BAND WINS FIRST AT NATIONAL FESTIVAL

Republicans Hold Primary Election Saturday

Republican Party held a primary election in Precinct 4 of Foard County Saturday, in the first Republican primary election held here.

The race for governor, Jack C. Carr, received 1; in the race for lieutenant governor, D. L. Hester received three votes and J. P. Rader and Phillips each received two votes in the congressional race.

Fourteen votes were cast against the poll tax; four against the Padre Island seashore tax; and one against the tax on the Amarillo and E. Wells of Crowell had printed last Thursday. Wells stated that if they had sooner that they were going to hold a primary, he predicted a much larger number of county residents would vote in the Republican election.

Census of Housing Counts 1,340 Housing Units in Foard County

The 1960 Census of Housing counted 1,340 housing units in Foard County, according to a report released by the United States Department of Commerce.

The median value of owner-occupied places was \$6,900, and 1,031 were occupied—714 were occupied by their owners, 317 were occupied by renters. The census report revealed that 630 were in sound condition with all plumbing, 785 had hot and cold running water, 811 had flush toilet, and 834 had bathtub or shower. Four of the house units were trailer homes; 21 households had air conditioning, and 21 had basements.

There were 884 television sets, 928 radios, and 675 telephones. A total of 396 had washing machines and 402 had home freezers. One-car families totaled 634 and 273 had two automobiles.

Cancer Drive to Get Underway This Morning

The drive for funds for the American Cancer Society will begin in Foard County this morning (Thursday) at 7 o'clock. A house-to-house and business section campaign on the part of workers running high that the goal of \$500.00 can be reached. Foard County failed to meet its quota last year in the cancer drive.

Henry Black and Mrs. Frank Gribble are in charge of the drive and about twenty-five people from over the county will assist in the fund-raising campaign.

At the 30th annual Tri-State Music Festival in Enid, Okla., the Crowell High School Stage Band, under the direction of Earl Hesse, placed first in class C stage band competition. This festival is considered the largest music festival in the southwestern part of the United States. There were more than 10,500 students, 250 bands, and 10 states including Texas, Mississippi and Illinois, represented at this festival. The stage band competition is divided into four classes: A, which is the large schools comparable to AAA schools in Texas; B, which is comparable to AA in Texas; C, which is comparable to AA and A in Texas; and D, which is small schools and junior highs.

This is undoubtedly the highest honor ever won by a musical organization in Crowell and the members of the band and Mr. Hesse are to be congratulated on their musical abilities. Class C offered the most competition with 12 bands competing for honors. They were judged by top professional jazz men from Hollywood, Calif. Many high acclamations were presented in concert at the Grand Concert Friday night before approximately 4,500 people.

Saturday, May 5, was an important day for 17 Foard County 4-H boys and girls, because they were entering team demonstrations in the Extension District 3, 4-H Elimination Contest at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls.

Foard County 4-H contestants placed second in farmers co-op demonstration, second in senior dairy cattle judging, first in junior dairy judging, third in poultry marketing, fifth in vegetable preparation, and sixth in land judging.

Joe David Drabek and Jean Burkett won second place in the farmers co-op demonstration contest.

Larry Wright, John Carl Borchart and Junior Denton won second in senior dairy cattle judging. Larry Wright was third high point individual in the contest.

The above two teams will represent District 3 at the State 4-H Contest held at Texas A&M College on June 5, 6, and 7.

Karen Shirley and Dena Todd placed third in the poultry marketing contest.

Betty Ann Welch and Rosa Latimer won fifth place in the vegetable preparation contest.

Ronnie Denton, John Schilling and Kenneth Campbell placed sixth in the land judging contest.

The junior dairy judging team with Bob Bird, Gary Tole, Bob Shirley and Joe Ray Burkett, were the high point team members in the district and were awarded first place blue ribbons.

Accompanying the group were Mrs. Ray Shirley, adult leader; and Foard County Extension Agents, Mrs. Janet Carroll and Joe Burkett.

There were more than 600 4-H Club members and adult leaders in attendance from 22 counties in District 3. Over 400 of these 4-H Club boys and girls competed in the various contests.

CROWELL BOYS INJURED IN WRECK NEAR QUANAH

A two-car accident two miles south of Quannah on the Crowell highway early Sunday morning injured two Crowell boys and also seriously injured three Quannah youths.

The Crowell car was occupied by Jerry Latimer, the driver, Jimmy Thompson and Ray Aydelott. Latimer suffered severe scalp lacerations. Thompson sustained a back injury. They were moved to the Foard County Hospital from the Quannah Hospital Sunday night by Womack ambulance.

