> New Orleans-On a basis of 18.50 for middling upland short staple cotton the premiums for middling prem ium staples average about as follows 1 1-16, 125 points on; 1 1-8, 500 points on: 1 3-16, 950 points on: 1 1-4, 1250 points on.

That means that the long staple cotton should bring on the local market from \$1.25 to \$15.50 a bale more than the short cotton. The scale is the longest staple cotton grown in Foard County and furnishes staples of these lengths. It should therefore bring the premiums above specified. brought about a decline in physical education. Here our curve is lowered. The playground movement came to Boston in 1886. It was hurried for the next ten years. This changes the direction of our curve to a horizontal position. Establishing "The Jahn Dickens playground" in Philidelphia in 1898 marks the next rise in it. The rise is very gradual until the World War which brings the curve almost to a perpendicular line.

A comparison of this graph to one representing better breeding and better development of plants and animals shows that a great deal more attention has been given the latter two. Similar graphs on the growth of other industries will show that still more interest has been taken in commercial enterprise. All of this is good but we ought to realize that the proper physical development of our boys and girls is a Christian duty.

Until the World War few people knew anything about the great number of young men and boys who have physical defects. Statistics show that thirty percent of the drafted men were rejected on the account of physical condition. Are we doing our duty as teachers and parents when such a percent of our boys are lacking in physical development? I maintain the position that we are not. Our playgrounds should serve as gymnasiums and with their abundance of pure air and sunshine they make the best gymnasiums in the world. Every school ground in Foard County ought to have a system of supervised play. For the older boys and girls the interscholastic games
