## Highway Patrolmen Investigate Accidents Here During May

The highway patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of May, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, highway patrol supervisor for this area.

These wrecks accounted for two persons injured, and a property damage of \$1,030.00.

This brings the total for the first five months of 1961 in this county to 7 rural traffic crashes in two persons being killed, four injured, and a combined property damage amounting to \$4,287.00.

After noting the accident picture for this county for the first five months of this year, the sergeant pointed out another significant fact. As summer approaches with longer days and additional good driving weather, the driver should be especially aware of the danger period at dusk. Many accidents happen during this period.

One cause of this is the driver fails to turn his lights on soon enough. Although the law sets out when lights must be turned on, the driver should also use his own good judgment. Any time a driver cannot see one-half mile ahead, he should turn his lights on. He may be able to see the other driver, but can the other driver see you?

# Wreck Kills Girl Early Sunday

## Son of Local Man Killed in Childress Auto Accident

Funeral Services  
Held in Childress  
Saturday Afternoon

Eldridge A. Bounds, 53-year-old Childress cook, and son of Rev. Clarence Bounds of Crowell, became Childress County's first traffic accident victim Friday when he was killed in a one-car accident five miles north of Childress.

Investigating Highway Patrolman Bobby Chaffin said Bounds, who was alone in the car, apparently lost control of the vehicle, which rolled at least two times. He was thrown from the car and apparently killed instantly.

Bounds had been a resident of Childress since January 1960, going there from Phoenix, Ariz. He was born Jan. 19, 1908, in Colgate, Okla., and was a veteran of World War II.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Saturday in the First Methodist Church in Childress with the pastor, Rev. Lennel Hester, and Rev. Lester Hill officiating. Rev. and Mrs. Bounds were called to Childress Friday morning and remained there until after the funeral services.

## Casing Being Set on Wehba Oil Test

Casing is being set on Dwight M. Ross No. 1 Fred Wehba following completion of drilling.

Fred Wehba said Wednesday morning that a spooler was being brought in the test which is located four miles north of Crowell.

A 19-year-old girl was killed early Sunday when she was crushed beneath the car in which she was riding in a freakish 1-vehicle accident in Foard County near the Foard-Wilbarger county line.

Dead on arrival at a Vernon hospital was Nancy Jo McCown of Plainview. The fatal accident which occurred 4 of a mile west of the Wilbarger county line in Foard County on US 70, also injured the girl's mother, Mrs. Ida Lamb McCown.

Following emergency treatment in Vernon, Mrs. McCown was taken to a Wichita Falls hospital where she was treated for a badly fractured hip. She had been thrown from the vehicle as it came to a stop.

Patrolman Bob Stinnett gave an account of the accident. He noted that Mrs. McCown, driver, lost control of the car, traveling east. The 1958 Chevrolet apparently hit the left shoulder some 233 yards from the place it finally stopped. The driver then whipped the car back on the road but it went back to the left shoulder.

When the car came back onto the pavement it was in a skid. It flipped into the air, throwing the girl from the car, according to Stinnett.

He noted that the car stopped some 57 feet from where the girl was found by ambulance attendants. Mrs. McCown was laying beside the car where she had been thrown as the car righted.

The girl and her mother were en route to Wichita Falls where Nancy Jo was to have enrolled in Widwestern University. Stinnett said after talking to the girl's father.

A graduate of Plainview High School, Miss McCown was a native of Wichita Falls. She was a member of the First Methodist Church in Plainview. Surviving besides her parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. W. McCown, are two brothers, Ray and Larry McCown of Plainview, and her grandparents, of Wichita Falls.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Tex.—From now until July 10 will be a period of testing how representative democracy works in Texas.

Legislature is to re-convene July 10 to make a fresh stab at writing a tax bill to raise some \$350,000,000 for the next two years. Gov. Price Daniel has urged Texans to give the legislators and him their views on how the

matter should be handled.

