stricken area. Long-time residents called the storm the most complete destruction of so vast an acreage of wheat in their memory.

South of town in the heavy storm damage area, homes and barns also were mauled about. Reports reaching the News of hail and wind damage included: the Henry Johnson home had all the window lights blown out and the garage blown away. A house on the Lester Ownbey place was blown off its foundation. A barn on the Ownbey place was blown away. Other homes in this area which suffered damage from hail and wind include the homes of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Knox, Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Shook, Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Daniel, Mr. and Mrs. John Borchardt, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Borchardt, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Pittillo, Mr. and Mrs. John Odell and Dorothy and Jim Hill Erwin. Telephone and power line poles were blown over on the highway near the Johnson home.

In Thalia, most of the homes having composition shingles suffered damage.

A heavy loss of turkeys was reported by Howard Bursey and Jim Moore in the Thalia area. Mr. Bursey estimated over 1,000 turkeys killed out of a group of 10,000.

Here in Crowell, winds tore the roof off McClain's Super Save and water damaged the stock and fixtures there. Highway signs were bent, numberless trees had limbs broken off, and plate glass windows were broken at Bartley's Laundry, McClain's Super Save, D&T Foodway, the home of Mrs. G. M. Canup and others. TV antennas were blown down at many Crowell homes.

Heavy rains accompanied the hail with ninety-five hundredths of an inch recorded in Crowell.

Fortunately no serious injuries were reported. Henry Johnson was reported to have suffered several cuts from flying glass, and this was the only injury the News learned of.

Insurance agents and adjustors have been busy this week estimating losses to property and crops.

Traffic caused by sight-seers in the stricken area was heavy earlier in the week and was reminiscent of the deluge of onlookers who came to Crowell following the storm in 1942.

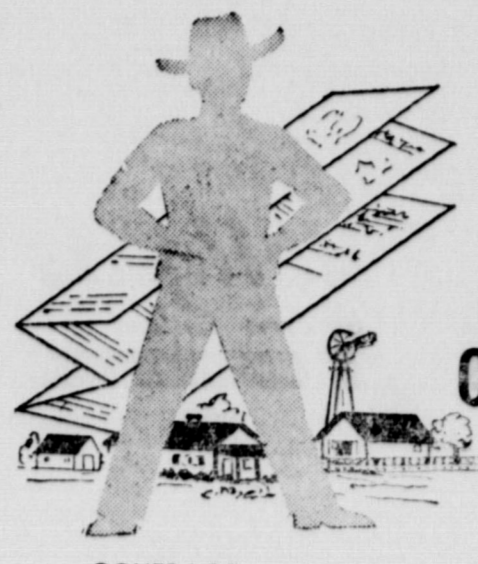

**STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights*  
**AND Sidelights**

Austin, Tex.—Big news around the State Capitol is that the state finally got out of the red.

Treasurer Jesse James announced the good news. Deficit, which had existed since September 28, 1958, was wiped out by heavy income from annual insurance and corporation franchise taxes, plus revenue from the new sales tax.

As of 1 p. m. May 18, there was a cash balance in the state's main checking account—the general revenue fund—of \$1,233,106.

Fund will be back in the red again, from time to time, before everything gets squared away. However, about a year from now, a steady surplus should be on hand.

**BUSINESSMEN LOSE MILLIONS**—Texas businessmen are

throwing away more than \$3,000,000 a year, according to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. This because they're not taking advantage of the prepayment plan under the new state sales tax.

Since small and big businessmen usually pay their bills within 10 days to earn a two per cent discount, Calvert can't understand why they waste \$3,160,000 a year by failing to get this same discount from the state.

Under the sales tax law's prepayment plan, a businessman can increase his allowable discount from one to three per cent. He can do so by rendering the tax for each quarter by the middle of the quarter to be reported. In other words, he can pay the tax in advance on a logical estimate.

