Ford Sales in Crowell will show the 1962 line of cars.

Featuring a crisp, fresh appearance, the 1962 Ford Galaxie incorporates major engineering advancements that reduce maintenance and increase convenience "twice a year".

For the first time, the popular Ford Galaxie is being offered in two models in two series: Galaxie and the new Galaxie 500 series. ## Former Methodist Pastor Here, Rev. Clark, Died in Snyder

Rev. M. W. Clark, 90, a pioneer Methodist minister, died last Thursday, Sept. 21, in Snyder where he had lived since his retirement in 1936.

Bro. Clark was born in Grandview, Johnson County, where he began his ministry in 1894. He was pastor of the Crowell Methodist Church in the early part of the century. He had served 22 pastorates, many as a circuit rider in Northwest Texas. He had served churches at Cleburne, Corsicana and Waco in the Fort Worth area, and in Baylor, Knox and Foard Counties.

Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. A. C. Pruett of Snyder; a son, J. Freeman Clark of Dallas, three sisters and two brothers.

Funeral services were held Saturday in the Snyder First Methodist Church at 2 p. m.

## New Chevrolet Cars Will Be on Display Friday

Borchardt Chevrolet Co. will show the 1962 line of Chevrolet cars at their showroom in Crowell beginning tomorrow (Friday).

Chevrolet's passenger car line-up for 1962 features extensive restyling and major mechanical changes for its standard models plus a new complete line of smaller cars to be known as Chevy II.

This will bring the company's 1962 passenger car line-up to 32 models—highest in its history—available in the Corvair, Corvette, Chevy II and standard Chevrolet lines.

The new Chevy II is larger than the Corvair but smaller than Chevrolet's regular car. Station wagons, a hardtop sport coupe and a convertible are included among nine models in the new line which emphasizes simplicity in styling and maximum functionalism in design.

Although the Chevy II design is basically conventional, it offers new front mounted four and six cylinder engines, integral frame and body construction with bolt-on front end and an industry exclusive in tapered plate rear springs. Both three speed manual and automatic transmissions will be available.

## Savings Bonds Sales in County During August Total \$27,500

"Savings Bonds sales for the first eight months in Foard County totaled \$109,691. Of this amount, \$27,500 was purchased during August." This announcement was made this week by Geo. Self, chairman of the Foard County Savings Bonds Committee. This county has now reached 99.7 percent of its 1961 goal of \$110,000.

Bond sales in Texas for the month of August totaled \$12,937,885. Sales for the first 8 months of this year were \$108,261,876, which represents 65.6 percent of the Texas 1961 sales goal. August was the 8th consecutive month that bond sales have shown an increase over the corresponding month of 1960.

## Former Foard Man Died in Quannah

Louis Bordofsky, 78, native of Austria, and a former Foard County farmer, died Sunday, Sept. 17, in the Quannah hospital following a heart attack suffered the previous Sunday.

Mr. Bordofsky came to the United States with his parents when he was three years old. He became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1952. The family settled near Coleman and he later moved to Foard County where he lived and farmed for many years, afterwards moving to Hardeman County.

He was born in April, 1883, and was married to Miss Bertha Wesson in Hale County in 1906. He was a member of the Church of Christ. Funeral services were held in the Quannah Church of Christ at 2:30 p. m. Monday afternoon, Sept. 18, with burial in the Quannah Cemetery.

He is survived by his widow, four daughters and one son.

If you have an old felt hat, you can give it a new look with careful brushing and cleaning. Start by careful brushing. This

may show up spots and stains that need special treatment. If you try using sand paper. With a piece of No. 0 sand paper, begin at center top of crown and gently sand in the same direction around the crown, side crown and the brim.

If this fails, use naphtha or other cleaning fluid. Dip a small brush, such as a nail brush, in the cleaning fluid, shake out excess liquid and brush hat until the soiled spot disappears.

Proper storage of your summer clothes will increase their life and make garments more wearable next season. Here are several suggestions which will help protect your clothes: wash or dry clean all clothing before storing. Store cottons and linens unfolded. Make certain that all starch is removed. It can cause fabric to deteriorate and may attract silverfish.

