

# hen You Build

Consider Value as Well as Cost

A dollar saved in the cost of material when you build may cost you ten dollars in repairs later on. Many people overlook this fact until it is too late.





# Scrub Vs. Standard

(All Rights Reserved)

Texas is a great poultry producing state, in fact the fifth greatest state in the Union. This is a good showing and one that we can justly be proud of. There is one thing, however, that we must actually be ashamed of and that is that Texas leads the world in the number of scrub chickens. Texas ranks fifth only from the standpoint of numbers. From the standpoint of value, Texas is so far down the line, that the statisticians refuse to rank her even in the first ten states. This is not idle talk, but actually true in every sense of the word. The average Texas hen is worth only 35 cents, while the average New York hen is worth 75 cents or more than twice as much. Why? Why? May every one ask. The only answer because Texas farmers as a rule believe in scrub chickens, scrub dogs, scrub cats, scrub everything else, including the gate if any there is to be found. Why? Why this more or less haphazard way of doing things? Why do so many people keep scrub, dukes mixture, crazy quilt or just eating chickens? We believe it rather hard to answer this question. The answer that seems to be most popular is, "Our grandfather kept scrub chickens and they were good enough for him, so why should they not fill our requirements." A most wonderful way of reasoning. A way of reasoning that only too many people indulge in. The less we think the less we want to think, and what is worse the less we can actually

Some people have made little if any progress since that time; and what is worse, is they have no ambition to make any progress. They are not interested, and are 100 per cent dead to the world. 

Seed should be sown at the rate 1 of about 15 lbs. per acre. The cost of the seed is from 10 to 15 cents per

It is Mr. Oats opinion that within three years Sweet Clover will be as generally grown as Sudan Grass.

Mr. Oats states further in his findmes relative to securing a stand: "In previous years some men kars had difficulty in getting a stand but entials in getting a good stand are, first, a firm seed bed, and second, early seeding. January and February rather than late March. April and May. It is not a good idea to sow on freshly plowed land, or wait too late in the spring to sow. On nine farms we found that clover had been sowed without any preparation on land that has been in maize, kaffir, etc. This of course was a firm seed bed and a reasonably good seed hed was secured, about 86 per cent perfect. On land of this kind the seed was sown and then harrowed with a tooth harrow.'





Replace Mongrels with Standard Bred Fowls

In view of the fact that it is very easy to get a start with standardbred fowls, and at only a small expense these exists no good reasons for keeping mongrel chickens, excepting these, namely, haphazardness and indifference