Prepayment was conceived by the Legislature, Calvert said, as an incentive, with some consolation to the business that is forced to collect and report the tax. But to date, prepayment has been the most neglected section of the sales tax law.

**TEXTBOOK LISTS WILL BE PUBLIC**—When the House Textbook Investigating Committee was holding open hearing on books recommended by the State Textbook Committee of the Board

of Education, one of the most frequent complaints registered by those who protested selections was that they couldn't get copies of the texts in time to study all the content.

The newly-appointed textbook committee for 1962 has set forth a system for adoption which will give every possible protestant as much time to pore over this year's offerings as the committee itself will have.

On or before July 1, publishers must file a statement of intent, listing all books offered by title, subject, copyright and authors. A compilation of this information will then be forwarded to all school districts, as well as interested groups and individuals who request the list from the Texas Education Agency.

Textbook publishers also have been instructed to make all considered texts available for purchase by the public from their various depositories.

Final date to file intent to protest any book offered for adoption will be August 1.

**OUTSTANDING YOUTHS TO BE REWARDED**—If you'd like to nominate a youngster for a distinguished service award, or for bravery, write to Governor Price Daniel. He is seeking recommendations for Young American Medals for Bravery and Service awards for 1961. He asks that nominations of boys and girls under age 19, who have performed acts of extraordinary courage or achieved outstanding records of service, be submitted to him by August 15.

Act of bravery or record of achievement must have been performed during 1961. Two medals may be awarded for each category by the Young American Medals Committee of the U. S. Department of Justice, after final approval by Attorney General Robert Kennedy.

Governor Daniel will forward his recommendations to the Justice Department after he receives nominations which include facts about each youngster's achievement with supporting statements by witnesses; authenticated evidence of the time and place of the candidate's birth; a biographical sketch and photograph.

### Two Minutes With the Bible

"The Fruits of Christ's Resurrection"

The resurrection of Christ is God's answer to unbelief. The changed lives of His followers who saw Him alive after His crucifixion and the revolution in the life of Paul, who saw Him "last of all," rank high among the "many infallible proofs" of His resurrection. Cowards were made bold, doubters believed, the sorrowing were made glad, the pitiless persecutor became His docile follower. The broken Roman seal, the empty tomb, the failure of the enemies of Christ to produce the dead body and a hundred other facts add their testimony that the Lord Jesus Christ has been "declared to be the Son of God with power . . . by the resurrection from the dead" (Rom. 1:4).

The resurrection of Christ further assures us that God is fully satisfied with His payment for sin, for "when He had by Himself purged our sins He sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high" (Heb. 1:3). "For by one offering He hath perfected forever them that are sanctified" (Heb. 10:14).

Next, the resurrection of Christ gives us a living Savior. Comparing the Old Testament priests with Christ, Heb. 7:23-25 says: "And they truly were many priests, because they were not suffered to continue by reason of death: But this Man, because He continueth ever, hath an unchangeable priesthood. Wherefore He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them."

The resurrection of Christ is also the pledge of the believer's resurrection in glory. In I Pet. 1:3 the Apostle Peter breaks out in a doxology: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a living hope, by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." And our Lord Himself said what no other could possibly say: "I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live" (John 11:25).

Finally, the resurrection of Christ is a warning to the world of judgement to come: "Because God hath appointed a day, in which He will judge the world in righteousness by that Man whom He hath ordained; whereof He hath given assurance unto all men, in that He hath raised Him from the dead" (Acts. 17:31). "Now is the accepted time" (II Cor. 6:2). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

## Dairy Foods Head June Plentiful List

Light and refreshing dairy foods head the list, as milk production is at its peak for the year. Traditionally, June is dairy month. So look for an abundance of whole milk, skim milk, buttermilk, ice cream, sour cream, cheeses of all kinds, and all the other nourishing dairy products.

Frozen orange juice, mostly from Florida, is another June plentiful. Its sparkling flavor and invaluable nutrition make it especially adapted to summer meals and snacks.

