



Germany's Affront

The German government, through its official representatives in Washington, recanted and decided to pay tardy recognition to the memory of America's war president.

Though the Germans did fly their embassy flag at half-staff during the time that the funeral of Former President Wilson was taking place, they paid the delayed tribute only after it dawned upon them that they had blundered.

The former enemies of the United States did not realize the temper of American people-that Americans respect, honor and revere those who served in the highest office within their gift, regardless of any partisan feeling, and that they wish to cherish the memory of men of such ideals and rare attainments as those posessed by Mr. Wilson.

The first excuse given at the German embassy at Washington was that the German government regarded the former president as a private citizen and therefore did not deem it necessary to show any public respect for his memory.

Finding how its announcement reacted, the embassy then authorized the statement that "It having been officially announced this afternoon that there will be general mourning for the late President Wilson after 12:30 o'clock, the German embassy will join the expression of the na-


