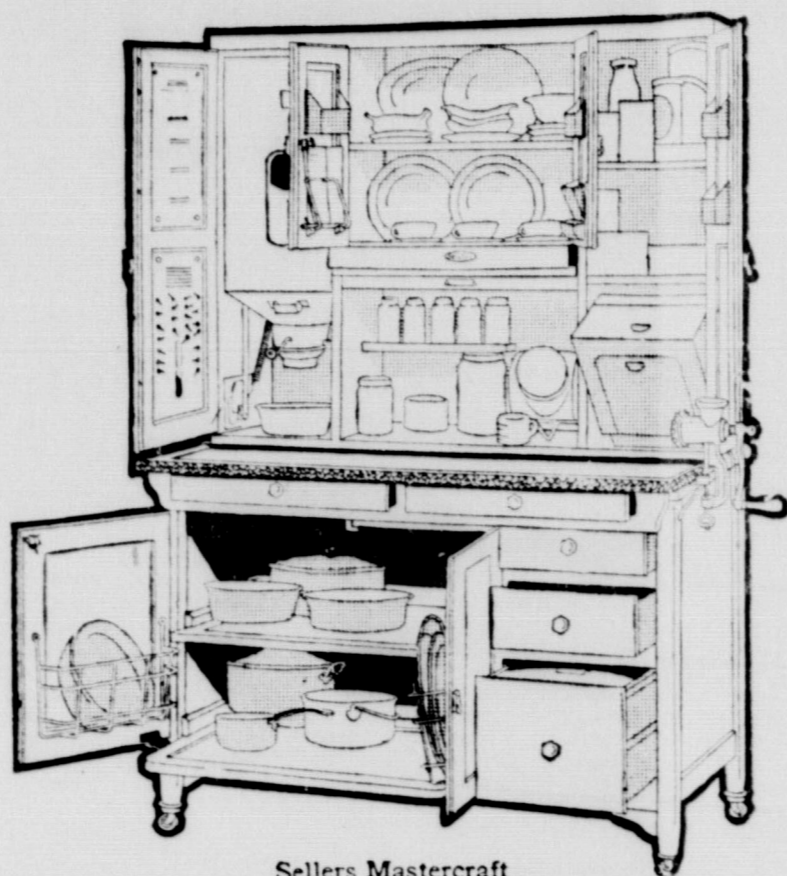

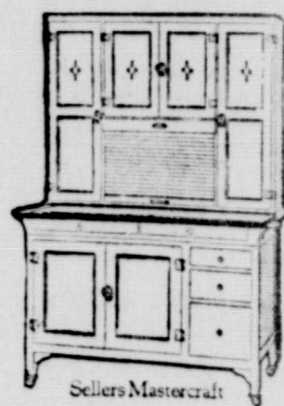

Wool Sells at 57 1/2 Cents

San Angelo, Texas, Nov. 8.—In the final sale of short fall wool in Texas this season, the West Texas Wool and Mohair association at Mertzon today received 57 1/2 cents per pound for 35,000 pounds of choice fleece and 55 1/2 cents per pound for 60,000 pounds of other wool placed on sale. This is the highest price paid for wool in Texas since 1919 when 62 1/2 cents was paid. The purchaser today was Charles Salter of Boston.

THE BATTLE IS OVER

Another great political battle has passed and after the smoke begins to clear away we find that the world is still moving along about as usual. It has not gone to ruin yet and possibly will not for many years to come.

As we look back over the history of the country we find that these great disturbances have been common to every national and to most state campaigns. They are not common only to the present generation.

Perhaps it is well that we have them, certainly it is well that great issues be fought out. The only regrets are that accompanying them is too much mud slinging and too many groundless and hurtful personal attacks. Good must come from intelligent and honest discussions of issues but too often wounds are inflicted by severe personal thrusts that even time cannot heal. In such cases harm is done.

But do we stop to consider that we, the common people, the onlookers, the spectators, are largely to blame? We give enthusiastic audience to such performances and actors, desiring to please us, "pour it on" as long as we throw up our hats. Isn't it funny that we are always ready to believe something bad about the fellow we are against? We are not particularly against him, possibly, but since we are for the other fellow, we want to see his opponent walloped good and plenty and we accept as true all the bad things said about him and that pleases the fellow we are yelling for. So he has no mercy for him. Such tendencies might be checked by a public disapproval of false statements and mud slinging in political campaigns.