Broiler-fryers also remain plentiful at low, low prices—almost as low as last June when farm prices reached record-low levels. These tender, meaty birds are ideal for formal or informal meals, in the dining room, on the patio or on a picnic.

Vegetable fats and oils comprise the June list. Commercial stocks of crude and semi-refined soybean and cottonseed oils have been running at an all-time high. Salad and cooking oil stocks are about four times higher than a year ago.

These four foods have been given the official "plentiful" tag by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service because supplies of each exceed expected demand. Producers, processors and the food trade in general are cooperating to give consumers the advantage of this abundance. Watch for retail specials; serve plentiful foods often, advises the Service.

The job of keeping lawns neatly trimmed and mowed will become more time consuming with the advent of warm weather. Power tools for doing the job are readily available and power mowers are regular equipment around

## most homes. These mowers, im-

properly used, can run up the cost of lawn mowing by being accident hazards. The rotary type mower can become a lethal machine if it is used to mow lawns or weeds where rocks, bones, pieces of wire, nails or other debris can be found. The cutting blade can be broken by striking a hard object and hurled through the air. Wire can be cut into short pieces and hurled at bullet speed. Be sure that the area being mowed is free of such objects and that the mower is constructed so as to prevent objects being hurled toward the operator.

Never try to make adjustments to a mower with the engine running. It is just good business to remove the wire from the spark plug before attempting to repair or adjust the cutting blade or remove accumulations of grass or weeds from under the mower.

Children should not be allowed to operate a mower nor should a person who is barefooted or wearing open-toed shoes. The engine should be cool when refueling and if an electric mower is used be sure the extension cord is in perfect shape or you may be in for a shock.

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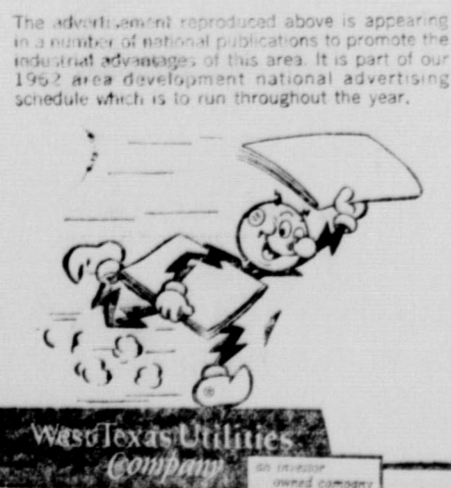

**Power Lawn Mowers Can Be Dangerous**

The job of keeping lawns neatly trimmed and mowed will become more time consuming with the advent of warm weather. Power tools for doing the job are readily available and power mowers are regular equipment around most homes. These mowers, improperly used, can run up the cost of lawn mowing, cautions the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, by being accident hazards.

The rotary type mower can become a lethal machine, warns the Council, if it is used to mow lawns or weeds where rocks, bones, pieces of wire, nails or other debris can be found. The cutting blade can be broken by striking a hard object and hurled through the air. Wire can be cut into short pieces and hurled at bullet speed. Be sure, advises the Council, that the area being mowed is free of such objects and that the mower is constructed so as to prevent objects being hurled toward the operator.

Furthermore, the Council suggests a few additional rules of safety which, if followed, could prevent many accidents involving lawn mowers or other power tools. "Never," they warn, "try to make adjustments to a mower with the engine running. It's just good business to remove the wire from the sparkplug before attempting to repair or adjust the cutting blade or remove accumulations of grass or weeds from under the mower."

Children should not be allowed to operate a mower nor should a person who is barefooted or wearing open toed shoes. The engine should be cool when refueling is done and if an electric mower is used, be sure the extension cord is in perfect shape or you may be in for a shock, warns the Council.

It's a good idea, say the Council, to once again read the operator's manual which came with the mower or other tools before taking them out for another season. The folks who made the equipment are concerned about the user's safety and have made recommendations to insure a long and useful life for the machine and operator, concludes the safety group.

