### Do Not Pick Planting

Do you choose your planting seed by looks? If so, you are way off, because Lee Coffey, the seed man at Texas A&M College, says you can't tell how a seed will produce by looking at the seed. You must see how it performs in the field. Actually, that's the way certified seed are checked. Field inspectors of the State Department of Agriculture check each field on which certified seed is produced to see that rigid standards are met. In this way you can be sure the seed will live up to the perform-ance that was bred into it.

So Coffey's advice on choosing

seed is to first pick the variety you want that is adapted to your area, then buy certified seed of that variety or hybrid. You will know it is certified by the blue tag and the State of Texas seal on the bag. For leaflets and other research facts on varieties or hy-brids that are adapted to Foard County, see the county agent.


