



Marcus, Iowa, Aug. 15, 1922. Editor News and Friends:

Wife and I often think of the many good friends in good old Foard County and would be greatly pleased to meet with them.

Glad to know that the city water works system is a success and hope you may get the Lee Highway and that the Orient R. R. may get on a sure foundation.

It has been 21 years since this section of Iowa has had as dry a spring. Oats are now all threshed and the average yield was 30 bushels to the acre, about half the average for many years. Corn is very promising but needs a rain soon to insure a big crop. The second crop of red clover is now being cut and is fair. Pastures are also fair. People complain of hard times, yet the roads are full of automobiles. These machines alone in this county cost at least one third as much as the entire country would have sold for 45 years ago. At the county Farm Bureau picnic there were by actual count over 1500 automobiles on the ground and they were coming and going all the time.

The Farm Bureau is a live wire here at the present time and the town people take great interest in it. Each township has a strong organization where the farmers and the town people meet once each month for a social and literary gathering. During the warm weather these meetings are held mostly on some farmer's lawn, and in addition to songs, recitations and lectures the county organization has a fine picture machine. The county agent has charge of this. The pictures are mostly of an educational nature. Here's hoping that on organization has at last been found that has



Okaboji, the most popular of the string of lakes, has a shore line 38 miles and at the present time is nearly surrounded with cottages. There are thousands of them, many being owned by people living in other states. There are four large steamers on the lake, and many motor boats, some that go 45 miles per hour, and row boats by the hundreds. Okaboji has miles of sandy, gravel beaches with water clear as crystal fed from springs and in places 250 feet deep. Arnold's Park, the most popular, has all sorts of amusements usually found at fairs. There are two large roller skating rinks and two very fine dance halls, both well supplied with seats for those who like to watch these amusements. Then there are two large picture theatres. At other points the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. have summer camps. Spirit Lake near has a large Masonic temple. Camp Foster is a summer soldiers' camp. Many different churches have camp meeting places. Large glacial boulders are still very numerous all over this section of the state.

Apples are very plentiful here now, and grapes are beginning to ripen, as also are tomatoes. We are now havfrom what is known as the ever-bearing variety. They are not quite as productive as varieties that produce only one crop a year.

The groves and trees are wonderful now. This was a prairie country with only an occasional grove of small trees when we bought here in 1879. Now beautiful groves of large trees are on nearly every farm and the voung trees are coming from the seed drops as they do in the natural groves. We have many ash, elm and maple trees 18 to 24 inches in diameter with some cottonwood four feet in diameter that we planted in 1885.

Potatoes will be less than an average crop this year. They are slow sale now at \$1.00 per bushel. With best wishes for all.





Round Worms

The most common form of round worm is about one to four inches in length and generally found in the digestive system. The most common place for the round worm is in the intestines. Many different treatments are recommended. vorm as a rule is easily expelled from the digestive system. This cannot be said about the tape worm. The following treatment is recommended by the Agricultural Experiment Station of California: For 190 birds steep one pound of finely chopped tobacco stems for two hours in water enough to cover them. Mix the stems and liquid with one half the usual amount of ground feed. The day previous withhold all feed, giving nothing but hours after it is cleaned up, give them one fourth of the usual ration of ground feed mixed with water in which Epsom salts has been dissolved at the rate of 11 ounces for each 100 birds. The treatment should be re-

peated 10 days later. To prevent a new infestation of worms, it is best to move the poultry houses and yards onto uncontaminated ground. If this is impossible, clean the houses and yards thoroughly and remove the fertilizer to a place unfrequented by the fowls. The round worm eggs sometimes are hard to destroy. Keep the houses and yards clean and dry. Use plenty of lime

on the yards. The round worms are cylindrical in shape, tapering slightly towards the They are white to pinkish white in color. They multiply by producing eggs which pass out with the droppings, and then may come in contact with food and thus reinfest other birds when the food is eaten.

Other treatment recommended ten grains of areca nut, mixed with shorts and water. Make the mixture about the consistency of batter. The above treatment is for one fowl. Enough of this may be prepared to treat the entire flock.

Individual treatment may be given by dosing each bird with turpentine and olive oil. Give each bird a tea-spoonful of olive oil and turpentine separately.

The Tape Worm The tape worm is a flat segmented worm sometimes many inches long. They are more serious than the round worm. They lay many eggs which are passed off in the droppings and the infestation is thus spread. The

The Bureau of Animal Industry recommends dosing each bird with a teaspoonful of castor oil to which has been added ten to twenty drops of oil of chenopodium (American worm seed oil) according to the weight of the bird. The medicine should be given after a fast and repeated in 10



Gape Worm

Gapes in chickens is a trouble caused by the gape worms infesting the internal sides of the windpipe causing the fowl to frequently be gasping for breath. Some times the worms increase in such numbers as to suffocate the chicks. It is most common withhold all feed, giving mount, water and milk to drink. After the birds have been starved for 24 hours, gape worm reproduces by laying large numbers of eggs, which in some way then shieken either directly or indirectly. Supply and Distribution of Cotton in the United States

The Department of Commerce announces that, according to census returns, 5,911,914 bales of cotton, exclusive of linters, were consumed in the United States during the year ending July 31, 1922, compared with 4,892,672 bales for 1921, and 6,419,734 bales for 1920. The exports of cotton, exclusive of linters, during the year amounted to 6,184,326 bales compared with 5,744,698 bales for 1921, and 6,545,326 bales for 1920. The carry-over of cotton in the United States on July 31, 1922, was 2,828,-186 bales compared with 6,534,360 bales for 1921, and 3,563,162 bales for 1920. Based on the average consumption for the past year, the mill stocks, 1,215,103 bales, will meet the consumptive requirements of the domestic mills for ten weeks.

ACT SUSPENDED FOR ORIENT ROAD

Washington, Aug. 28 .- As an additional measure of aid to the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway, the Interstate Commerce Commission has authorized suspension for 90 days of the fourth section of the Interstate Commerce Commission act. Under this the Orient may continue to charge existing rates on various commodities at all points on its line where it faces competition from another railroad and higher rates for like service to intermediate points.

Two weeks ago the commission approved the application of Receiver W. T. Kemper for increased divisions in freight rates from business handled in conjunction with intersecting and connecting lines. These increased divisions ranged from 10 to 30 per cent. 
