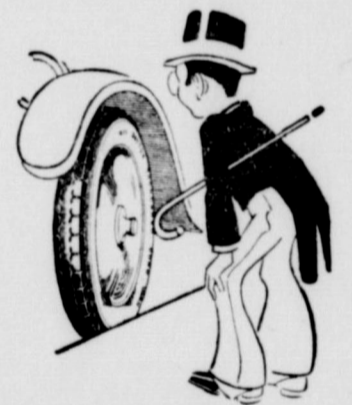
PLEASED WITH NEW FIELD

KEEPING THE DOCTOR AWAY

Keeping the doctor away will be a more general practice in the United States this year as the crop of commercial apples is about two million barrels larger than last year and of unusually fine quality.

If a whole apple a day is required to keep the doctor away, as the old saying leads us to believe, about half the people in the United States will need medical attention, as the per capita consumption of apples is one-half of an apple a day.

Apples are recognized as a very valuable fruit for eating raw. The immense production in the United States—164,000,000 bushels—is due in some measure to the public spirited work of an unsung benefactor, Johnny Appleseed, who is credited with having started apple orchards all over the middlewest before many white men ventured into the tractless wastes.

His services were recognized in Congress when in 1847, at the announcement of his death, he was referred to as an old man "who had done more for the west than any other man of his era."

Most of the knowledge of Johnny Appleseed rests on tradition. It is known that he was born in Springfield, Mass., in 1775 and it is said that he left his native state and wandered out into the wilderness because of disappointment in love. He was in the valley of the Potomac in 1799 and in western Pennsylvania in 1800. He gathered a great quantity of apple seeds from the cider presses in Pennsylvania and floated down the Ohio in a strange raft, made from two canoes and loaded with bags of seeds. He was on his way west to make the wilderness bloom with apple blossoms.

"My mission in life," he told a pioneer woman, "is to have the apple trees ready for the settlers when they come."

His first nursery was in West Virginia and then he wandered into Ohio and Indiana planting his seeds and planting apple trees in the wilderness. More than 100 nurseries were set out in the forests of the two middle western states by this strange wanderer.

With an axe, hatchet, and a hoe, he would seek a favorable spot near a river, prepare the ground and plant thousands of apple, pear and peach seeds. Then he would build a brush fence around the infant nursery to keep out prowling beasts. Often he would set out the homely herbs which later proved so useful to the settlers.

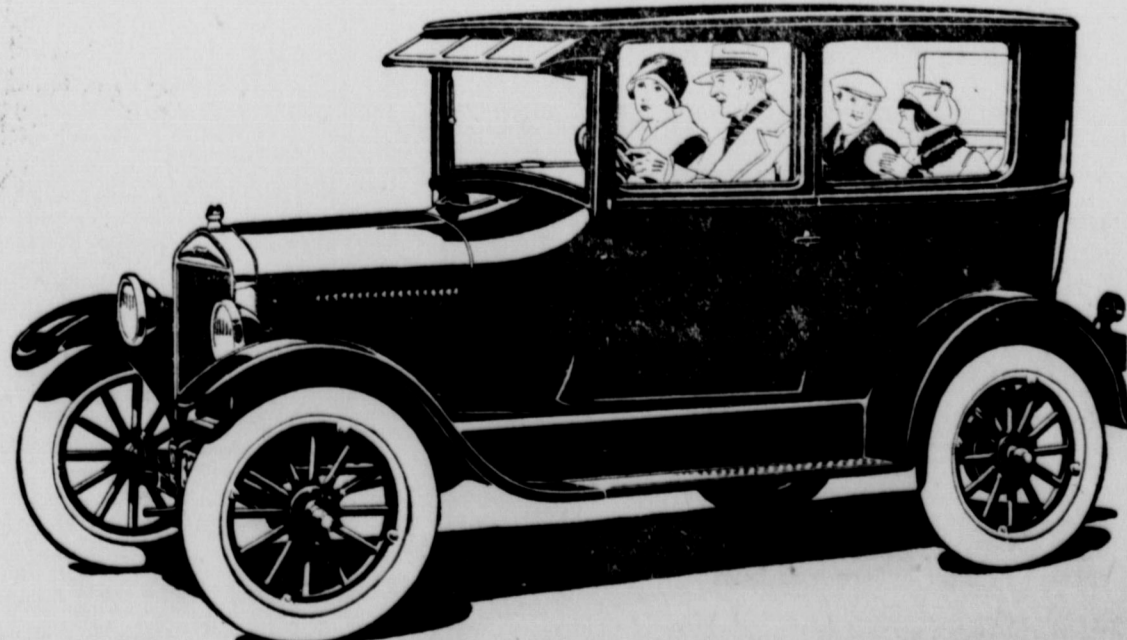

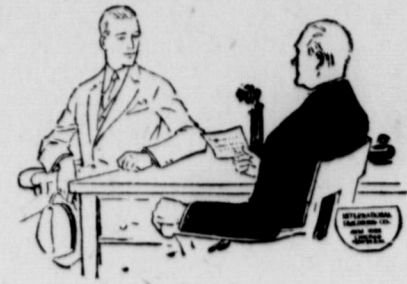

LIKE PAUL, PROSECUTOR IN JAIL PREACHES GOSPEL FROM BEHIND THE BARS

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Teaching like St. Paul, behind prison bars, William M. McCraw, assistant district attorney of Dallas county, prisoner in the county jail on a three-day sentence for contempt of court, this morning told the story of Paul's appearing as a prisoner before Agrippa, to his Sunday school in the jail chapel. More than 150 persons, including many visitors and county officials, filled all the bare wooden benches and lined the gray prison walls.

