REPORT OF KLAN

Further Acts at Beaumont, It Is Predicted, Will Cause Bloodshed

Beaumont, Texas, Nov. 27 .- Deploring the fact that a number of county and city officials are members of the Beaumont klan and declaring that further acts of the local Ku Klux body would most certainly lead to bloodshed, the Jefferson County Grand Jury adjourned Saturday morning, without returning any indictments against members of the klan. It was declared that the evidence was insufficient to warrant indictments. It is said that many citizens and several officers who were called before the grand jury refused to answer questions regarding membership of the body, standing on their constitutional rights.

A portion of the report reads: "We have found no bills of indictment for the tarring and feathering of J. S. Paul and R. F. Scott, because we have been unable to secure sufficient evidence upon which to base the same or that would, in our opinions, support

"We deplore the fact that in our community such violations of law and disregard for our constitution could have occurred. Such occurrences are wholly inexcusable and unjustified; are not only violation of our statute laws, but aim at the very foundation of our Government and the destruction of its institutions

Acts Condemned

"We condemn these acts most emphatically and regret our inability to bring the perpetrators to justice.

"We have made the most rigid investigation possible of the charges that the Ku Klux Klan has been responsible for, and participated in administering punishment to our citizens, and fomenting religious dissens tion and strife. If such be true, we condemn the practice.



Washington, Nov. 20 .- That a tour of the United States by representatives of foreign Governments attending the arms conference, as well as by the newspaper writers, such tour to be at the expense of the United States Government, would be of large benefit to the country was stated by Representative Hudspeth of Texas. who has introduced one of the resolutions now before Congress to provide

Senator Stanfield of Oregon has such a resolution before the Senate the difference being that the Hudspeth resolution contemplates that the tour shall be westward by the Northern route, and returning by the Southern route from the Pacific coast, with a stop at El Paso, where the welcome would be enlarged by official representatives of the Mexican Government.

Mr. Hudspeth will ask the House Committee on Foreign Affairs to report his resolution and he will use it as a basis for a speech in the House. The plan, as pointed out, would afford first hand information to the foreign representatives and the writers of the extent of the territory of the United States, its resources and population.

"Many foreigners regard the United States as being divided into forty-eight separate countries, each independent of the Union," said Mr. Hudspeth. "Some think that in traveling across the country one has to cross many frontiers, and that there is no unity of purpose of the States when it comes to government and nationality. The visitors of course understand differently, but they might be impressed anew with the fact that its resources are almost without limit, which is one of the pur poses of the proposed tour.