Governor Daniel is strongly opposed to the adoption of any sales tax plan designed to raise the major portion of this needed revenue. He used his influence in the regular session to block a move in this direction.

"But," said the governor, "if this is really what a majority of the people want, I don't see how I can go on fighting it."

He believes, however, that a very limited sales tax, which he terms "selection excise taxes," on only more expensive items, with the balance to be raised from gas pipeline taxes and increased interstate corporation franchise taxes, would be more fair and more acceptable to most Texans.

Only bill which came close to passing the Legislature was one in which the main money-raising feature was a retail sales tax on

items costing 25 cents and more, with food, medicine and farm necessities exempted. It also levied increased gas and corporation franchise taxes. Speaker James Turman cast the crucial vote that prevented the bill's being sent to the governor.

Actually, the difference between the governor and those voting for the sales tax "package" is mostly one of degree. Governor Daniel grants the need for some sales (or excise) taxes, but feels that they should be stringently limited. A majority of the Legislature cast votes indicating they felt Texas has reached the point where only a broad-based "growth tax," such as the sales tax, can raise enough money to meet the state's increasing needs.

Now it is the people's turn to say what they think. If enough speak up, the legislature will have little difficulty in deciding what to do when it reconvenes July 10.

At that late hour, getting broad agreement in the Legislature will be more important than passing a bill that suits the governor. Bills passed by only a simple majority cannot become effective until 90 days after the session ends, but bills passed by a two-thirds majority of both houses can take effect immediately. That late in the summer, the Legislature will need to get a two-thirds vote for immediate effect so there will be money and authorization to keep the state going after the new fiscal year begins September 1.

And a two-thirds majority is also sufficient to override a governor's veto.

### OIL ON TROUBLED WATERS

A number of lawmakers had their "backs up" before the governor made his statewide "report to the people" after the regular session closed. But the governor's message smoothed some feathers.

Many lawmakers expected Daniel to roast the Legislature for its failure to take care of money matters during the 140-day session. They had their hot replies all ready for press release.

Instead, Governor Daniel admiringly praised the lawmakers as one of the hardest working legislatures he had ever seen. He even singled out for kind words some leaders who had opposed his program.

It was those infernal lobbyists who were to blame, said the governor. He described hordes of lobbyists, choking the hallways and bothering members while they were in session.

Now it's the lobbyists who are riled.

Governor Daniel has announced that he will name a new citizen's committee to study the state's fiscal problems and make recommendations before the special session begins.

### GRAND GESTURE

Before adjourning, the Senate gave approval to a \$2,600,000,000 general appropriations bill for the two years beginning September 1.

But without passage of a money-raising bill to back it up, appropriations had no meaning.

Senate adopted the appropriations conference committee report—a plan that called for spending \$385,500,000 from general revenue, compared to the present \$320,000,000 general revenue appropriation. Welfare programs, the state hospital system, junior colleges and the state senior college and university system would be among the main beneficiaries.

Senate also passed an equally ineffective 8810 a year raise for school teachers before adjourning.

All was for naught, however, when the tax bill failed to pass.

### 14 AMENDMENTS PROPOSED

Texas voters can get ready for a bumper crop of 14 proposed constitutional amendments to be on the November ballot in 1962.

Some of the amendments are of major importance; some are only local in effect and application. Among them are proposals to:

1. Increase maximum possible yearly payments to the permanently disabled from \$1,500,000 to \$2,500,000.
2. Allow the state water development board to purchase water storage space in reservoirs constructed by other units of government, such as the federal government.
3. Permit the Veterans Land Board to sell forfeited land to

4. Authorize the Legislature to provide for "trial de novo" (trial anew) in appeals from decisions of state agencies.

5. Allow the Legislature to name successors to officials knocked out by a major catastrophe such as enemy attack.

6. Raise the present \$47,000,000 a year ceiling on public welfare payments to \$52,000,000.

7. Allow the Legislature to set up hospital districts without a special constitutional amendment for each one.

8. Allow the Legislature to delegate to local government control of traffic, parking and sanitation on public beaches.

### NEW POWER FOR PROBERS

Future witnesses before legislative investigating committees can be compelled to tell the truth on face perjury penalties under a measure that passed both houses.