A thorough study of human nature reveals the fact that most people are too selfish. This is not said in a spirit of criticism, but as a mere statement of what seems to be a fact. In reality, when one goes to the bottom of all troubles he finds that they are caused by some form of selfishness. As a rule we believe this selfishness has its origin in one of three things, love of power, love of applause, love of gain. There may be others, but these appear prominent. Men will go to the limit in seeking power, financial power that seems to invest authority in the possessor of wealth. With it there is a feeling of independence because it makes men move at its command. Men love that power for the one specific reason that it serves their purposes. That is selfishness. Love of applause is not uncommon among men. They like for the crowd to be on their side. They like to be patted on the back and idolized. That is a form of selfishness that leads to hurtful consequences. Love of gain perhaps is the worst form of selfishness because it excludes all others from its program except in so far as others can be commercialized in any manner that appears possible. It has no regard for anything that is good when its object, gain, is the dominating and only motive of life. It reduces to the greatest depravity. That love robs man of the higher and better things of life and blights all hopes of worth-while achievements.

The laying of the corner stone of the great school to be built at Lubbock on the 11th was a momentous day in West Texas. West Texans are all proud of what has been done and will be prouder of the institution when it becomes a reality. It's going to be great in the true sense of the word. It could not be otherwise and supply the needs and demands of this great Western empire, for this part of the state is a veritable empire. One can only faintly realize just what this school will mean to the country, nor can we until its results have been seen.

"Of course, it is none of our business," says State Press, "but if babies really come from heaven, it's a pity to send them anywhere but Texas." Maybe that's why so many Texans do not want to go back.

TEXAS STATE TEACHERS ASSOCIATION WILL CONVENE IN SAN ANTONIO NOV. 27, 28, 29

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 11.—R. C. Campbell, superintendent of Crowell schools, and Jesse Owens of Crowell, who superintends the Foard County schools, are expecting a large number of teachers from city and county schools to attend the Texas State Teachers' Association convention, which will be held in San Antonio Nov. 27, 28 and 29.

Dr. George A. Works and others who assisted in making the Texas School Survey will make addresses before the convention. Needs and conditions as revealed by the survey will be discussed, with a view to offering remedies for prevailing weaknesses.

San Antonio has arranged to entertain 5,000 visitors, and it is probable that the attendance will be the largest in the history of the association.

HOW TO LIVE LONG

The average person may not be aware of the fact, but you can live six hundred years if you split your cholin.

This is the assertion of Dr. William Held of Chicago, who explains that cholin is the substance that coats glands, clogs them up and results in old age and senility.

So, to get at the seat of the trouble, the natural thing is to have a "cholin splitter" a disintegrator, as it were, which routs cholin and restores youthfulness.

Dr. Held insists that he has found a serum, made from the fresh glands of steers, which will do the work.

There is nothing new in the knowledge that cholin exists in the human blood, he says. It is ptomaine poisoning filtering into the blood from products of decomposition.

Thomas Parr, an Englishman, is reputed to have lived to the ripe old age of 154 and the Hungarian Zartin is said to have been 185 when he died. Dr. Held believes they absorbed some cholin splitter into their systems.

Medical science has not passed on the "secret" to long life, so most of us will suspend judgment and keep on absorbing our cholin until such time as those fitted by technical knowledge and experience come to some conclusion about the merit of the serum. But the prospect of living to be six hundred years old has something that recommends itself, even though the means by which such an end is to be attained can not be regarded as very tenable.

Pistols That Figured in Affairs of Honor

"Appropos of the Nomad's dueling stories, a correspondent, says the Boston Transcript, sends the following: "Dear Nomad—This regarding the duel between Hamilton and Burr may be of interest to you:

"Some years ago, in passing through Geneva, N. Y., I was guest of Mr. Richard Church, an old family friend. In talking on things of historic interest, Mr. Church paused and, stooping down, reached under the sofa and revealed to my expectant gaze a mahogany box. On opening the box, he showed me the original flintlock pistols used in the Hamilton-Burr duel. Mr. Church informed me that those same flintlocks had been used also in two other duels—the Wilkes-Burr duel and the Church-Burr duel. Mr. Richard Church was a descendant of the opponent (Church) of Burr in the Church-Burr duel. Mr. Church showed me that one of the flintlocks was broken and informed me this break had occurred while he was a lad in shooting while at play. Mr. Church has passed away and I do not know the present whereabouts of these historic flintlocks. Perhaps they fell to his daughter, who at the time of my visit was the wife of Rev. Dr. Hart of St. Mark's church, Rochester, N. Y. Mrs. Hart's mother was one of the Schuylers, and was christened Angelica Schuyler Church. Perhaps some reader can give data as to the present owner of the flintlock. DAMON."

