> The initial exploration was made the old Lucerne Corporation of Dallas and Dilworth Hager, a veteran Dallas geologist. It was drilled near the north line of section 27-A-SP on C. A. Bowley land. The test had Caddo pay indications and was cased for prolonged, but unsuccessful, compleion attempt.

With this encouragement, Luerne and Hager regrouped with Magnolia Petroleum Company and moved about a half mile north to near the center of section 26 for the second hole. This operation, on Maude E. Rasberry land, was a deepening project covering an old 5,776-foot failure drilled earlier by Ohio Oil Company.



High court upheld a lower court injunction which barred a naturo-path in Midland from doing business. Naturopaths had contested the prohibition on grounds it deprived them of constitutional rights by allowing medical doctors, dentists, chiropractors, etc. to practice, but not naturopaths. Court's ruling pointed out that law permits these other groups to practice only after meeting cer-tain qualifications and obtaining licenses. Naturopaths' licensing law was declared invalid some time ago, and no new one has been pass-




