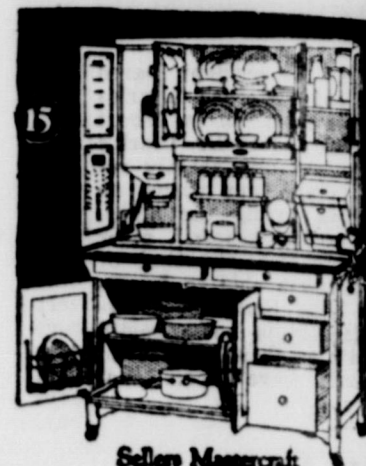

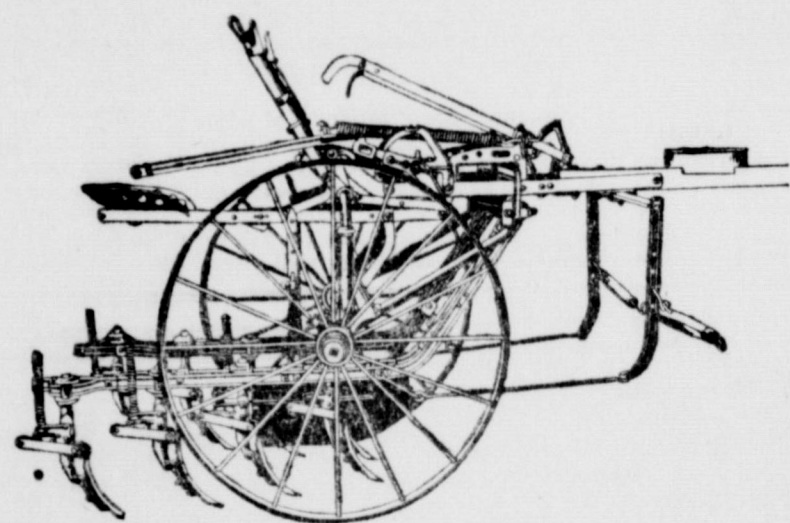

The falacy of the argument advanced by those opposing prohibition is apparent. They claim that many favoring prohibition are the very ones who are profiting by the present situation under the cloak of morality. But those same fellows do not advocate a return to the saloon, they know that will not do because public sentiment is too strong for such advocacy to find much favor, but they do say that we should have wine with a small per cent of alcohol. Beware of wolves in sheep's clothing. These fellows want strong wines and they advocate moderate wines as the first step because they think public sentiment will endorse such argument.

Some of them are put to it pretty hard to find argument against Governor Neff for taking the position he does on the matter of sending an uninstructed delegation to the national convention. They couple him up with Jim Ferguson, saying that Neff and Ferguson are one time in agreement on this matter. Thus trying to create prejudice against the Governor. Some fellows are afraid to take a position on anything until they learn how somebody else is going to stand on it. The Governor opposes McAdoo, as he has a right to do if he thinks he is not the proper man for the nomination. Maybe the Governor thinks he himself would be a good "black" horse, and who knows but that he would?

Fishing time comes at least one time a year, and that is about often enough. Another good rain just now will guarantee one of the big wheat yields of this county, and it would not be exaggerating to estimate a million bushel crop. With 40,000 acres in wheat we would have to get only 25 bushels to the acre, which is not out of reason.