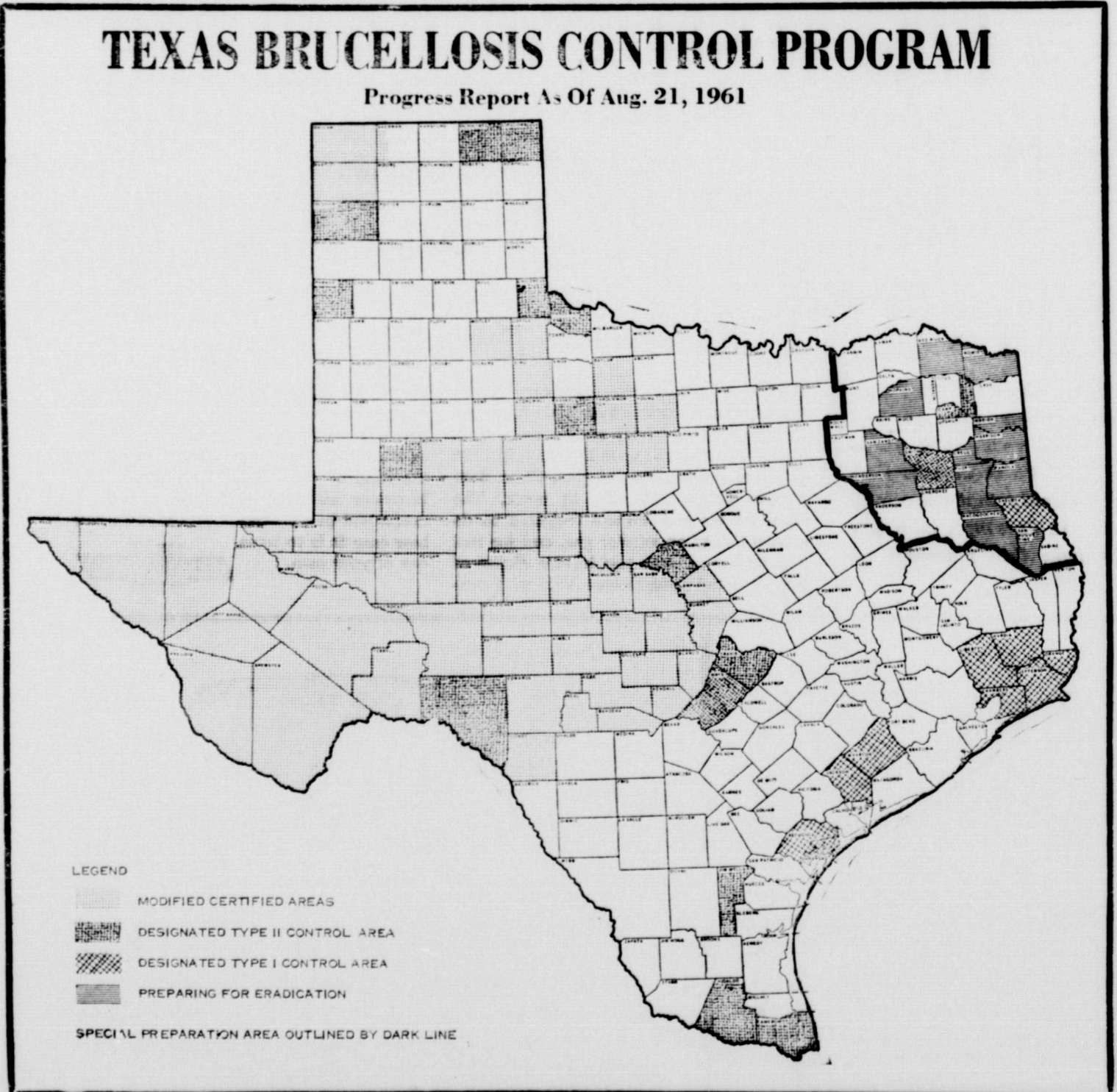

Knox County is now in the process of petitioning to be tested and declared a Type II Brucellosis control area. 