That the dueling pistols used in the Burr-Hamilton affair should also have served in two other encounters in which Burr was concerned is a pretty good indication that Burr kept himself supplied with weapons. But in the Church affair his pistols seem to have gone to his antagonist. The veritable weapon with which Burr killed Hamilton must be a valuable possession for a collector.

That Dropped Aspirate

In Latin and the languages, such as French, derived from it, the "h" is not pronounced, its omission being due to a slightly different throat formation in different races. For centuries after the Norman conquest, Latin and Norman French were the official tongues of England, and the aspirate, therefore, was never sounded. With the gradual rise of English as a national language, the "h" came into fashion, though even today one may occasionally find an old-fashioned clergyman who clings to the ancient tradition and speaks with conservative correctness of an "umble man." In the main, however, the dropping of the "h" was left to the less-educated classes, particularly those in London, which, as the court and official center, had, of course, been more affected by the French nonaspiration than the more truly English north country.—Nashville Banner.

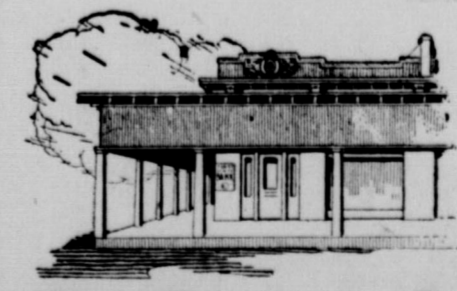

LAW NEEDED FOR COMMON CUPS

Texas One of Few States Without Legislation Against Disease Carrier.

URGED BY HEALTH OFFICERS

Many Municipalities Make Up Lack of Statutory Mandate With Local Ordinances.

In a recently made survey of the laws against the common drinking cup it has been found that Texas is one of the few States of the nation that has not written upon its statute books legislation to curb this menace to public health. Nor has Texas adopted the Railway Sanitary Code which prohibits the use of the common drinking cup on trains and in stations.

The seeming apathy against this agent of infection is offset in part by the action of various cities and towns which have passed their own regulations to abolish what some sanitarians have called, "The Goblet of Death." Recently in Dallas an intensive drive was carried through to compel soda fountains and other places of public drinking to protect the public against the danger of the common cup. The ordinances of other cities, notably San Antonio and San Angelo, have been on the books for many years and have been found effective in reducing the rates of illness and death.

There has been a general acceptance of the knowledge that most of the infection that afflicts communities and is carried into Texas from other States is due to the common cup. The United States Public Health Service in Bulletin No. 57, charged this agent with responsibility for the communication of tuberculosis, pneumonia, tonsillitis, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, infantile paralysis, diphtheria, measles, influenza, grippe and common colds.

This bulletin was issued in 1912 but before that time Texas had gone on record against the common drinking cup. In 1911, a bill, entitled "An Act prohibiting the promiscuous use of a common drinking cup, glass, or other vessel, for water drinking purposes, on railway trains, in railway stations, in schools, churches, theatres or any other public place" was introduced by Senator Warren. This bill was reported favorably but died on the calendar.

The measures that have been adopted by other States have been promoted by sanitarians who demonstrated that more than forty per cent

of all illnesses are preventable and that most of the deaths are postponable. In the places where such legislation has been passed there has been an appreciable reduction in the sickness and death rates.

In 1920, Federal authorities became convinced that many of the outbreaks of disease were due to their being carried from one State to another by passengers in railroad trains. This led to the formulation of the Railway Sanitary Code which was offered to the States for adoption.

Thirty-four States since have adopted this Code and others have written identical regulations into their statutes so that this interstate transmission has been fairly well halted. Texas, however, is not among the States that have accepted the preventive.

While this State has been laggard in writing adequate legislation upon its books other places have progressed far beyond the original intent of the common cup laws. Durham and Goldsboro in North Carolina, for instance, have banned glasses at all soda fountains. The result of this arbitrary action is given by J. H. Epperson, superintendent of the Department of Health in Durham. He says:

"Our ordinance requiring the use of individual paper containers for the serving of patrons of soft drink establishments is being enforced rigidly. We do not permit the use of glasses under any consideration. We have even gone so far as to require circuses, carnivals and other traveling organizations dispensing soft drinks to the public to use individual containers.