Last year the perjury conviction of former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders was voided by the courts on grounds the anti-perjury statute did not cover statements to legislative committees.

This bill spells out the right of legislative committees to make investigations and makes it a penal offense (two to ten years) to lie deliberately to such a committee.

### RATLIFF IS PRO TEM

Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford was elected by his senate colleagues to serve as president pro tempore of the Senate for the interval between the regular session's end and the special session's beginning.

President of the Senate presides in the absence of the lieutenant governor and is second in line of succession to the governor. He usually serves as "governor for a day" when both the governor and the lieutenant governor are out of the state.

Ratliff, a radio station owner, has been in the Legislature since 1951, in the Senate since 1955.

### Short Snorts

Texas Aeronautics Commission, which past Legislatures have threatened to abolish, fared much better this year. Bills were passed broadening the Commission's scope of activity and allocating to it a portion of the unclaimed tax refunds on aviation gasoline.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has called a meeting June 22 of those interested in working out small loan company regulation. Efforts to pass such a bill this past session bogged down completely.

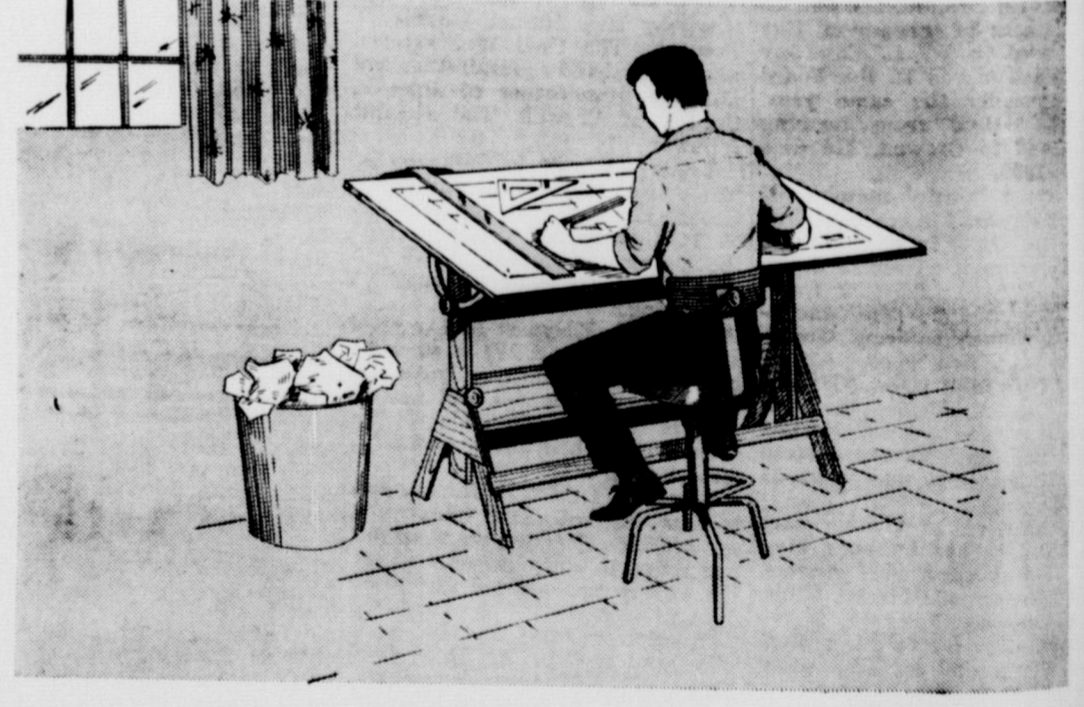
State Treasurer Jesse James reported the deficit in the state's general revenue fund increased during the past month to \$69,641,536. A shortage of \$63,000,000 is generally expected for the end of the fiscal year August 31.

