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



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

Mr. Welch and Mr. Burkett further stated that in view of the action taken by the surrounding counties and the wide-spread action as shown by the above map that the County Livestock Committee plans to hold a county-wide educational meeting the last of October and give farmers and ranchers a chance to make a decision concerning the Brucellosis Program in Foard County.


