#### Clarendon to Have A Junior College

In the years that have passed a number of boys and girls of Crowell and Foard County have attended Clarendon College, but as is well known, that college is no more. The Methodist Conference decided to move the institution to Amarillo.

The college property at Clarendon was purchased by the local school board of that city and now they have announced that a Junior College, owned and operated by the city of Clarendon, will be started this coming September. This will be cailed Clarendon Municipial Junior College. It is said that the outlook for the new college is very bright. A full corps of teachers has been employed, some of them among the leading teachers in with Clarendon College last year.

The following is taken from the Clarendon News relative to management of the institution and courses of study:

"In addition to the regular prescribed courses that are offered in a department of commercial training, a school of this nature, there will be an art department second to none in this part of the state and other departments of a like nature. The full to the acre will prove to be the averplans of the different departments of the school have not yet been completed, and it is likely that they will be worked on for the remainder of the summer before the final plans are made public. Some heads of departments will be named and other matters attended to that will take some time to work out.

"The course of study for the part of the school is well in hand and is practically ready for the printers. The initial issue of the catalog and bulletin will be printed in the near future and will give all details and data pertaining to the school.

"The young ladies' home will be open for the reception of those young ladies who wish to attend the school. This will be controlled by a competent manager. Arrangements will also be completed for the boys who wish to attend the school from other cities than Clarendon.

"The opening date of the school has not been set, but it is presumed that it will be in the early part of September, that the students may have the full benefit of the full year's work in an accredited school.

"The physical attributes of the school are well known to the people of Clarendon and surrounding counttry. Some of those who are most interested in the work of schools in the State of Texas state that there has never been a school to open under more favorable circumstances. It is thought that the school will be selfsupporting from the very start and that the student body will be large enough to justify the wholehearted support of all the people of Clarendon from the opening day.

## Wheat Crop Looks Shorter Than Was

The wheat acreage has been estimated to be around 3500 acres in this county, which under normal conditions, should have promised an aggregate yield of 700,000 bushels, but since the crop has been partially threshed, the highest estimates now are not more than half that amount. That means that around 10 bushels age yield. Some place the yield even below that.

The crop is very spotted, there beng portions of fields that are good and others with little wheat.

If the county has 300,000 bushels to its credit this year it will be doing pretty well according to general estimates.







#### HONOR FOR ALL

Within a fortnight two Americans flew across the Atlantic ocean in monoplanes without stopping, thus demonstrating more forcibly than ever before that air ocean travel is a possibility of the very near future.

Capt. Lindbergh proved that it could be done in the face of doubts on the part of the most seasoned two weeks later, made a greater distance in a non-stop flight just to prove that Lindbergh's feat was no piece of luck.

Lindbergh won the proud distinction of being the first to make a nonstop flight from the United States to a European capital. Chamberlin was second, but went farther, establishing a new non-stop distance record. Chamberlin several weeks ago established a new endurance record with the Bellancea monoplane Columbia, which he piloted to Germany, by remaining in the air fifty

Though Chamberlin was disappointed, as he had planned to be the first to cross the Atlantic, there is honor enough to go around. For two Americans to establish the fact that airplanes can be successfully flown from the United States to Europe is more than a personal achievement; it is a national triumph which these two daring aviators will have to share with their country.

After Lindbergh's successful flight, the fact that immense seagoing planes are being constructed was revealed. Though minute details regarding the enterprise have not been given to the public, it now seems a safe venture that ocean travel by air from continent to continent will be well established within a few years.

To Lindbergh and Chamberlin much credit is due for their contributions to the cause of flying over water, but the pioneers of ocean air travel must not be forgotten-those who tried and failed or only partially succeeded-for their efforts helped to make possible the spectacular achievements of today.
