FOOD FOR THE FAMILY

Stuffed Chicken Legs.


Take the legs from the chicken before cooking, remove the bones and stuff the cavity with chicken stuffin Put into a baking dish, add chicker broth to cover; cover the dish and Thicken the stock and serve poured over the legs.

Baked Broiled Chicken. Cut up a fowl as for fricassee. Sift

together one-half cupful of flour, one quarter teaspoonful of salt, and pepper, one-third of a cupful of milk, a dip each piece of chicken into this batter and then into dry bread crumbs Place in a pan with one-third of a cup ful of butter and cook under the gas ame until well-browned on both side Remove to a casserole. To two cup fuls of chicken stock add two cupfuls of water, boiling hot, and two chicken bouillon cubes, adding crumbs to the fat; pour all over the chicken and bake in a slow oven until the chicken is tender.

Grape Sponge.

Put one-half cupful of grape juice one-half tablespoonful of gelatin, a few grains of salt, and sugar to taste, in the top of a double boiler. When the gelatin is dissolved, strain, place in a bowl in a pan of ice water, and when it begins to thicken beat with an egg beater until very light. Add one stiffly beaten egg white, mold and chill. Serve with a thin, boiled custard, or with cream.

Wrens and Catbirds Had Nests Together