Aydelott was not injured.

The two Quannah boys in critical conditions in the Quannah hospital are Rayford Horn and Jimmy Jackson. Ray Bengue was hospitalized with pelvic injuries. Hospitalized overnight and dismissed Sunday afternoon after being treated for cuts and minor fractures were Danny Ray, Larry Pierce, Jack Graves, Gerald Riley and Charles Brandon. The car was driven by Horn.

The two cars were traveling south at a high rate of speed, according to investigating officers, who described the accident. The eight Quannah boys in a light 1962 automobile were attempting to pass the car which held the three Crowell boys, officers said.

The cars sideswiped and swerved into the right hand barrow ditch. The car containing the Quannah boys traveled about 490 feet from the point of impact and overturned three times. The Crowell car travelled 520 feet and overturned twice.

Highway Patrolman Eldon Thane, Quannah Chief of Police Joe Murphy and Bill Wheat, policeman, all of Quannah, conducted the investigation.

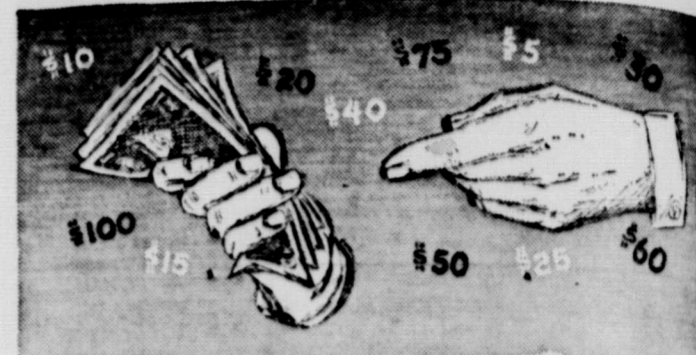

County Agricultural Agent Joe Burkett reports that because of extremely favorable weather conditions for screwworm activity, screwworms have spread into Central and West Texas, most of the counties in the Edwards Plateau and about half the counties in the Trans-Pecos area.
Burkett says that plans are being made to expand the sterile screwworm fly release area to include most of the infested area. The majority of the sterile flies being produced will be released in a barrier zone which will encompass the northern edge of the screwworm infested area.
The agent encourages all livestock producers to inspect all livestock regularly, to treat all wounds promptly, and to collect ten or more worms from deep in the wound and bring them to his office. He points out that the more screwworms that are killed by chemical treatment, the fewer sterile flies will be required to overwhelm the native flies.

Cannot Carry the Load for Others

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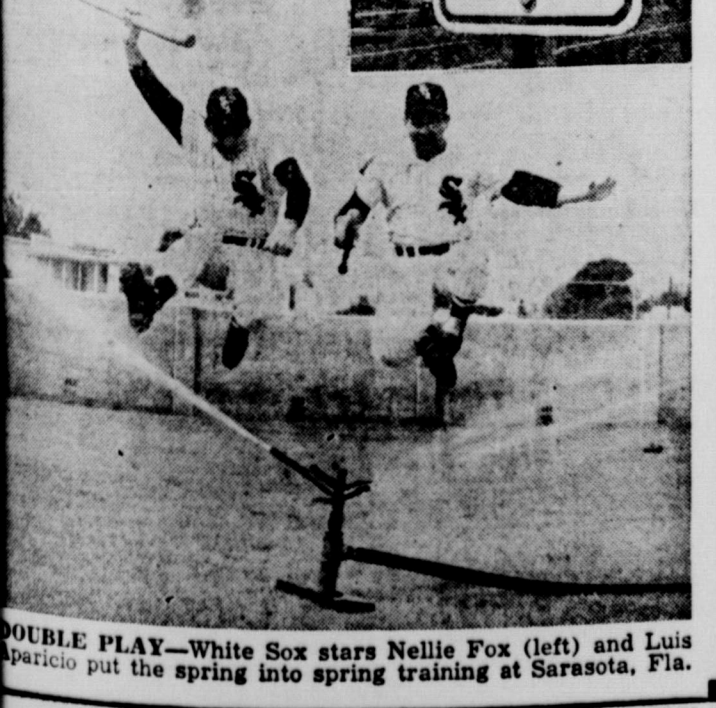

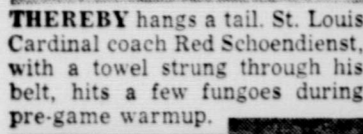

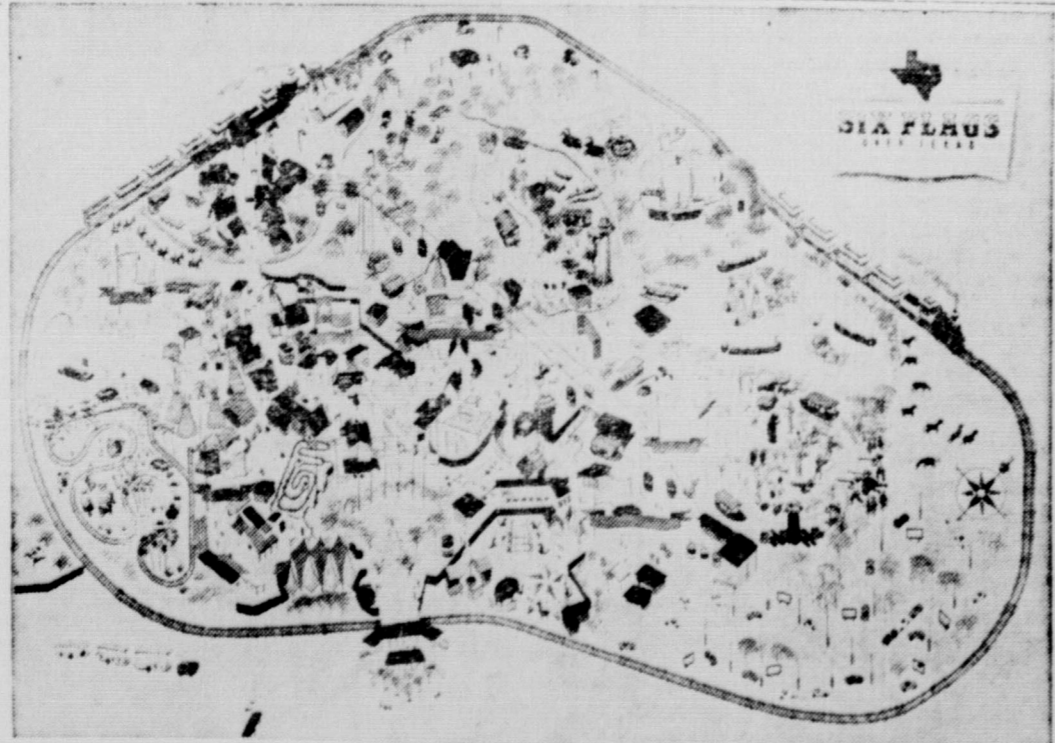

Austin, Tex.—Annual payments of corporation franchise taxes helped knock down the enormous deficit in the state's General Revenue Fund in just 12 days.

On April 24, State Treasurer Jesse James reported a deficit of \$80,341,045. Twelve days later, the overdraft was down to \$28,053,885.

James noted that the deficit was markedly lower than the \$98,000,000 peak reached a little more than a month ago. But he did not state when the next big payment will be made out of the revenue fund . . . which might make the deficiency soar again.

However, State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert said the state will send more than \$34,000,000 to public schools early in the summer.

IMPORTED STEEL TO BE BANNED—District Judge Herman Jones of Austin has given notice to both sides of the case of the Texas Association of Steel Importers, Inc., versus the State Highway Department that he will uphold the Highway Commission's authority to order a ban against imported steel in constructing state highways.

Steel importers challenged this authority when they brought suit in January. A five-day trial in March ended in a hung jury.

Highway Commissioner Herb Petry Jr. testified that some imported steel was found to be "inferior," and stated that it wasn't "worth the risk."

Judge Jones concluded that the importers had failed to show the invalidity of the highway department's order. He is expected to enter judgment for the state next week.

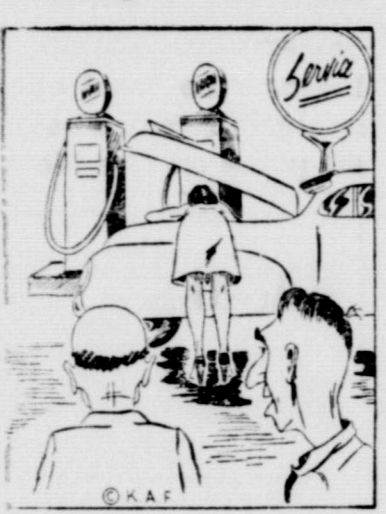

Home Demonstration Notes

JANET CARROLL

The Home Demonstration Council meets today, Thursday, May 10, at 2:30 in the agent's office. A Laundry Workshop will be held Tuesday, May 22, at Lake Pauline, southeast of Quanah. The Extension Service of Hardeman and Foard County are co-operating with West Texas Utilities Co. in sponsoring the workshop. Details on the all-day meeting will be given later. Anyone interested is invited.

Do you skip breakfast and try to compensate for it during the coffee break? Is the coffee break an effective substitute for an adequate breakfast?

Scientists at the University of Iowa College of Medicine recently conducted a series of tests. Here is what they found:

All of the people participating in the experiment did significantly more work when they ate an adequate breakfast than when they skipped eating.

The addition of a mid-morning snack—when an adequate breakfast had been eaten previously—offered no advantage in output of work.

A coffee break and snack period which replaced breakfast proved a big advantage for half the subjects in the amount of work they turned out.

The study also showed that when people eat an adequate breakfast they are more productive during the late morning hours, and quicker in their reactions, and do not tire as easily.

Work efficiency is determined by better nutrition as well as the amount of rest the worker has had, his coordination under the best of circumstances, and his motivation of work.

Reason for Britain Joining Common Market is Plain

Columnist Jay Haden writes: "The British decision to apply for Common Market membership... occasioned much soul searching beforehand and even more since its issuance. The main reason for the plunge was plain enough. Britain has slipped gradually to the status of a second-rate power. Economic growth rate in the Common Market six soared in West Germany's gross national product up from 1950 to 1960 by over 6 per cent (annually); Italy's by 5 per cent, and France, despite all its Algerian troubles, nearly 4 per cent. Britain barely managed to exceed a 2 per cent mark." One reason for this, he goes on, is that the European nations, with their productive facilities largely reduced to rubble by the war, started about from scratch and built the most productive and efficient plants they could devise. Britain still had most of her old facilities and they are, by comparison, obsolete.

Should Develop Role of Free Enterprise in Foreign Aid Lands

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States, while supporting the Administration foreign aid program in principle, proposes certain improvements and economies. It says that \$1.1 billion should be cut from the \$4.9 billion program. Moreover, it emphasizes the idea that a concerted effort needs to be made to strengthen the role of private enterprise in the less-developed countries.

Texas Agriculturist Is Important Citizen

When you see someone plowing a field or tending a herd you are looking at one of the more than 226,000 Texas farm and/or ranch operators, says Tom Prater, extension farm management specialist. If this man is the average Texas operator, his annual net income is \$3,630, which is \$307 above the national average.

There is also a good chance that this man has some non-farm income, says Prater. In 1961, over 109,000 Texas farmers and/or ranchmen reported that they had off-farm employment, and over 96,000 reported that their non-farm income was greater than the income derived from their farming operation.

When this man puts his tractor away for the night he must make the switch from farm laborer to farm manager, and this is no easy feat. He has a sizable investment in his operation and if he is to realize a profit he must manipulate the factors of production carefully. One miscalculation can mean the difference between profit and loss, points out the specialist.

He must also keep up with the latest technological developments. New methods of controlling insects and plant diseases, new fertilization practices and new management techniques are constantly coming from researchers. The farmer must decide which of these are best applicable to his operation.

All of this describes the average Texas farmer. There are some above average and some below. "Where do you fit in this picture?" asks Prater.

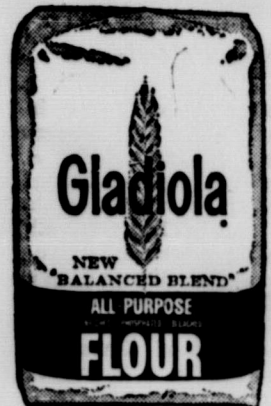

Texas Spends Nation's 5th Largest Amount for Education Purposes

Texas State Government in the fiscal year ending in June 1961 paid out the nation's fifth largest amount of money for educational purposes, the Dallas Field Office of the U. S. Department of Commerce has reported.

During the fiscal year, the State's government expended approximately \$506,446,000 for the education of its students, an amount exceeded only in the states of California, New York, Michigan and Pennsylvania. In doing so, however, Texas dropped from third place in 1951 to fifth place in 1961.

Texas' per capita expenditures last year of \$51.74 took it from 12th position among all states in 1951 to twenty-sixth place last year. During the decade, the state dropped behind such other states in per capita payments as Arizona, Alabama, Montana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Colorado, Oklahoma, North Dakota, West Virginia, New York, Georgia, Indiana, Vermont and Florida.

Harry C. Meyers, manager of the Commerce Department's Dallas field office said, an analysis of a report just released by the Bureau of the Census on State Government finances revealed that Texas more than doubled its out-of-funds for education in the past decade.