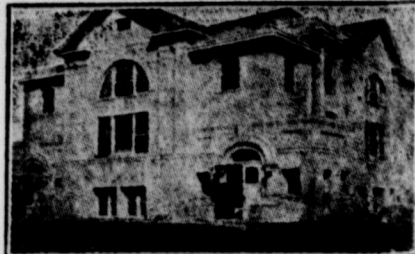

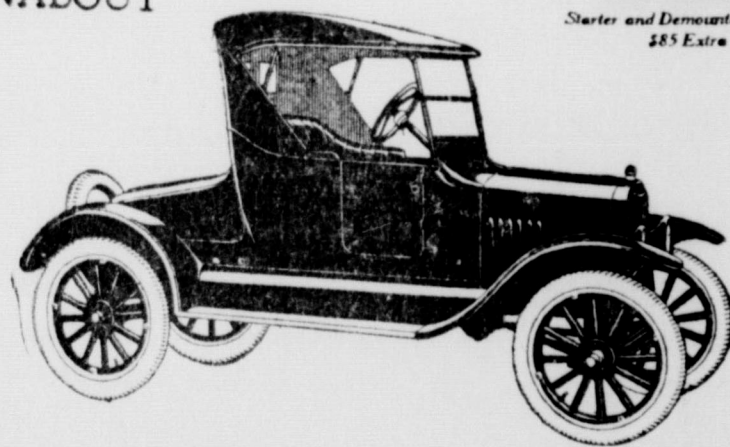

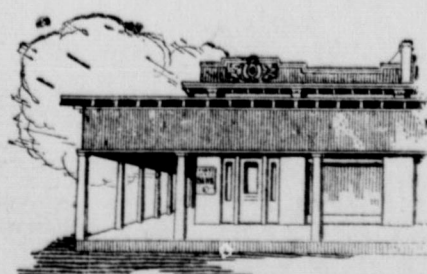

THINGS IN GENERAL

The Will To Do

Americans generally will applaud the curt reply of the army authorities to the British, who wanted to convert the attempted airplane flight around the world into a sporting event.

The Britisher is noted for his desire to take a sporting chance, but he shouldn't attempt to impair the chances of success for so great an adventure that will open up uncharted air paths and usher in a new epoch in transportation and travel.

These army pioneers will make a close study of air and the climatic and physical conditions to gather data that will give the first indication as to the practicability of encircling the globe by airplane.

The planes are equipped with boats for flying over the oceans, which will lessen in a small degree the danger ordinarily accompanying flights across large bodies of water, but the hazards have not been eliminated by any means and the men engaged in this enterprise are facing dangers that may cost them their lives.

Practically all progress, in all times, has been accompanied by danger, however, and there have always been men of the heroic strain ready to make the sacrifices required for the march of progress.

Columbus, Magellan, Marco Polo and other daring men of history placed their lives in the balance and gambled with fate that future generations might be benefitted.

If these men of the army survive, they will be able to take pride in the fact that their names will be ranked with notable characters of past ages, who dared to travel paths never traversed by civilized man; if they perish, their deeds will be a precious heritage that may be cherished.

It is as it should be that these bold invaders of unknown air ways should be Americans—representatives of a people whose history is filled with adventure and a reckless spirit that conquered the elements of a primitive land. Win or lose, their attempt will stand a monument to a spirit and will to do that which is typically American.

A certified check of 5% of the amount of the bid shall be filed with each bid and the successful bidder shall be required to give a good and sufficient bond in the full amount of the contract price executed by some surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas. Bidders shall be required to bid on condition that such tractor or road machinery shall be demonstrated upon the roads of said county for a period of 3 days prior to the date of awarding the contract, and all bids shall be addressed to the County Judge of said County, and shall be marked "Sealed Bids," and bids not so marked shall not be considered. That might appeal to some folks in Rush county, but that such a government policy is a mistake is readily apparent.

Anything that takes away the need

for individual initiative is dangerous. Laying up a competency for the sake is the goal of every self-respecting citizen.

Remove the need for ambition, get ahead, and an indolent nation sure to be the result.

A people dependent upon the government will never have any achievement to its credit.

We may have our oil scandal and then, but we can at least have our self respect by not looking forward to being a ward of the government in our old age.