"I am indeed glad to state that there is little or no opposition at the present time to the use of the individual service at soda fountains. The public in this community is solidly backing the Department in the enforcement of this regulation as evidenced by the fact that recently the grand jury took notice of the ordinance and complimented the efforts of the officers in the rigid enforcement of the law.

"I am of the opinion that any community who attempts the use of sterilizers at soda fountains is simply wasting effort so far as preventing the spread of infection by the use of so-called sterilized glasses. The removal of all glassware from the fountain and the use of the individual cup will accomplish the purpose for which the law was intended."

It is probable that the pressure of sanitarians throughout the State and the public sentiment of various civic and public health groups will bring the matter of the common cup before the new Legislature. Generally, it is expected that Texas will go on record against the common cup and will adopt the Railway Code or incorporate similar provisions in a new law.

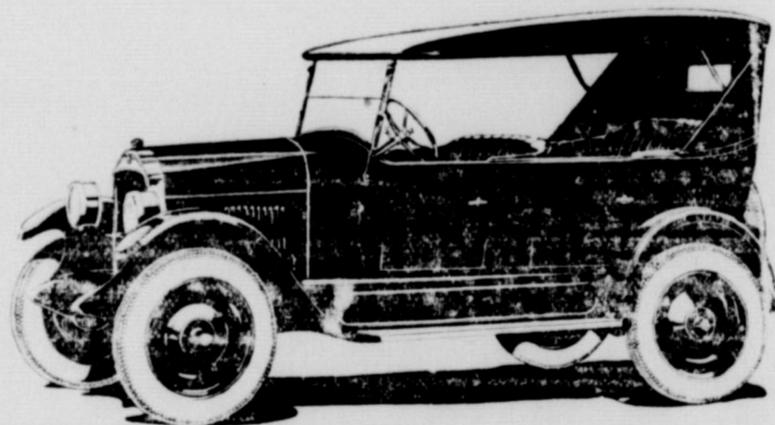

The American people, whose motto sometimes seems to be, "Let George do it," have a way of evading the responsibility for this great idealistic and practical enterprise, and leave it all to the teachers and school executives.

They kick with great gusto when the high school graduate can't spell or write well, or when the schools have failed in some other respect, yet they never ask themselves if the suc-

cess of the undertaking does not depend in large part on home cooperation.

Teachers and school executives who have to contend with parental indifference, find that their plants turn out only an indifferent product.

The success of the school operation can be greatly promoted and the children can be prepared for more useful futures if the school patrons will work with those in charge of the schools.

Teachers will testify that the best results are obtained when the school work is placed first and outside pleasures get secondary consideration. They will also bear witness to the fact that the best results are obtained when parents back up school discipline.

These are two things to keep in mind if we wish to accomplish the end in view—making useful citizens out of boys and girls.

Dark and Light Moon

The United States weather bureau says that "light moon" or "light of the moon" means all that time during which the moon is above the horizon through the forepart of the night, or from dusk to bed time, say 11 o'clock p. m. "Dark moon" or "dark of the moon" means all the rest of the time, or all the time that is not "light of the moon." But country people usually have a different theory. They consider "light of the moon" the time when the moon is going from "new" to "full," and "dark of the moon" when the moon is on the wane. The fact is, the terms "dark moon" and "light moon" are purely popular terms and have no scientific significance whatever.—Pithfinder Magazine.

Have Yet to Learn Much About Disease

What is disease? Everybody knows that disease involves a physical injury to tissue cells, but what and how? The truth is, we are really only at the beginning of our knowledge of the cause of disease. We must be able to measure exactly the injury, the vitality and the degree of recovery of body cells to find the answer, writes Paul H. De Kruif in the American Mercury.

Recently a man named Osterhout, obscure name among biologists, has made a step toward answering the question. Working with a common sea-weed, laminaria, he has begun to give exact meanings to the hitherto vague terms, vitality, injury and recovery. He has found that normal weeds possess a certain resistance to the passage of an electric current, that this resistance may be accurately measured, and that it is always of exactly the same order of magnitude for the cells of healthy laminaria. But take the cells out of their natural environment in sea water and put them in solutions of different content and density, and their resistance to the electric current falls at once. The greater the damage to the cells the greater the fall.

The coincidence of the fall in resistance with the degree of injury has enabled Osterhout to construct equations which predict the exact amount of injury that the cells of laminaria will suffer. He can write down just how much and how long a cell can be exposed to damage and still recover completely. In brief, Osterhout measures injury, vitality and recovery. That is the beginning of science. That is the real beginning of the answer to the question: "What is disease?"
