





In the small rural community, where the banker knows practically all of his customers by their first name, and the merchant is acquainted with nearly everyone with whom he deals, the loss from bogus checks

However, the criminal of this class by means of the films exhibited. Short all too frequently finds a credulous fellow who is ensnared and business writes up the sum on the loss side of the ledger.

Honest business loses \$100,000,000 a year in this country alone through forgeries and a similar amount because of embezzlements. Then there is a loss of \$400,000,000 charged up to credit frauds and \$1,000,000,000 to stock frauds.

Stock fraud losses are due chiefly to the sale of corporate securities of no actual or potential value and losses from Bucket shop and other illegal forms of trading in securities. Over \$3,000,000,000 have been stolen from the people of this country since the war through the sale of spurious securities.

Little wonder, then, that business men have been aroused to action and that they have spurred legislature on to enact more stringent "blue sky"

The fake stock promoter is the limit in business criminality, because he preys on the weak and takes advantage of their lack of knowledge.

He and all of his confederates who make a living "by their wits" are levying too heavy a tax on business. They will have to be routed sooner





Abilene, Texas, Sept. 24 .- Giving the town of Shamrock continuity of electrical service, the West Texas Utilities Company is constructing 27 miles of 66,000 voltage highline from Wellington to Shamrock, it was announced by the construction department here.

The company also will erect a 600 kva 66,000 volt steel substation at

The town heretofore has been supplied with electricity by a local generating plant of 544 kw capacity. Because of the rapid growth of the town it was found the old station was inadequate to care for the electrical needs, and provide required reserve capacity.

Building of this highline is in keeping with the program of the West Texas Utilities Company which provides for extension of transmission lines to all cities and communities on the company's properties.

The tiles ma represent hunting and marine scanes portant passages from the Bible and gives the text from which they are taken. These tiles were taken from Holland by the Spaniards during their occupation of the Netherlands, and after several centuries' use in a bouse in Madrid crossed the Atlantic to Havana.

American visitors to Havana pur chase, besides the tiles, much Spanish bronze, copper and beaten brassware. Cuba was at one time rich in such curios, but the supply has been practically exhausted, so that the dealers now spend their summers in Europe to renew their stock. Spanish glassware is another fad of the visitors. The older pieces offered tor sale are extremely beautiful. When Carlo, III ruled Spain he imported hundreds of glass workers from the Capa di Monti factory at Naples, and the delicate products of these craftsmen is today highly valued .- New York Times.