State Supreme Court sheared off some of the privileges of lawyer-legislators to get court cases in which they are involved postponed until after legislative business is complete. It said the law doesn't cover such preliminary activity as taking depositions before the actual trial.



State penitentiary would be practically emptied, one lawyer predicted, if a plea presently before the Court of Criminal Appeals is granted. Defendant contends his conviction was illegal because the trial judge had not paid his dues in the State Bar of Texas. State's attorneys answer that the law requiring lawyers to be paid up in the bar as a requisite for participating in court matters had not been passed at the time the trial judge was in arrears.

### Good Management Needed to Reduce Cotton Root Rot

Cotton losses due to root rot can be reduced. But, points out Joe Burkett, county agent, plans must be made and carried out over a period of years to be most effective.

A combination of practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results. These include the growing of resistant crops in rotation; turning under a large tonnage of organic matter prior to the growing of a cotton crop and deep plowing during June, July and August of infected land.

Burkett advises that none of these practices can be counted on for effective control when used alone. Crop rotation is of little value if susceptible weeds are permitted to grow in resistant crops. Turned under organic matter needs to be decaying at its maximum during the early flowering stage of the cotton to be most effective. Rains immediately following the deep plowing will cancel out the expected benefits from this practice. Therefore, adds Burkett, the combination of practices is best.

Producing early cotton will, in most instances, help the plants escape root rot damage. The control of cotton seedling diseases, he says, will help get the plants off to a fast start and aid in setting the early crop.

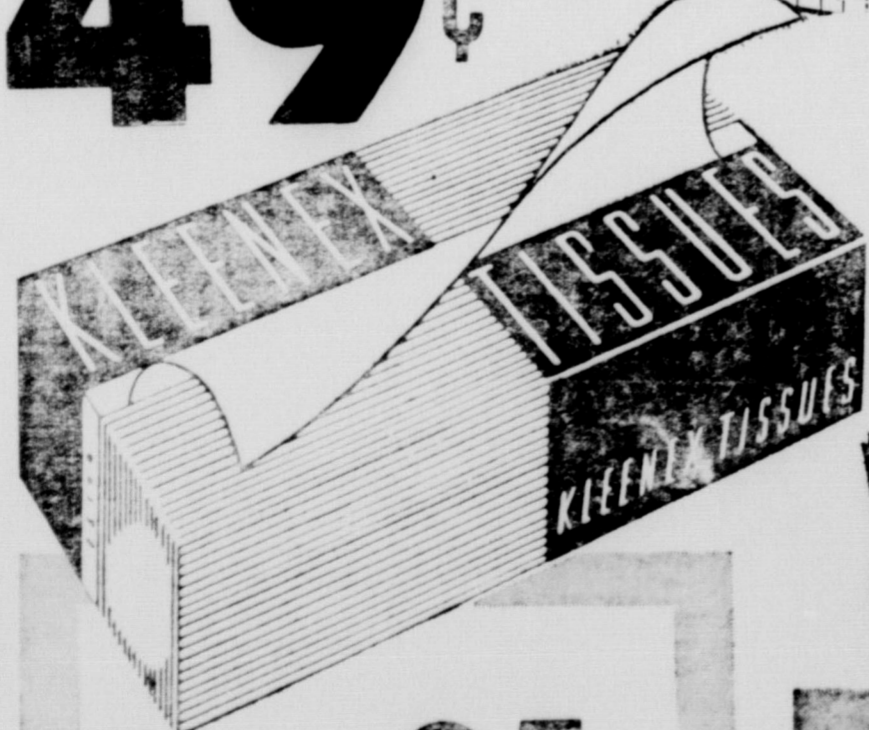

# Report Released on Tuberculosis by State Committee

A comprehensive report on tuberculosis control resources in Texas was distributed this week by Gov. Price Daniel's coordinating committee on tuberculosis.

