Mites

The common red mite is one of the most injurious vermin. Large numbers of them have been known to kill small chicks in one night. The red mite stays in the cracks and crevices about the hen house including such places as the perches and nest boxes in the day time. At night they crawl out of their hiding places and on to the chicks or mature stock where they suck themselves full of blood. The red mite is a blood sucking insect. Large numbers weaken mature stock and kill small chicks. The thing to be dreaded about red mites is the incredible speed with which they mul-

We have found kerosene or crude oil very good with which to kill mites. We apply it very liberally over the the mites will hide in any of these places. Kerosene may be applied with a brush or sprayer. It is important to use it liberally and regularly, say once every ten days or two weeks. Some people use carbolineum for killing mites, with excellent results. Keep the houses clean. Start early and use kerosene liberally and it should be an easy matter to control

Chicken lice stay on the fowl all the time. They live and breed on the chickens. They do not suck blood Mites and Blue Bugs but cause great injury by worrying the chicken and irritating the skin. 



THINKS WE SHOULD CO-OPERATE WITH THE TEXAS HIGHWAY ASSN.

Without doubt Texas is going to have to make a change in the handling of its highway funds if the State is to get Government aid. All the states in the Union are going to be forced to acceed to the Government's and starts rheumatism. There's no requirements in order to be thus benefitted. Some of the states have already done so and they will receive all the Government aid for highways Liver Tone-a perfect substitute for as long as the other states refuse to comply with the Government's regulations as to the manner in which these funds are to be handled. In short. it is simply that these funds must be placed under direct control of the State Highway Department. In a communication recently received by the News from S. Dean Wasson, the following statements are made relative to the matter, which may be worth reading. Says Mr. Wasson:

The little matter of some five million eight hundred thousand dollars of federal aid, provided for Texas under the new federal highway act is not to be sneezed at. But if we don't alter our state statutes to conform with the new law we will be coughing just that much money into the laps of other states, who have made proper provisions to take advantage of the great highway building and maintenance program.

The law does not say that it would be a good thing to put the power of construction and maintenance of thorough highways in the hands of the State Highway Department, it demands that it be done. Section 7 of the Act is very plain on this subject. It reads:

"That before any project shall be approved by the Secretary of Agriculture for any State such State shall make provision for State funds required each year of such States by this Act for construction, reconstruction, and maintenance of all Federal aid highways within the State, which funds shall be under the direct control of the State Highway Department.

It is to assist the citizenship of the State to understand the workings of this new highway plan, and the opportunities afforded under it for the development of a complete system of major highways throughout Texas at the expense of the State as a whole and the federal government, while counties will be left to spend their funds on local roads, that the Texas Highway Association has been created.
