HOW TO KEEP CHICKS FROM DY-ING IN THE SHELL

The one great trouble in artificial incubation is chicks dying in the shell. Of all the poor hatches the largest number are due to dead chicks in the shell at hatching time.

The hatching time is the most critical. At this time it is necessary to have plenty of heat and moisture. The heat is necessary to get the chicks out quickly, and the moisture to keep them from drying to the shell. A temperature of 104 to 105 at hatching time is not injurious; but it must not be allowed to run above 105 degrees. The moisture at this time is very important. It is well to add extra moisture at hatching time by sprinkling. We sprinkle the eggs, when about four or five are pipped, by taking the eggs with water the same temperature of the eggs (103 degrees), trays out and sprinkling the eggs liberally.

At hatching time, the inside of incubator should show some moisture. In case of glass door incubators, drops of water should form on the inside of the door. If this is not the case, there is not sufficient moisture in the machine.

We recommend, if possible, flooding the incubator room once a day, during the entire period of incubation, much moisture in the incubator room; but it is easily possible to get too much inside the incubator, especially if it is added before the hatching time.

Sometimes if the hatch is delayed and appears dry we place one medium sized sponge, for every 75 eggs, soaking in scalding hot water under the

Farm Statistics for Foard Co.

The census of 1920 gives us some interesting information which we are here giving to our readers with respect to the farms of Foard County. This is taken from the Government statistics which have been sent out.

There are in the county 629 farms, as against 718 in 1910 and 210 in 1900. Of these 616 are owned by males and county are native whites while 8 are foreign born whites.

The number of farms under 3 acres, of the county bureau. none; those from 3 to 9 acres, 3; from 10 to 19 acres, 7; from 20 to 49 acres, 23; from 50 to 99 acres, 97; from 100 to 174 acres, 180; from 175 to 259 acres, 97; from 260 to 499 acres, 121; from 500 to 999 acres, 68; from 1,000 up, 32.

The land area of the county is approximately 391,680 acres, of which 373,160 are in farms, while the improved land in farms number 95,275 acres, as against 73,218 in 1910. The per cent of the land acrea which is in farms is 95.3, while the per cent of farm land improved is only 25.5. The average is 151.5.

The value of all farm property in the county in round numbers is \$11,-000,000, as against \$6,500,000 in 1910. The farm buildings in 1920 were valued at more than \$800,000, as against \$400,000 ten years ago. Implements and machinery are valued at more than \$500,000, as against \$153,000 ten years ago. The live stock on the farms is over \$1,400,000, as against \$813,000 in 1910. The average value of all property per farm is \$18,000, the land and buildings being \$15,000. Of the farms operated by the owners there are 331. The farmers owning the entire farms in the county are 238. There are 247 share tenants in the county, 29 croppers and 8 standing renters.