Another step toward the governor's instructions to "launch a frontal attack against this disease." Publication of the factual, no-frills report marks the first time in history that information on TB control activities of seven state-wide agencies has been compiled into a single volume.

"Despite advances made in recent years against tuberculosis as a killer of Texans, the disease must still be regarded as a major menace from the point of view of its disabling effect on the patient, and its costly interval of treatment," the governor wrote in a foreword to the report.

State Health Commissioner J. E. Peavy said the report was "designed to meet an obvious need for information concerning tuberculosis control services available from the seven agencies most intimately involved." Dr. Peavy is chairman of the coordinating committee.

Contributors to the report were the Texas Tuberculosis Association, Texas Medical Association, State Department of Health, Board for Hospitals and Special Schools, Department of Public Welfare, Veterans Administration, and the Texas Education Agency.

Copies of the publication have gone to city and county health officers, county judges, county medical society components, TB hospitals, welfare workers, and others.

The report contains such diverse information as the location of 92 local tuberculosis associations, control functions performed by the State Health Department's sections on laboratories, preventive medicine and special health services, and the location of 35 public TB clinics.

It covers eligibility for admission to state and Veterans Administration TB hospitals, financial to dependent children and rehabilitation of tuberculosis patients.

Besides Dr. Peavy, committee members are Dr. C. J. Ruillmann of the State Board for Hospitals and Special Schools; Dr. J. W. Edgar, commissioner of education; John H. Winters, commissioner of public welfare; Dr. Elliott Mendenhall, chairman of the Texas Medical Association's committee on tuberculosis; and Dr. J. Edward Johnson, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association.

# Better Management Can Increase Income From Wildlife

Everyone likes to make money, and here is a possibility that many Texas farmers and ranchers may have overlooked. It could be possible to increase income by managing and harvesting the wildlife resources on the land.

A new Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication discusses and explains how this can be accomplished. There is one important point to remember, however. All wild animals in Texas are the property of the people living in the state. Game animals, including birds, fish and mammals, either dead or alive, cannot be sold. Landowners, may however, lease their land for hunting and fishing privileges.

Naturally, the better the hunting or fishing, the more people will be willing to pay for the privilege. This is where the management part of the program comes in. By providing, or leaving, adequate food and cover for the land animals and by properly stocking and managing the pond or lake, the landowner can insure a plentiful population of game animals.

Other factors that help determine the price of the lease are the number of people to be accommodated, facilities available and accessibility. Many landowners, especially those with fishing waters, have found it profitable to make additional facilities available to the sportsmen. Boat and cabin rental, bait selling and other extras can increase the owner's income.

Another important point to remember is the matter of licenses. Persons who sell hunting leases are required to purchase a shooting preserve license, and persons who sell bait are required to purchase a bait dealer's license. These may be obtained from the Texas Game and Fish Commission, Austin.

A copy of the Extension Service publication MP-463, "Increasing Your Income Through Wildlife Management," may be obtained from the local county agent.

# Polio Could Be Virtually Eliminated

Polio could be virtually eliminated with the currently available Salk vaccine if the population was adequately inoculated, according to four Baylor University re-

searchers whose report appears in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association. Of 100 confirmed cases of paralytic polio which occurred in Houston in 1958 and 1959 only three occurred in patients who had received three or more of the Salk vaccine shots. The vaccine also protected against aseptic meningitis—a nonparalytic form of polio.

The first two states to join the original 13 in the Union were Vermont in 1791 and Kentucky in 1792.

Livestock and Meat Imports Lower in 1960

During 1960, U. S. livestock and meat imports were equal to 6.5 per cent of the total domestic production compared with 8.6 per cent for both 1958 and 1959, reports Joe Burkett, county agent. Beef and veal imports declined 23 per cent during 1960. Imports of live animals during 1960 declined five per cent to a total of 664,000 head. Due to lower cattle prices, the reduction in import value was considerably greater than the reduction in import numbers. The value of cattle imported during 1960 was 50 per cent below the peak year of 1958, says Burkett.
