In order to retain its first class fire insurance rate, the City of Baird this week was confronted with the necessity of ef-fecting several improvements in line with recommendations of the state fire insurance com-

missioner. The Austin recommendations were discussed at length at the Monday meeting of the city

council. One measure to be worked out is strengthening the fire zone ordinance. This may require regulation of the construction as to type, material, location and several other aspects.

To enforce such an amended ordinance, it will probably be necessary to appoint a building inspector and levy a charge for building permits. Such an ordinance, it was pointed out, will serve not only as a fire prevention measure, but will protect property values by preventing property values by preventing shoddy construction in the nei-ghborhood of valuable property.

The state recommendations also asked for increased water pressure. A new pump has been ordered and delivery is expected daily. This pump will be in-stalled at the lake and the two smaller pumps placed in opera-tion at the filteration plant. As another step toward increased pressure will be to fill the reser-voir. This will leave the problem of changing water lines in the

city.

Another recommendation from Austin was the replacement of the fire engine now in use. The legal aspects of the mat-ter, including drafting strength-ing amendments to the fire zone ordinance, were referred to the city's legal advisor, Randall C. Jackson.

Installation of the new pump and shifting the others to the filteration plant will take care or some technical problems, leaving the city council with the financial and engineering ques-tions of the water main and the fire engine.





3,000 Hens Will **Produce Living**

How many hens are needed to provide a living income for the producer? The answer to this frequently asked question involves not only hen numbers but more important, says Ben Wormell, extension poultry husbandman, is the number of eggs required each week to earn the expected living income.

It is generally considered, says the specialist, that about 50,000 dozens of eggs are required to earn a living for a poultryman. Production on a weekly basis would need average about 1,000 dozen.

cents a dozen, this production would return to the producer \$50 each week. As feed and flock depreciation represent about 90 per cent of the cost of producing eggs, the successful producer should concentrate on these two terms of management. items of management,

To produce 52,000 dozens of eggs in a year hens that average 17 dozens of eggs each, about 58 percent production, the poultryman would need a flock of slightly more than 3,000 laying hens in production the year-round.
