### GRASSHOPPER CONTROL

By R. R. Reppert, Entomologist, Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas. (Clip this and keep for future reference.)

It now seems certain that in some sections at least, a grasshopper fight will again have to be waged this year. Already grasshoppers are hatching and damage has been reported in some localities. With the great number of eggs found in the soil, extended damage, especially if warm showers occur during April to hasten hatching is expected. It is believed that the infestation will extend over most of the territory damaged last year, and into adjoining sections besides, where the hoppers migrated in late summer and fall for egg-hatching.

Our "differential" hopper, yellow when full grown, does the most damage, except in localities where the "jumbo" is a pest. These two may be expected to commence hatching about the middle of April, and damage to cultivated crops will occur about the middle of May and thereafter. Numbers of grasshoppers have already hatched, but most of these are species that ordinarily do not damage cultivated crops, it is thought control of them will be unnecessary. They should be closely watched however, and poisoned if found attacking valuable crops.

Last year farmers would have saved much more had they commenced fighting the hoppers sooner. This year, being prepared by warnings and profiting by previous experience, they should be able to save all of their crops and at a less cost. Instead of fighting them as they attack the cotton or corn, farmers should poison them where they are found hatching in low grass land and along stream banks. The places where they are observed congregating in large numbers during August and through the fall months, furnish an indication where eggs were being laid and where the small hoppers will hatch this spring.

During the first three or four weeks after hatching, the small hoppers range only a few feet from the place where they hatched. Because of this fact, and because the hatching period will be extended over several weeks, poisoning should be delayed some time. Farmers are advised to watch closely the places mentioned where hatching may be expected to occur, and to poison over these restricted areas about three weeks after the first small hoppers hatch in any considerable numbers. If all farmers cooperate in this poisoning promptly and if all hatching places are found and poisoned, it is believed that one or perhaps two such local applications will protect the cultivated crops for the remainder of the season.

Poison bran mash is advised in the control of the hoppers. In spite of some reports to the contrary, this gave excellent results last year where properly mixed and applied. Failures were found due to the departure from directions in some particular.

Experience last year indicated that amyl acetate used in place of the lemons, gave better results, and it is advised this year if it can be obtained. The formula recommended is:

- Wheat bran (avoid shorts) 25 lbs.
- White arsenic or Paris Green 1 lb.
- Amyl acetate ..... 1 ounce.
- Cane molasses (avoid cane syrup) ..... 2 quarts.
- Water in quantity as suggested below.

Thoroughly mix the poison and bran dry. Dilute the molasses and amyl acetate with about two gallons of water and thoroughly mix with the bran. Add more water and mix, until a thoroughly wet mash has been obtained, yet not sloppy. It should fall apart easily when sowing, so that it breaks up into particles not larger than the small finger nail at the largest. A good test is to squeeze a handful tightly; if of the proper consistency the water will ooze out between the fingers, but should not run out in streams.

It is important to thoroughly mix after each addition of water, to secure an even distribution of all the materials. After one or two batches have been mixed, the farmer will learn how much water to use, so that no further additions need be made.

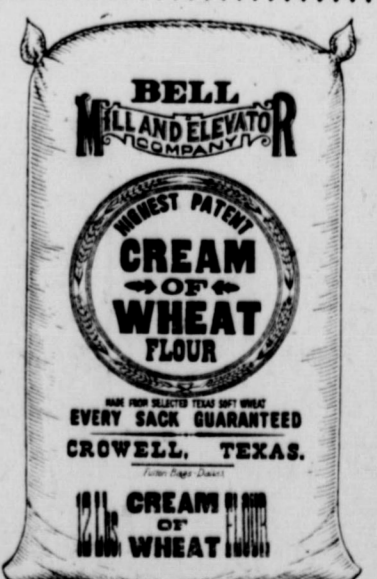

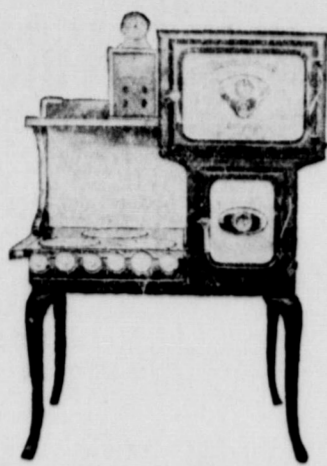

**ART CONTEST**

All persons cannot be creators of beautiful pictures, but all persons can appreciate the beautiful pictures which have been created by those fortunate ones possessed of creative genius. The class of creators is represented by the few, while the masses are the ones for whom their work is created. It is only through cultivation and directing that the masses may be enabled to realize their birthright, the right to enjoy and appreciate the good and the beautiful which is produced by the few. The seed for produced by the few. The seed for art appreciation is within every individual, and it is by the nurturing of this seed that the gospel of art appreciation can be spread. If the desire and demand of the beautiful be increased among the masses, the result will be a demand for an increase in output from the few who represent creative genius. Therefore that which brings about a larger appreciation of art will indirectly bring about a greater production of art. These results will entirely justify any efforts made in trying to bring about appreciation of art. And it is with these ends in view that the teachers in the Crowell public school have increased their efforts in developing a lively interest in pictures and picture study this year. The means used to stimulate this interest has been an art contest carried on in the three departments, primary, intermediate and high school.