Jew Even Now Is Not at Home in Jerusalem

One morning, with much the same feeling as when I stepped from the pullman to the edge of the Grand Canyon or entered Charley Brown's barber shop to get my first adolescent shave, I passed through the Jaffa gate, writes H. Bon-Shamar in the Menorah Journal. Ahead of me strode a lemonade vender, clinking his brass cups to call the thirsty to the pinkish mess that filled his enormous glass jar. From a distance rose the cry of an oriental market in the full swing of advertisement and vituperation. As I stumbled over the rough paving I was vaguely aware of the stone mass of the Tower of David. Once it was behind me I considered that after all my trepidation and dallying I was at length in Jerusalem. I raised my head and looked about. I saw the offices of a tourist agency.

I entered a long stone passage, lined with shops, more a flight of steps than a street. It was bound together with stone arches. It was hung with drapers' goods, dead sheep, shoes and kerchiefs. It was thronged with an unwashed multitude, their heads bobbing up from the lower depths as they climbed the grade, turbaned heads, skull-capped heads, veiled heads, wimpled heads (women of Bethlehem), tar-bushed heads, calpacted heads, derby-crowned heads, nose-and-ear-ringed heads. It choked with noise. It brayed with asses and tinkled with camels. It danced with gesticulation.

Vegetable, fruit and meat shops grew thicker, the odor of garlic began to mount, the earlocks fell longer, strings of sausage swung into view, and I saw a sign, "Nathan Straus Milk Station." I was in the Jewish quarter. There is pathos in the phrase, "Jewish quarter," and more in the reality it describes. One does not and cannot speak of a French quarter in Paris or an American quarter in Washington. But the Jew, traditional, orthodox, Yiddish-speaking or Sephardic Jew, native to the city for generations, is as much a stranger in Jerusalem as he is in London. Despite the fact that the majority of the population are Jews, Jerusalem is again as it was those thousands of years gone, one of the cities "which ye build not, yet ye dwell therein."

Slightly Exaggerated

THE MOON AND INSANITY

HOW universal was formerly the belief there was a direct connection between the moon and insanity is shown by the fact that our words, lunacy and lunatic, are derived directly from Luna, the Latin name of the Roman moon goddess corresponding with the Greek Selene. Luna was the moon and she was only one of the various personifications of the moon which existed in all mythologies and of which Isis of the Egyptians appears to have been the original. It used to be a common belief, among sailors especially, that if a person slept in the moonlight he was liable to go mad. That superstition is still in existence as is also the more common one that lunatics are more violent when the moon is at the full. Even Thackeray, in his story of "Catherine," appears to credit this mistaken belief; and it is not so very long ago that responsible physicians began to doubt the theory.

It is very common superstition today that to sleep in the moonlight is dangerous—that "something will happen" to one who does so, a belief surviving from the insanity superstition.

This idea of the connection between the moon and insanity is derived from the belief of the ancients that inspiration and madness were closely connected. The prophetess of the Delphian shrine worked herself into a frenzy before she uttered her oracles and the priests of the moon goddess bathed themselves in her refulgent beams to obtain inspiration and declared from her altars after the manner of madmen.

Modern medical science declares that there is not the slightest connection between the moon and insanity and modern research shows that the whole idea is a superstition surviving from the days when the priests of Isis by the banks of the Nile waved their wild arms toward their shining goddess and with "eyes in fine frenzy rolling" declaimed her oracles to an awe-struck people.

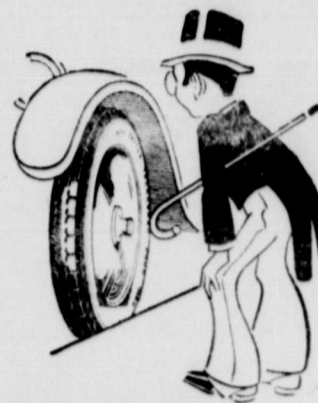

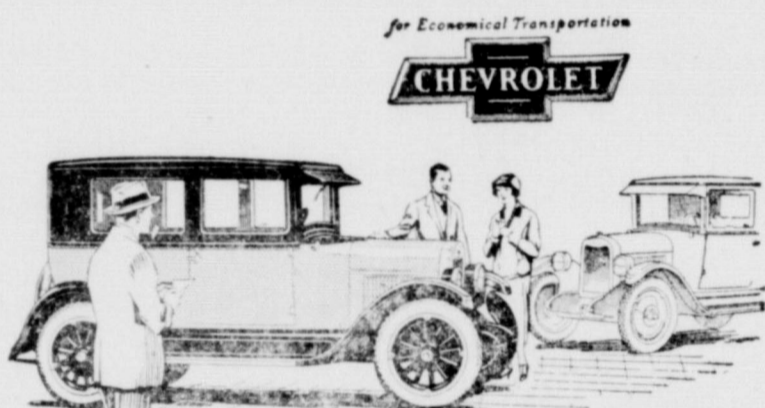
