According to an exchange Collin county farmers have got together in the Collin county council of agriculture and have agreed on a wage scale to be paid in that county this year for farm work. The scale is \$2.25 a day and board or \$3.00 a day without board. The question of farm labor, and especially the pay for farm labor, is one of seriousness with demands in some instances of as much as \$1 an hour, and such prices, if insisted on, mean nothing less than abandonment of farms simply because there is nothing left for the farmer .- Fort Worth Record.

The fact of the business is that Colin County farmer can not as well afford to pay \$2.25 per day for farm labor as the West Texas farmer can to pay \$5.00 per day. In the first place he is farming on lands priced at from \$150 to \$250 per acre, and the crop he raises on that high priced land will gross him no more than West Texas land that sells for \$50 and \$60 per acre. It is bound to net him much less when even half the expense of harvesting is deducted and the interest on his investment is figuered. Lands in Collin County are too high. The best evidence of that fact is that the farmers find farming unprofitable as stated in the above reproduction from the Record.

Of course, the Collin County farmer's land would not be too high if he could sell his wheat at \$4.00 per bushel, but can a suffering, consuming public reconcile itself to the prices they would have to pay for flour, if wheat were selling at \$4.00, if such price were put on that product just to enable the Collin County farmer to do profitable farming?



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

The spring has been cold and backward all over the section traveled. The first two-horse planters seen in the field was May 6th, and up to the present time only a small per cent of corn has been planted and there is still some plowing to be done. Very little garden stuff is up yet. Heavy cold rain the 11th and 12th, a white frost with a little ice the 13th. The fruit trees are all in bloom but at the present time they do not seem hurt. It is cold and cloudy today.

We are in the section of country where wife and I lived until 1888. We visited the old place where we commenced married life, putting in 18 hours out of 24 at busy farm work, milking not less than 20 cows. At first this was all set in pans or crocks. All had to be hand skimmed and churned, the butter selling from 6 to 10 cents per pound. The man who now owns the old place milks on an average of 30 cows with a milking machine run by a gas engine, hauls his milk to a milk canning factory, and besides the milk and butter used by a large family, he sold last year \$5,300.00 worth of milk at the factory. The farmers here have a shipping association now and all stock and grain is sold that way. The man with one hog or cow ready for the market has the same chance as the man with a lot. We find plenty of work here and will stay until the first week in June, then we go on to the Iowa farm. We are both well and will be glad to hear



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



THREE STATES FIGHT TO SAVE ORIENT

Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas Towns Will Be Ruined if These Trains Are Permitted to Stop

San Angelo, Texas, May 25 .- All of West Texas, parts of Oklahoma and Kansas, has its back against the wall and is fighting for its very existence. September 1, this year, the Orient railroad, which serves a territory 800 from Wichita, Kan., to Alpine, on the Mexican border, will close down, unless the Interommerce Commission comes assistance and gives this road from the 300 million revolving fund made available by the recent railroad legislation.

The Orient has a just claim against this money, as it was on a paying basis for the first time in its history to being taken over by the Rail-Administration. Its improvement under the receivership of W. T. Kemper of Kansas City and the management of Albert De Bernardi, of Wichita, had placed the road in a position that within a few years it would been on a sound footing.

But the war came with it disasters and under Federal control all the Orifreight was diverted to other its engines taken to pull other trains, its line used only to haul empty ars to the coast and its shops to rewild the locomotives of some compet-When it was thrown back on own resources, its employees were scattered and its business in someone lse's hands.

Losing \$100,000 a Month Today it is losing a hundred thousand dollars a month. When the Federal guarantee period is over, not a train will be able to leave its destination and West Texas and the country that it serves through Kansas and Oklahoma will be left high and dry.

Eighty representatives from tweny-one towns served by the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient Railroad voted man at a special meeting called at the St. Angelus Hotel in San Angelo, Texas, that the Orient Railroad was an essential railroad-not only to the protection of millions of dollars worth of property in West Texas, but should this road even temporarily cease to operate it would directly affect the entire nation as a whole by reason of the fact that it would be impossible to continue the great cattle, sheep and goat industry on anything ike its present scale.
