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CONTRACT LET FOR **MATERIAL AND WORK** FOR LAYING OF PIPE

Cost to Be \$40,000 and Work to Be Completed Within Ninety Days

The city is still amking good progress in the water proposition. Last week the contract was closed with the Pittsburgh & Desmoines Steel Company for the material and the work necessary to put in the pipe and tower. The company agreed to furnish all the material for \$36,000, or to furnish it and put it in for \$40,-000. This last proposition was thought the best one and contract was made to that effect. The company is to use as much home labor as possible in doing this work, and it is to be completed within 90 days after the finances are available.

In this connection it might be said that the bonds have passed the attorney general with his approval and are to be sent to New York to the bond attorney of the people who bought for his approval. As soon as this journey of the bonds can be made the city should have in hand the money with which to finance the water works proposition. Decker Magee, who went before the attorney general last week with the bonds, returned Sunday from Austin, and has reasonable assurance that it will be a matter of only a few days until all the necessary details will be completed. As soon as we can know when the bonds have been approved by the bond attorney, we shall be in position to give something definite as to when Crowell will have water.

In the meantime work is going forward with splendid success on the well and the big reservoir. Each day's work gives added assurance that an abundant supply of water will be had when the well is finished.




