Federal Law Forbids Klans' Illigal Practices

The boldness of the Ku Klux Klan and its operations throughout the country has brought forth an investigation by the New York World and y important revelations are being opened to the public. The light of is being flashed on the Klan so that its leaders are writhing in a state of misery and are threatening damage suits against the World and other papers because of what they have printed. In the meantime the revelations continue. A great many truths are going to come to light. It developes that there is a federal law against such actions as the Ku Klux Klan are guilty of. This law has been in effect since 1871. The Klan had its originai birth during reconstruction days after the Civil War and their crimes became so numerous and so atrocious that President Grant called for action on the part of the National Congress for the passage of a law that would take Klan cases out of the local courts and place them in the federal courts. This was done and that law is in effect today. Relative to this we here quote from Leslie's:

The Ku Klux Klan Law

There is a federal law against Ku Klux Klanism. It was passed in 1871 after Congress had investigated the white riders and their activities. This law calls night-riding "rebellion." It makes it a "high crime" to "go upon the highways or upon the premises of another with the intent to deprive any person of the protection of the laws to hinder state authorities from providing such protection; to impede the course of justice in any manner."

President Grant was, and other presidents likewise are, authorized by this law to employ the Army and Navy, if necessary, to restore order in any state where "rebellion" exists. if the local authorities fail to protect States guarantees liberty of persons, citizens from offenses or marauders, The President may suspend the writ of habeas corpus in any state where local officials cannot preserve the \$5,000, the money to go to the widow, his life in "such outrage."





The Baialaika.

The balalaika is not an entirely unknown instrument in England. The interest taken in all that pertains to Russia, especially in all that relates to art, has enabled this variation of the ancient Persian tambour to find a welcome in London. It had a season of great success in the later nineties, after its revival in Russia. For centuries it had been neglected, but the great Russian musician, Andreev, saw in it the possibilities of expressing the national music of his country and formed the first Balalaika orchestra, which played before Nicholas the Second in 1898, and became the forerunner of the popularity of the instrument not only in Russia, but in other countries where it was played.

Bull Became Municipal Idol.

In 1835 a Barcelona bull became a municipal idol, the object of a regular Apis worship. When he had killed five men and ten or twelve horses, the yard around his stable was thronged with devotees, though his keeper, fearing foul play, would admit no stranger to the interior of the sanctuary. After his last victory, on the festival of San Antonio, the crowd went almost crazy with excitement under deafening cheers and a continual shout of "Bollos por el toro!" (Cakes for the bull); a libation of reals came down like a shower, and when the victor was dragged out of the gate a young girl who had got a prize in a pantomime, leaned over the balcony, and at the risk of being impaled, crowned the gory brute with her own garland.

"I read it," the latter admitted, "but I didn't believe it and went in to find out. I discovered that I was right, for he can be and was." - Indianapolis News.




