



High School Agricultural Class Has Successful Experimental Farm

The agriculture class of the C. H. S. has been doing some exceptionally good work for the past year.

The class has done some excellent work in the laboratory. They have made a number of seed corn tests for several of the progressive farmers of the community. These tests were very succssful.

The class has an experimental garden out at the farm of I. M. Cates. which has proved to be successful. Last Wednesday at noon the class was delightfully surprised when they were told to march to the laboratory where they found a delicious dinner had been prepared by several girls of the class. This was quite a surprise and it was highly appreciated by all. After the delicious dinner, the class went to their garden and worked in it during the afternoon. This work is enjoyed by all because it is made so interesting.

The garden contains over two acres, and is planted in corn, sweet corn, Irish potatoes and a complete variety of other garden stuff.

The community is asked to examine this experimental garden in order that the practical advantages of our high school agriculture work may be much manifest.






