If you feel that you are entitled to extra gasoline that is actually necessary to carry on your business necessary to the war effort and ber, Jerry is company clerk, welfare of the nation, fill out this application blank and Mail it to or leave it with the Ratio nBoard Office at the court house as soon as possible, but please do not try, to meet with the Board as they will be busy trying to pass on the emergescy applications before rationing starts.

Please do not ask for more supplemental gasoline tha nis actually necessary. The government is trying to conserve the rubber secessary for the war effort including the necessary rubber for the support of the army and the welfare of the nation. Our officials have worked out these plans which they the war. Our patriotic duty is to cooperated with them 100 percent.

NOTICE TO GASOLINE AND INTERMEDIATE DISTRIBUTORS

Instructions, forms, etc. have been mailed to a number of dealers of gasoline in the County, but a complete list of such dealers was not available. If you are a dealer or a wholesaler of gasoline and have not received the instructions, etc., please call at the office of the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board, or contact the office by mail, and a supply of the forms will be sent to you.

Some of the forms mentioned in the Instructions to Gasoline Dealers have not been received by the Board, but will be mailed as soon as they are received.

Inquiries have been made as to the procedure to take in becoming a tire inspector for passenger automobiles. Any dealers desiring to become a tire inspector must write to Judge B. H. Freeland. who will in turn make such appointment.

Applications for non-highway vehicles and non-highway use, fleet and official vehicle use and for transport mileage rationing are available at the office of the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board. All applications for gasoline contained in the vehicles named above must be completed the applicant. The applications may be mailed to the Board after November 22.

The Certificate of War Necesity ssued by the Office of Defense Transportation must accompany all applications for transport rationing. In the event application has been made for such War Necessity Record, but has not been received from the O. D. T., gasoline cannot be allowed until the War Necessity Record is received. Gasoline will not be allowed unless the application is accompanied by the War Necesity Record.
