

ence to the headlight law. It follows: the time of registration, present to the Tax Collector a headlight certifieate which has been issued by a test station within thirty days of the date of registration. If the car or truck to be registered is not equipped with headlamps, the registrant will be permitted to make affidavit to that effect and this affidavit will take the place of a headlight certificate. Early testing and registration will help the

KEEPING THE DOCTOR AWAY

Keeping the doctor away will be more general practice in the United

States this year as the crop of commercial apples is about two million barrels larger than last year and

Apples are recognized as a very valuable fruit for eating raw. The immense production in the United States—164,000,000 bushels—is due in some measure to the public spirited work of an unsung benefactor, Johnny Appleseed, who is credited with having started apple orehards all over the middlewest before many white men ventured into the tractless wastes.

His services were recognized in Congress when in 1847, at the announcement of his death, he was referred to as an old man "who had done more for the west than any other man of his era."

Most of the knowledge of Johnny Appleseed rests on tradition. It is known that he was born in Springfield, Mass., in 1775 and it is said that he left his native state and wandered out into the wildness because of disappointment in love. He was in the valley of the Potomac in 1799 and in western Pennsylvania in 1800. He gathered a great quantity of apple seeds from the cider presses in Pennsylvania and floated down the Ohio in a strange raft, made from two canoes and loaded with bags of seeds. He was on his way west to make the wilderness bloom with apple blossoms.

"My mission in life," he told a pioneer woman, "is to have the apple trees ready for the settlers when they come."

His first nursery was in West Virginia and then he wandered into Ohio and Indiana planting his seeds and planting apple trees in the wilderness. More than 100 nurseries were set out in the forests of the two middle western states by this strange wanderer.

With an axe, hatchet, and a hoe, he would seek a favorable spot near a river, prepare the ground and plant thousands of apple, pear and peach seeds. Then he would build a brush fence around the infant nursery to keep out prowling beasts. Often he would set out the homely herbs which







education. And it's not difficult to learn something new on the subject. For example, for a people that boasts of its public school system, it is surprising to find that more than seven times as much is spent for luxuries as is invested in education.

Fifteen billions a year are sunk in luxuries and non-essentials and a meagre two billions expended on education through tax-supported schools. The nation also spends six billions on buildings annually, four billions on passenger automobiles and saves something like ten billions.

It's not uncommon to hear the complaint that far too much of the people's money is going into expensive school buildings and equipment; that just as much good could be accomplished in the education of our young people with the expenditure of much less money.

These figures should put to shame such a critic. The idea that a nation of people that realizes its responsibility to the next generation and then fails to meet it by frittering away more for the satisfaction of personal whims than is spent for education, should cause one to hesitate to oppose any movement for the betterment of the schools, no matter what the cost.
