


At the dedication of the Zero Milestone in Washington June 4, Lee Highway Association was accorded federal recognition never before given an organization of a similar character. An Ex-President, six Cabinet officers. State Governors and high officials of the National road organ. izations and the Shriners were in at tendance. The ceremony drew the largest assembly ever held near the White House and an amplifiar repeated the addresses so that every word could be heard by some 200.000 people, it being the opening of the great Shrine Convention.

In his address accepting the Zero Milestone, President Harding said, "There is not in existence at present a single road from coast to coast which can be used unimpeded through out the entire year. So, in the spirit of patriotic ambition for a national highway unification, Lee Highway Assocation has planned to connect Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York, with a boulevard from the Lincoln temple to the Lee Mansion by way of the Arlington memorial bridge; thence by way of Manassas battlefields, into the heart of the South, and thence to the Pacific."

Although Lee Highway Association has been functioning only three years, it has succeeded in opening and put ting in commission a practical motorway across the continent, which is to 9:00 A. ## Some Good Wheat Yields



Amendment Insures Federal Aid

Austin, Texas .- It will be necessary for Texas to adopt the highway amendment to the Constitution on July 28 to insure the continuance of Federal aid, according to R. M. Hubbard, chairman of the State Highway Commission.

"An amendment to the Federal aid act," he says, "requires the State to provide a State fund to match the Federal money and to take over the construction and maintenance of the State system. The authority now in the counties will have to be given to the State, as far as the State roads are concerned. This can only be done by amending the Constitu-tion. The amount allotted to Texas to date is approximately \$31,000,000 and the allotments in the future will be many millions more. The adop-tion of the amendment means that we will be assured a connected State system of roads."