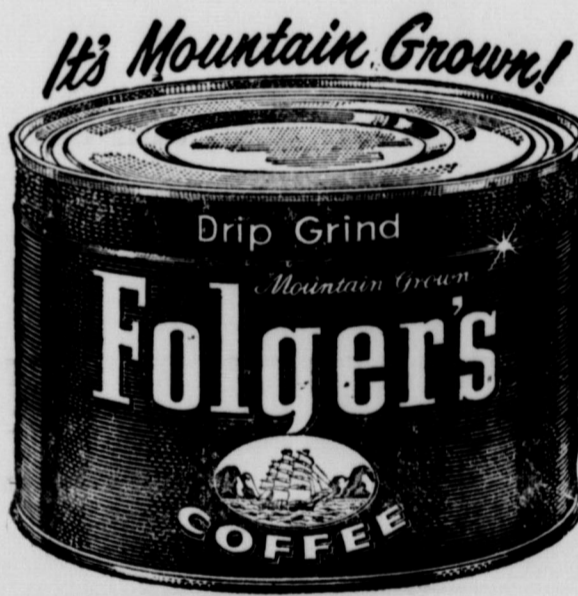

**Screwworm Program Results Noted**

"Though we are just getting started, I believe we are now on the road toward eradication of the screwworm in the Southwest." This statement by R. L. Murphree, DeWitt County, expresses the feeling of officials of the Animal Disease Eradication Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Animal Health Commission and Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation.

"I have had only one screwworm case up to mid-year," Murphree continued. "Normally I would have

**had 15 to 20 cases. Though part of this may be due to the winter freeze, I have found several blows or egg masses which have not hatched. They have just dried up and indicate the release of sterile flies in the area is helping now."**

Gillespie County ranchman Clint Hardin, Willow Springs, described how he found a baby calf with its navel covered with screwworm eggs. It was not doctored but the eggs did not hatch. This section has been a hot spot for screwworms in the county, according to County Agent C. A. Stone.

USDA officials explain the apparent leveling off of screwworm cases in many counties during the past week is just a preview of results that will be obtained once the new 75-million-per-week sterile fly production plant at Mission goes into operation. Production has been increased to almost 30 million flies per week at the temporary facilities at Kerrville, but this has not been sufficient to do the job.

Progress of construction at the Mission plant is another reason for the favorable outlook, the officials explained. Work is ahead of schedule, and the plant should be completed by mid-June. Fly production will be underway by July 1.

Eventual eradication of this costly livestock pest will come from a combination of the release of sterile flies and work by livestock owners. Stockmen should adhere closely to good screwworm management practices to protect their herds and help reduce screwworm populations in order that maximum results can be obtained from the sterile fly releases.

"We hope that no one had the idea that there would be no screwworms in Texas this first year," commented Claude McCan, Victoria county ranchman and a member of the board of trustees of the SWAHRF. "Although we have had fewer cases than in the past in many areas, it is a question of each individual stockman staying with the fight."

McCan added that they had just dehorned and castrated the third round and have had only two

**screwworm cases. Normally, this time of the year, they expect 100 to 150 cases. "Since Victoria county is in real screwworm country," he said, "you could normally expect almost 100 per cent infestation when working or dropping calves at this time of the year."**

Every case of screwworms out of commission now prevents thousands of cases three to four weeks later. In turn, this makes more effective use of limited supply of available fly and will speed up eradication, officials said.

Officials stressed that stockmen should now follow a regular preventive spray program using Ral or Korlan, following the instructions on the label. These sprays give protection for two to three weeks.

Cattlemen in Texas are praised for the support already given but officials of the cooperative agencies stressed that no one should let up in his responsibility to the program now, the officials said.

These responsibilities include the regular spray program, the use of insecticides on all animals, pre-treatment of all animals before they become infested with screwworms, early and intense treatment of screwworm-infested animals and frequent retreatment. Also the collection of 10 worms from each wound for positive identification. These worms should be delivered to the local county agent.
