



According to statistics issued by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce for the present year, California leads all the states in the number of automobiles in proportion to population. The National Highway Association uses this as a basis for the argument that good roads and automobiles go together. Where the roads are good automobiles are a necessity. Where the roads are poor they are an expensive luxury, because their upkeep is prohibitive. Good roads call for automobiles and automobiles call for good roads.

The report cards for the first month of school were carried to the parents this week for their examination. They will show lower grades than have heretofore been indicated but it means simply that closer grading is being done by the teachers. It means that more study and harder work must be done by the pupils to carry their courses of study. It means that the standard of the school is to be raised and maintained. There can be no reasonable objections to this plan, for otherwise subjects would be half-mastered, which is worth little, if anything.

It is to be hoped that Texas will never have the political disturbance Oklahoma has just been experiencing. It looks as if the state is certain to kick Walton out, which will be a good move, for he has proven himself to be a would-be dictator. His fight against the mobs at first seemed to deserve commendation of the law-abiding element, but he was wrong when he designated all his opponents as mob sympathizers. Walton himself would assume authority that is not his, which is evidence that he possesses the spirit of the mob element. It is up to the real citizens of the State to put down that spirit regardless of the mask it wears.

Attention is called to the grand jury's report in this issue of the News. It is noteworthy that they find crime on the decrease in the county. They say in the report that this reflects the "efficiency of our peace officers and other officials." The News wishes to call attention to the fact that this has been done without the assistance (?) of any mobs that have hypocritically claimed credit for having brought about similar conditions in other portions of the country. Our peace officers have been attentive to their duty and in a measure the citizens of the county have supported them. And that is what it takes to have a decent country in which to live.

THE PERIL OF EDISON-FORD'S MONEY SCHEME

Would Create More Paper Money Than Russia's Trillions But Add No Real Wealth.

SOME DANGEROUS FALLACIES

Would Remove Safe Restraint of Gold Basis and Open Way to Endless Issues of Paper Money.

How the United States would be swamped, under a greater volume of worthless paper money than has ruined Germany and Russia, by the Edison-Ford commodity currency plan is pointed out in the present article. concluding the reviews, prepared by the American Bankers Association, of the recent exposure of the folly of the whole scheme by William T. Foster, Director of the Pollack Foundation for Economic Research. Mr. Foster says:

"The supply of money,' says Mr. Ford. 'is inadequate. There is more wealth than there is money to move it.' He draws a vivid picture of 'the golden dam to the stream of prosperity.' From a hundred quarters comes the demand for the govern. ment to speed up the printing presses, in order to crush 'the money monopoly.' reduce interest rates, and make it easier for everybody to get money. "Inflating the currency, however, though it enables people to get more

units of currency, does not enable them to obtain more purchasing power, and it does not reduce interest rates. In all her history Germany never had so much money or as high interest rates as in 1922. Money, unlike other forms of wealth, is not easier to obtain simply because the total supply is increased. On the contrary, increasing the supply of money ordinarily increases the demand for money, and interest rates depend not on supply but on the relation between supply and demand.

A Dangerous Fallacy

"We are assured, however, that the Ford-Edison plan provides money for the farmer at virtually no expense to the government or to anyone else. All the government has to do is to print the money. What could be simpler? Here we come to the most dangerous fallacy in the whole project. It is dangerous because of the universal desire to get something for nothing.

"Here is the gist of the matter: Money will buy whatever is produced, not a particle more by any trick of alchemy, or legislation, or finance. Without the arbitrary restraint of the gold basis, and with Muscle Shoals inflationists, and sundry other kinds of inflationists constantly pressing their claims upon Congress, it is not at all certain that the United States, once well on the road to financial chaos, would in the end be outrun by Russia."

The soap-boxer told a half truth that amounted to a whole lie. His listeners did not know that that particular factory, typical of thousands of others, was a complete refutation of the lie-if only the other half of the truth were told.

It is true the factory was Capitalized-for a million dollars. The net profits gave annual dividends of 6 per cent, or \$60,000, to the stockholders. All that was true.

. . .

But it was also true that the million dollar capital was divided up into ten thousand shares of \$100 each. The ownership of these shares was distributed among about one thousand people. Several hundred of them were workmen in the factory. They were saving out of their weekly wages and buying shares on the instalment plan. They were Capitalists.

It was likewise true that shares were also owned by workmen in other factories, by clerical workers and by small merchants. A good many were also owned by widows and orphans whose modest estates had been wisely invested for them by their bank. ers. They were Capitalists.

It was also true that the factory corporation had issued a million dollars in bonds to raise funds to buy the material and pay the wages of workmen to build the factory. These bonds were owned as investments not only by persons of wealth but also by many people of moderate means who had saved out of their wages and salaries. They were Capitalists.

And it was also true that out of the receipts of the factory, before a cent was taken to pay interest on the bonds, before a penny was used to pay dividends on the stock, a good many dollars were taken to pay wages to the workmen. . . .

The workmen were Capitalists too. They were investing their strength and their talents and their skill in the factory-they were getting their dividends out of its earnings as well as the stockholders and bondholders.

want cheap money, stock speculators want cheap money, the U. S. Treasury wants to float government loans on cheap money, socialists, anarchitsts and old-line greenbackers want very, very cheap money. Everybody feels that when the money rate is shoved up it is an arbitrary damper on prosperity.

But we cannot have both a low rate on money and a stable level of prices. We can have one or the other-not both together for any length of time. A low rate of money means an inflated price level. A stable price level means a fluctuating rate of discount. That is, the public must learn to look at the price level instead of the bank reserves, as their measure of expectation for a rise or fall of the value of money.

mistake is made if we do not fully explain to the public the power already exercised by the bank rate and the Federal Reserve Board and Reserve banks. Our bankers and economists see the bad use that is likely to be made of political control of banking and currency and they try to make the people believe that so intricate a question must be left to experts.

As a matter of fact our present methods encourage the very thing we wish to avoid. We let everybody believe that low rates on money are necessary for prosperity and then when bank reserves run low on account of the effects of this belief, we are suddenly compelled to jump the rates to protect the reserves. We get both a cycle of prices and a cycle of bank rates, whereas, if the public understood that the rise of bank rates should not wait until bank reserves are low, but the rates should be advanced several months ahead for the very purpose of preventing a fictitious prosperity with its inflated price level, then the public might be safisfied to support the administrative regulations which raise the rates at a time when there seems to be no need of doing it .- John R. Commons, University of Wisconsin.