Weekly lessons have been planned and given on one or more pictures by the teachers in charge. These lessons have included ten pictures in the primary department, fifteen in the intermediate and twenty in the high school. A study of the picture and artist is made which includes all interesting and worthwhile data that can be collected. The pupils learn to recognize the picture on sight, to name the artist and in the intermediate department and high school, give the nationality of the artist. At the end of the whole period during which all pictures have been studied a test is given and all pupils scoring 100 percent are given a small picture of their own choice and the room or grade with the highest average is given a large picture for a prize.

The contest in the primary department closed several weeks ago with 142 children making 100 per cent, that is being able to name the pictures on sight and tell the artist. The prize went to the third grade room which had a room score of 100. The first and second grades followed closely with averages of 99 per cent and the third and fourth grade averages were well up in the 90's. The fact that a majority of the children show a keen interest in pictures is gratifying as well as the fact of the good grades made.

The contest in the intermediate department and in high school will close this week and it is expected that a large number of pupils will make scores of 100.

The real purpose of the work is that the pupils will become so familiar with the pictures that they will recognize them as old friends whenever wherever they may see them. After all, appreciation is recognition of the familiar.

It has also given with these prizes as a gift to the whole school a beautiful copy of The Gleaners by Millet, which will hang in the auditorium. The room prizes are The Torn Hat by Sulby, primary; The Shepherd Boy by Lenbach, intermediate; The Stately Sentinels by Fox, high school. A sketch containing something about each of these pictures and their artists will appear in this paper next week. These pictures, also some of those studied in the contest will be on display in M. S. Henry & Co.'s window on Thursday, April 30th, and for several days following. It will be worth the time to anyone to stop before this window while the display is there.

### ES ENGLISH AS WORLD LANGUAGE

Lexicographer Makes Prediction for Future.

"We are building a great language for the future years," remarked Dr. Frank H. Vizetelly, managing editor of the Standard dictionary. He believes that "English is undoubtedly the greatest language of all ages for ease of expression and shades of meaning," and thinks that "the English-speaking races of today number nearly 200,000,000 people." This is about 12 per cent of the population of the earth, but Doctor Vizetelly expects the percentage to double in 75 years, according to the New York Sun.

Languages can be measured in importance by their usefulness as means of communication and by their contributions to world culture. English has quite evidently become the most important of all languages from the purely practical standpoint. No other tongue is used so extensively in trade or even in governmental and social relationships. It is estimated that 120,000,000 people speak German, 90,000,000 Russian, 60,000,000 French and 55,000,000 Spanish. Despite the great population of China and India neither of these countries has a single language spoken by as many people as speak English. India has 147 languages. Chinese dialects are innumerable. Altogether only 220,000,000 Indians speak languages of the Indo-Aryan branch, and there are three of these. Mandarin represents a means of communication almost everywhere in China, but it probably has not the actual currency that English has. The tongue that only 20,000,000 people spoke in 1800 is undoubtedly dominant among languages today so far as extent of use and variety of usefulness are concerned.

English has also steadily shaped itself into an effective medium for accuracy and beauty of expression. It has been jeered at as a heterogeneous language and it has been criticized for the "weakness" of turning to Latin and Greek for new terms. Lovers of the romance languages find it lacking in elegance. Its grammatical irregularity has been noted. Still, English has produced poetry, drama and fiction that are now world inheritances. Its poetry especially challenges comparison in fineness and body with that of any language. Meanwhile, as the power of the nations using English has grown, the serviceability and dignity of the tongue as an instrument of diplomatic, scientific and critical or philosophical use has been more generally acknowledged.

### Historical Organ

A firm in New York has bought it. The organ is square and has a false front, pierced and carved, and with dummy pipes painted on it. The keyboard has four octaves and forty-three notes and diapason, cornet, sesquialter, principal, twelfth and fifteenth stops. The lower half of the instrument, except for two small panels that are decorated with cupids and represent "Music" and "Singing," shows scenes in East India. The large panels in front evidently represent episodes in the life of a princess. In one she is seated on a camel led by a guide armed with a spear. In another she is alighting from a camel in an oasis.—Youth's Companion.
