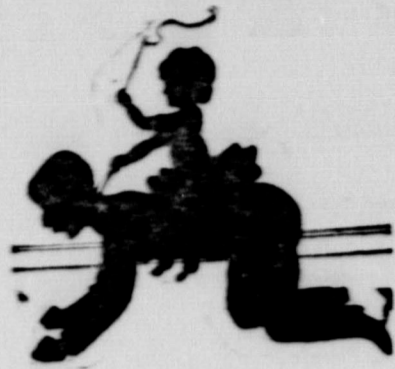
MARGARET MUSINGS

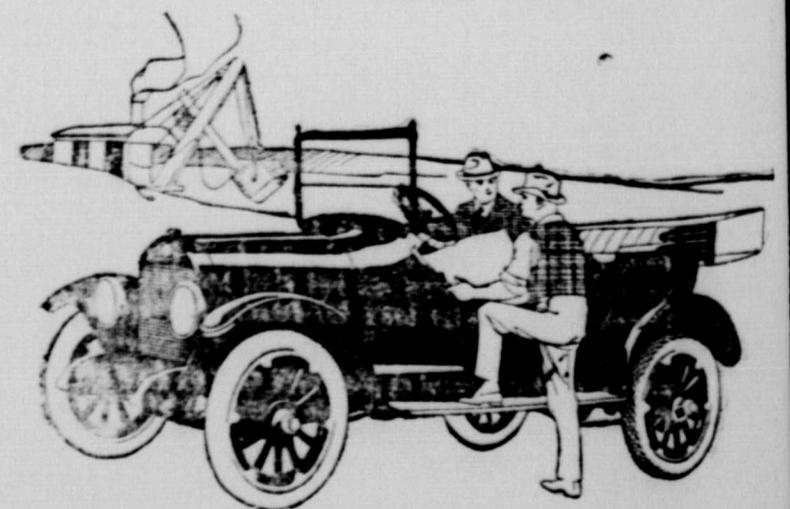

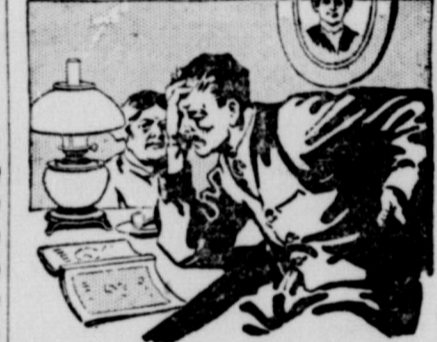

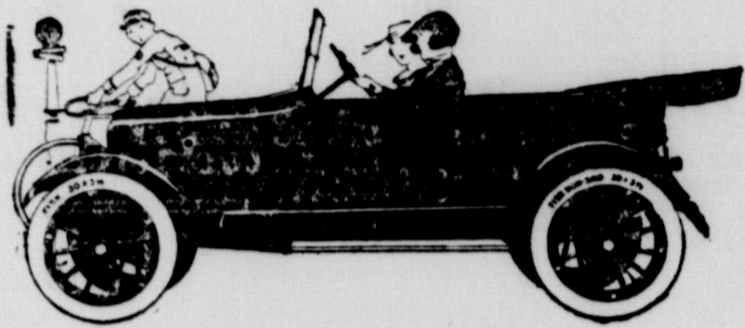

A NAVAL UNDERSTANDING

Several years before the great world war prominent naval authorities in Great Britain wanted to come to a naval understanding with Germany as to the relative size of their fleets, and through this understanding obviate naval rivalry and the danger of war it brought about.

There are some prominent folks in Great Britain today who are urging that the United States and Great Britain agree upon some common policy in regards to their naval programs, and that this be done speedily to prevent excessive competition and unnecessary outlay of public funds by these two countries. Naval rivalry and conflict of interest are two things certain to lead to war sooner or later, and, fortunately, there is little present conflicting interests between these two great Anglo-Saxon democracies.

There should be no such difficulties in the way of an understanding between our country and Great Britain as there was with Germany and Great Britain. True, Great Britain has a larger navy now, and we might build one stronger than hers, but the United States and Great Britain ought to find some way to regulate naval construction between themselves, and prevent useless expenditure. This could only be done, if other powers like Japan, France, etc., also agreed to a similar program. It would be foolish for our country and Great Britain to restrict building while Japan enlarged her fleet.
