Every individual who desires the assistance of a Deputy Collector in preparing form 1040-E. S., Declaration of estimated income and victory tax, must have available the following information:

- 1. A copy of his 1942 Income Tax Return.
2. Cancelled checks or other evidence of Income Tax paid on March 15, 1943 and June 15, 1943.
3. Estimate of Victory Tax deducted from wages January 1, 1943 to June 30, 1943.
4. Estimate of Withholding Tax deductible from wages July 1, 1943 to December 31, 1943.
5. Definite estimate of net income (Gross Income less allowable Deductions) from all sources, for the calendar year 1943.

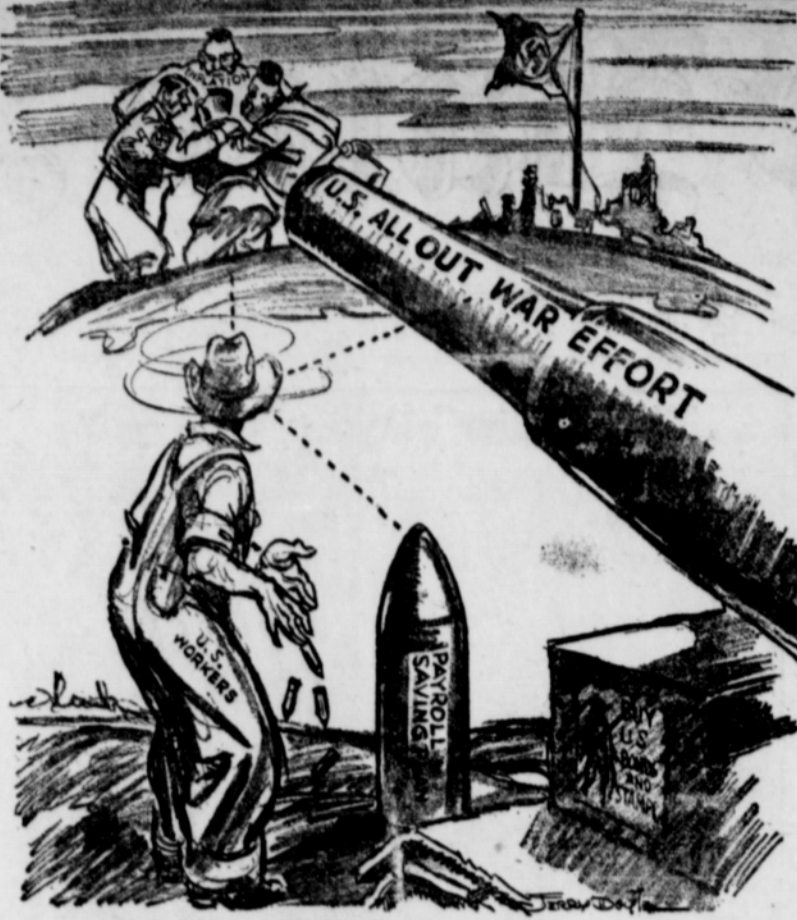

Or he could be provided with a rubber poncho at \$4.77; a helmet with its lining and other items of its assembly at \$5.62; a rifle cartridge belt at \$2.15; a marine corps pack consisting of haversack, knapsack and suspenders at \$5.10; a canteen and its cover at \$1.05. Total \$18.69.

Poor Milkweed Gets Important

Common milkweed is fast becoming one of America's important wartime plants, with its floss used as a replacement for scarce kopok.

Within the next few weeks a campaign will be launched among farmers in the areas where milkweed grows wild, urging them to pick the pods and sell their harvest to the government.

Officials of the War Production Board and the department of agriculture said milkweed floss is the only native American plant fiber which, like kopok, is hollow and has air cells inside it. Lengthy tests have shown it meets all specifications for kopok, useful in life preservers, airplane insulation and other vital military products.

A harvest of 1,000,000 pounds of milkweed floss has been set at the goal for this year, with the figure raised to 3,000,000 for 1944 and 5,000,000 for 1925.

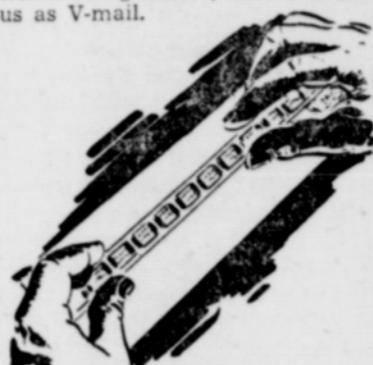