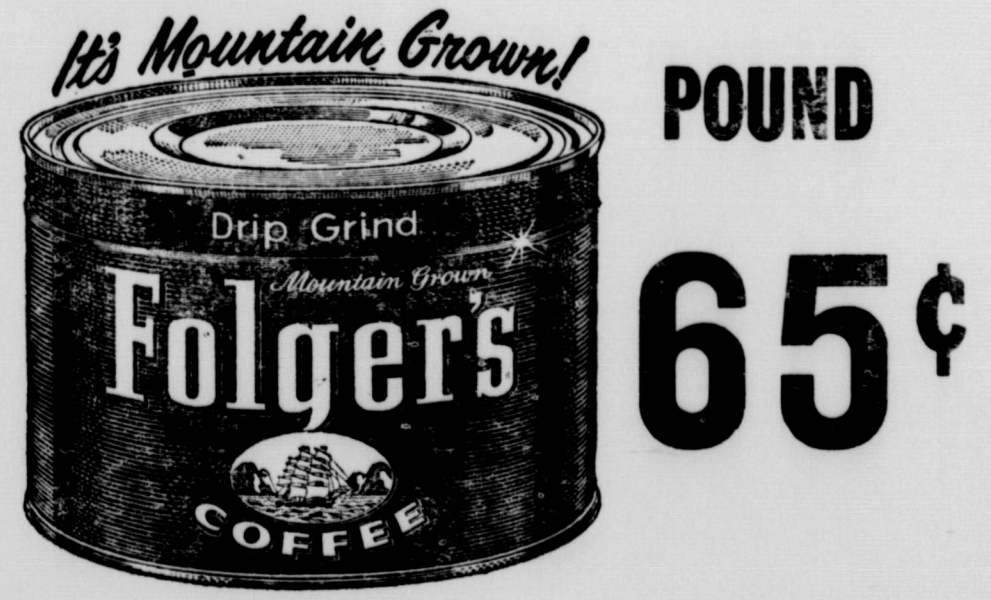

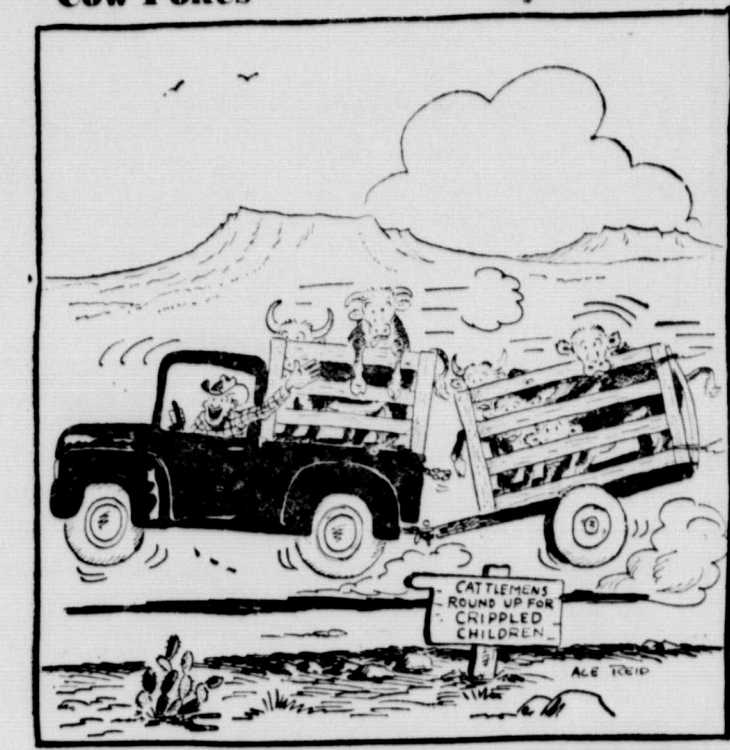
Stock Show to Have Beef Carcass Contest This Year

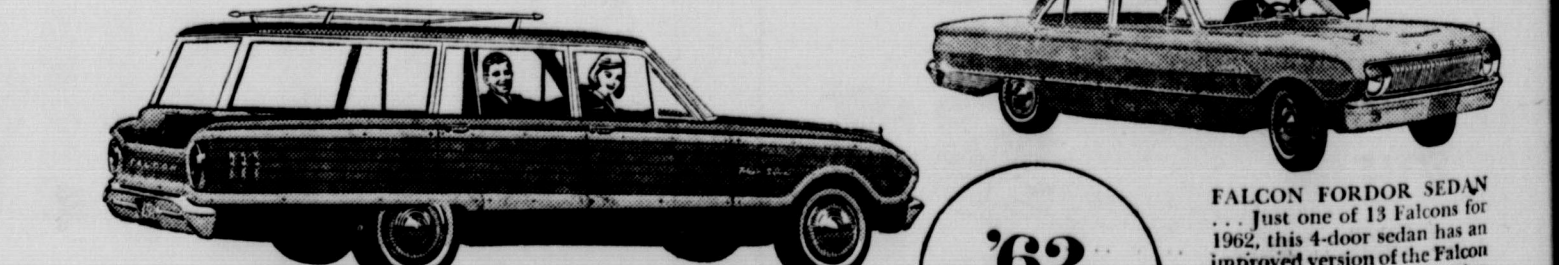