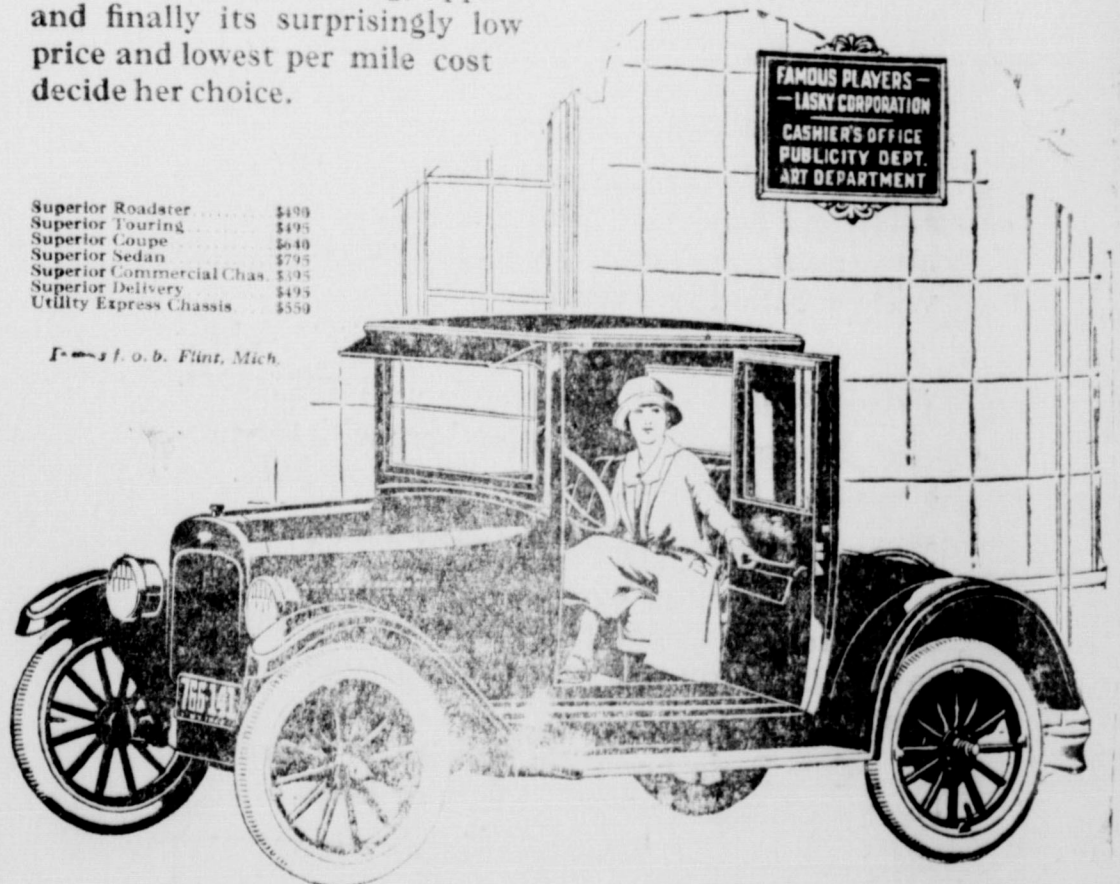

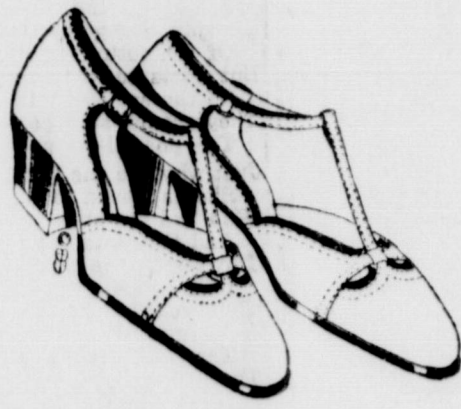

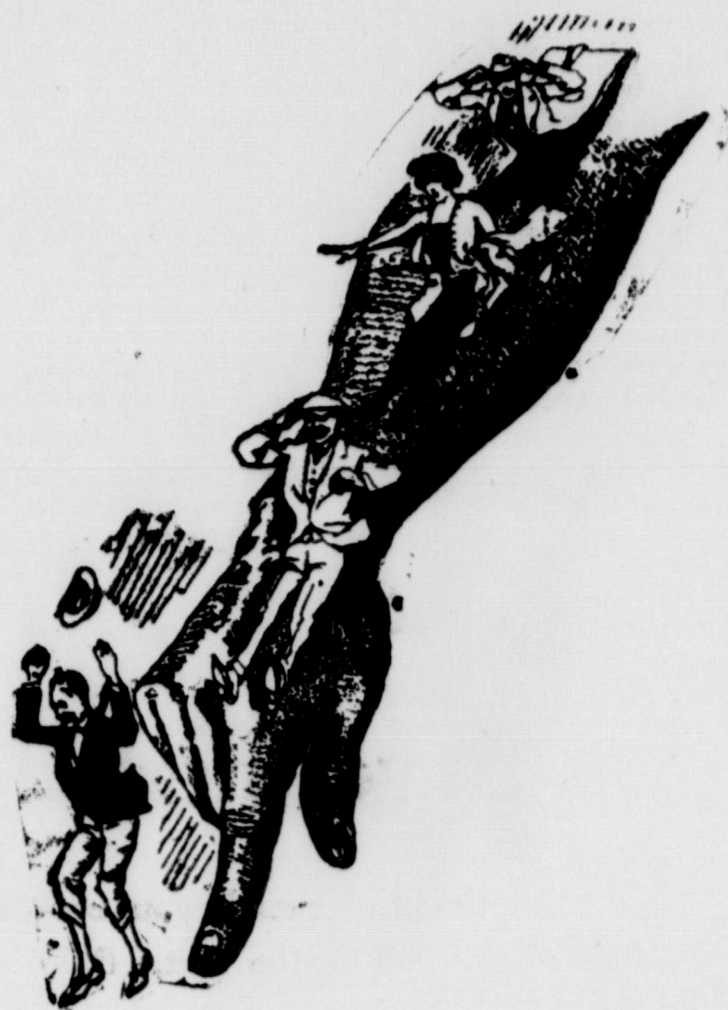
