Marvin Jones Retiring as Chief U. S. Claims Court Judge

President Johnson approved last Thursday the retirement from regular active service of Chief Judge Marvin Jones of the United States Court of Claims. Jones is a Texan who has served in Washington since 1917, at various times in all three branches of the govment.


He will be put on a roster of senior judges so he can be available for service at any time when assigned by the chief justice of the Supreme Court. "I'm in good health and I want to serve from time to time," the 78-year-old judge said. "I've already heard from three circut courts that they want me to work when they need me.

Judge Jones plans to live part of the time in Washington and part of the time in Texas after he leaves the Court of Claims.

He still calls Amarillo home and still votes there, having served in Congress 24 years from the Amarillo district at which time he represented Foard County. He was born near Gainesville.

Judge Jones went to the House Judge Jones went to the House of Representatives in 1917, at, 29 its youngest member at that time. He left Congress in 1941 to take a place on the Court of Claims. In 1942, however, he became assistant to James Byrnes, then director of war mobilization. -While in this position, he headed the U. S. delegation to the first International Conference on Food and Agriculture, held at Hot Springs, Va., in 1943. Jones was federal food administrator during the last two and a half years of World War II. In 1947, he was appointed chief justice of the Court of Claims. Later the title was changed to chief judge. During his service in the House of Representatives, Judge Jones was a frequent visitor in Foard County.

F this coop made any profit it would pay income taxes. But we're not permitted to make a profit. Federal law prohibits any person from profiting from a venture set up under cooperative laws.

The purpose of a cooperative is to allow people to join together to do something for themselves which normally isn't profitable. Coops must serve a real need and benefit not only their members but society as well.

When the income - such as from the sale of electrical service - is greater than the expense then refunds are paid to the member-owners.

These member-owners each pay taxes the same as people who aren't members of any cooperative. In this way every citizen benefits from a more efficient use of the nation's resources

Rural electric cooperatives are good examples of people working together to be better, more productive citizens.





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
