CROWELL SCHOOL WILL HAVE LARGE **GRADUATING CLASS**

If the present members of the senior class of the Crowell high school continue until the year's work has been finished and make the required averages necessary to graduation the class of 1923-24 will be one of the largest in the history of the school. Thirty three young men and young ladies will receive diplomas. The number of boys will be less, as usual. than that of the girls, but they have come up considerably and there will be 12 of them, while the girls will lead with 21. Good for the boys. The school starts out this year with the best prospects in its history for a successful term. It has the best faculty in its history. Of the seventeen teachers thirteen of them are degree teachers, most of them having had successful experience in teaching. This number of teachers makes it possible for them to do better work than it would be if the rooms were overcrowded, as they have been in the past. Only one room is crowded this year so far, and that is the 4th grade with 41 pupils.

For the encouragement of the efforts of the pupils in the graduating class in debate, C. P. Sandifer has made an offer of \$25 to winning side in a debate to be had at the close of the fall term. Debating societies were organized this week, so it is understood that the pupils will compete for the Sandifer prize. This is a verv important matter for the pupils and will create quite a lot of interest both in the school and out of it. Mr. Sandifer is making this offer purely to encourage the boys and girls in debate and public speaking. The classification of the pupils by grades is as follows: 11th Grade-12 boys and 21 girls.

10th Grade-7 boys and 21 girls. 9th Grade A-14 boys and 11 girls. 9th Grade B-10 boys and 17 girls. 8th Grade-16 boys and 13 girls. 7th Grade A-12 boys and 13 girls. 7th Grade B-9 boys and 12 girls.

She has been culling and keeping only the best for breeding purposes and adds yearly new blood, so that she has a well built up flock of this breed. Mrs. Gover entered the first poultry show we had in the county and won prizes. She is heartily in favor of a county poultry show and will be an enthusiastic supporter of it. She favors poultry raisers making united efforts to get better prices for their eggs by producing only infertile eggs for the market.

WEB WORM HAS DESTROYED SOME **COTTON IN COUNTY**

The first of the week there was some anxiety over the cotton situa. tion due to the fact that leaf worms had made their appearance in many fields in the county. As a means of protecting the young cotton some of the farmers armed themselves with Paris green and went to work to stop the ravages of this pest, and reports indicate that they have been fairly successful Others have reported that the recent hot days have stopped the worms and they think the danger of their seriously injuring the crop has passed.

The Extension Service has sent out the following as a warning:

"When the insect appears in destructive numbers, dusting with the proper arsenical will control it. Dry arsenate of lead is best, and should be applied at the rate of about 3 bounds to the acre. There is little danger of burning the foliage with this poison. Paris green applied in dust form is effective, but is apt to burn the foliage, and only about one and a half pounds per acre should be used. Sunday night another good service and baptizing. Also another addition to church by letter.


The B. Y. P. U. had fifty young men and women in attendance Sunday evening. Seems to me they are growing in several ways.
