This area which consists of approximately 9 acres is deep sand and needs a close growing crop or a heavy stubble cover to protect it and adjoining land from blowing. Mr. Kuehn sowed switchgrass and a bluestem mixture in the spring of 1959 and now has a good protective cover of grass. The grass has stopped the soil from blowing and spreading onto other parts of the field and has developed a good wildlife cover and feeding ground for quail.








This Past Year, the Headlines

Big numbers usually make news, but this past year a zero made the headlines.

The "zero" is in the column of vital statistics telling how many drug store. Today at Fergeson's people died from poliomyelitis Drug. during 1963. In about a ten-year period, the death column dropped from a 253 total to a zero. Behind these columns lies a

story that statistics alone cannot tell. The story-in short orderreflects the development of polio vaccine during the last ten years. But let's start at the beginning of the story. Poliomyelitis, also

known as infantile paralysis, is

caused by a poliovirus. Single cases or epidemics occur throughout the world. The disease may strike at any time, but the largest number of cases occur in the summer and early winter months. Children and young adults are the most frequent victims.

The disease is spread from man to man. Poliomyelitis virus has been found in secretions of the nose and throat and in the feces of patients. For this reason, polio patients are isolated and intense precautions are exercised, especially during the early days of ill-

Anyone can have poliomyelitis -a crippling and killing diseasebut no one can be cured.

The key to avoiding the dread disabling disease is prevention. Two vaccines-discovered, developed and tested in the last ten The first hope of a vaccine came

in 1953. A scientist at the University of Pittsburgh had developed a vaccine, composed of killed polio viruses. But the vaccine had to be tried and tested before mass immunization could take place. Then, in 1955, the public was


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
