

Both Dr. and Mrs. Kincaid were natives of Ohio. He was born Dec. 28, 1873, in Mechanicsburg, Ohio, and she was born at Ripley, Ohio, Jan. 26, 1876, both coming to Texas with their parents when quite young. They were married in Denton on June 9, 1904. She was Miss Elizabeth Stephens be-

fore their marriage. The couple came to Crowell in 1908 and both had been members of the First Christian Church during their long residence here.

Dr. Kincaid was a member of Crowell Lodge No. 840, A. F. & A. M., and the Royal Arch Chapter and Council and graveside Masonic services were held at the cemetery.

Dr. Kincaid received a medical degree in Memphis, Tenn., in 1896, did post graduate work in New York Medical School, and did his early medical practice in Trumbull, Texas. After coming to Crowell he practiced medicine here until 1932 when he entered the banking business. He was president of the Crowell State Bank at the time of his death, but had not been active since 1950, when he turned over these duties to his son, Merl. He served in the Texas Legislature for fou years. Since retiring from the Van Bonneau of Dodson, Texbanking business, Dr. Kincaid had been looking after the extensive land and cattle interests owned by him and Mrs. Kincaid.

Farmers Cautioned on Child Labor **During School**

Farm youngsters under 16 years of age are expected to be in school now that school here has begun. Regional Director William J

Rogers of the Department of Labor's Wage-Hour Division in Dallas says the child-labor provisions of the Federal Fair Labor Stand-

ards Act generally prohibits the employment of children under 16 years of age in agriculture, during hours when the local school is in session.

So children under 16 cannot egally be employed for farm work, such as cotton picking, etc., during local school hours if the farm products concerned go into interstate or foreign commerce. Farmers are responsible under the Federal law if they hire underage children to do farm work during school hours. And the law applies equally to local resident children and to migratory children.
