## Three Persons Killed on County's Roads During 1961

At the stroke of twelve midnight, December 31, 1961, "Old Father Time" quietly slipped away. But the resounding echoes and visions of his destruction of grinding metal bodies, crashing glass, torn and broken limbs and smashed lives will live long in our memories. His record in Foard County has been an expensive one.

For the entire year of 1961 in this county there were 21 crashes resulting in three persons killed, 13 injured and an estimated property damage of \$11,777.00. In comparison of the year 1960 there were 26 crashes resulting in no persons killed, 14 injured and an estimated property damage of \$13,732.00.

For the month of December, the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 3 rural traffic accidents in this county, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, Highway Patrol Supervisor for this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$825.00. The veteran Patrol Supervisor cautions all motorists not be guilty of negligence in permitting their windshields and window glasses to be covered with any form of frozen precipitation while driving. This enhances your chances of an accident many times.

The state's February call of 296 compares with a quota of 410 for January. The February call is the state's share of a national call of 8,000 men, all for the Army.

Col. Schwartz also announced that local boards would send 1,760 men for pre-induction physical and mental examinations, compared to 4,000 in January.

## Survey to Be Made in Foard County on Fallout Shelters

The Fort Worth District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, has completed negotiations with the firm of Miedemann and Salmond of Waco for a contract to conduct Phase I of a Fallout Shelter Survey program in Bosque, Hill, Navarro and McLennan Counties, including the City of Waco, Col. R. P. West, District Engineer, announced this week.

The Fort Worth District has also completed negotiations with the firm of Winger and Sharp of Wichita Falls to perform the same work in the following Texas counties: Montague, Clay, Archer, Wichita, Wilbarger, Baylor, Foard and Hardeman.

Col. West said he expected the contracts to be signed within two weeks and the work to be completed within 90 days later.

The work will include location of existing buildings and other facilities which have a potential for use as a public fallout shelter and the tabulation of basic data on these facilities to permit evaluation of their protective characteristics.

Subsequent phases of the program will include marking, with the owner's consent, those facilities which meet structural and space requirements for use as public fallout shelters and the preparation of plans and estimates of costs for improvements, where necessary, of those facilities which do not meet current requirements but have a potential for use as a public shelter.

Data developed by the survey will be provided local civil defense authorities for use in preparation of shelter utilization and civil defense plans.

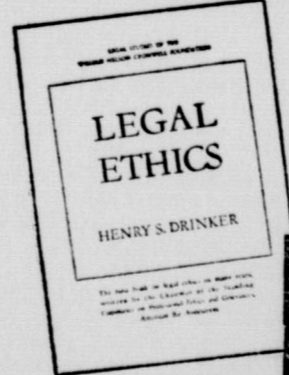

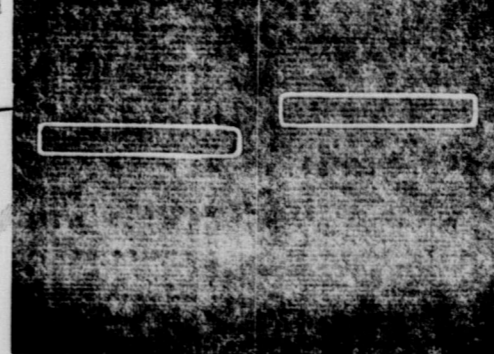

Lawmakers seeking re-election this spring are diligently at work. They want to be home by the filing deadline . . . Feb. 5.

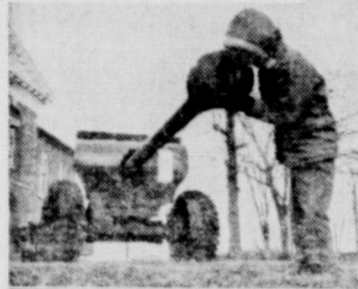
Loans: House of Representatives sent a much-amended loan regulatory bill to the Senate. Bill would set up tight supervision over those who lend in amounts less than \$1,500. Exceptions are banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations and various kinds of cooperative credit groups.

Those exempt from the regulatory law would be limited to 10 per cent interest per year. All loans over \$1,500 would likewise be held to 10 per cent.

House bill allows a 3 per cent per month charge on loans under \$100 . . . 2 1/2 per cent on the part of the loans from \$100 to

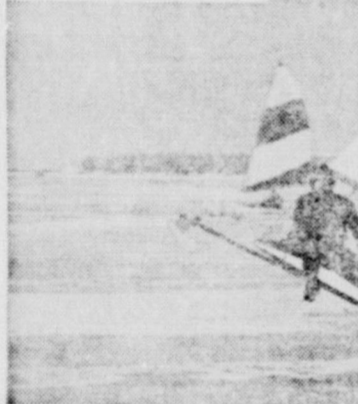

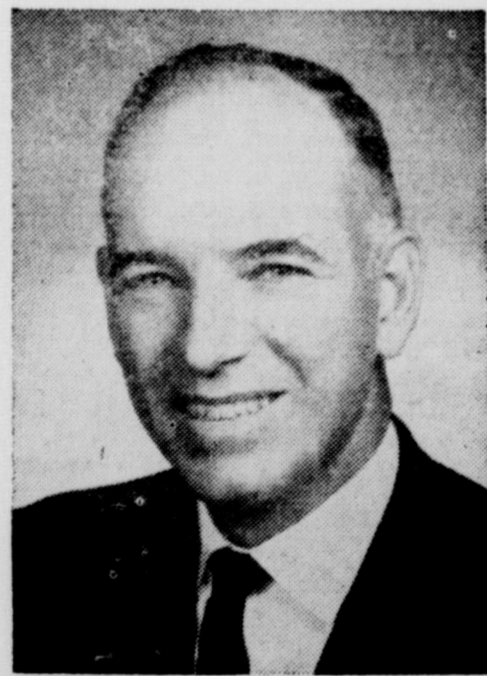

When interest allowed on a loan over \$20 is less than \$4, the lender can charge \$4 in lieu of interest.

Rural Roads: Senate passed the proposal by Sen. Seville Colson of Navasota to cut the spending on farm-to-market road construction-improvement by \$17,500,000 a year. This amount will be used for construction of secondary and primary highways.

A House rural bloc on the Agriculture Committee favored a smaller reduction. They preferred a ten year graduated cut . . . to reach the goal set by Governor Daniel, Texas Farm Bureau, the County Judges and Commissioners Association and the Texas Good Roads Association.

Tourism: Large crowds turned out for the Senate and House committee meeting on these bills: (1) to appropriate \$300,000 for advertising for tourists; (2) for expansion of the juvenile parole system; (3) and for repairs to the San Jacinto Monument.

Opposition came largely from advertising people who felt the Highway Department isn't the proper supervisor of an advertising program.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL'S RACE BEGINS** — Former Secretary of State Tom Reavley of Austin was the first candidate for Attorney General to pay the \$1,000 filing fee at State Democratic Executive Committee headquarters.

This is Reavley's first statewide race. The former Nacogdoches County Attorney was appointed Secretary of State in 1955. He now practices law in Austin.

Wagoner Carr of Lubbock, two-term Speaker of the House of Representatives, already has announced as a candidate.

Although Carr lost the 1960 race to Will Wilson, he polled a half million votes.

The Lubbock lawyer says his platform has one basic plank, "strengthening our legal framework where needed, and more vigorous enforcement of those laws, once enacted."

Les Procter of Austin, who resigned his office as District Attorney, is expected to make a strong bid for the Attorney General's job.

Procter won prominence as prosecuting attorney during the veterans land scandals.

Rep. Tom James of Dallas, the fourth announced candidate for Attorney General, is busy with legislative duties.

**"TOURISTS" READY TO TRAVEL** — Formation of the Texas Tourist Council became official at a luncheon here which honored state representatives. Council urged appropriation of \$300,000 for out-of-state advertising.

Tourist Council elected as its president James Gaines of San Antonio. Vice presidents are Glenn Alexander of Corpus Christi, Everett Fulgham of Lubbock, Ed Leach of Galveston, Charlie Meeker of Dallas, T. P. Newhall of Greenville, John Ben Sheppard of Odessa and John Simpson of Austin. Ed St. John of Austin was elected secretary.

Speaker James A. Turman told the 500 luncheon guests that the old joke "it is easier to pick a tourist than a bale of cotton" is about to go stale. He said Texas must let the rest of the nation know what it has to offer.

**TEXAS CALLED BOOK DESERT**—University of Texas Chancellor Dr. Harry Ransom told members of the Texas Commission on Higher Education that the State of Texas is laboring under the label of "the book desert of the United States."

Dr. Ransom made the statement in support of a plea from Dr. F. L. McDonald, President of Lamar State College of Technology, for a more realistic appropriation recommendation for libraries in Texas' 19 state colleges.

Reappointed to the State Board of Examiners for Teacher Education were: Dr. Glenn Barnett of the University of Texas; Mrs. Kate Bell of Houston Public Schools; Dr. Arvin N. Donner of the University of Houston; Dr. Frank Hubert of Texas A&M; Dr. Herbert LaGrone of Texas Christian University; Dr. Emmett D. Smith of West Texas State College, and Mrs. Florence Vaughn of Tyler Public Schools.

The Board also appointed a 16-member Junior College Study Commission on Budget Procedures and Reporting. This is to comply with a bill for appropriations to public junior colleges passed in the summer session of the 57th Legislature.

### Short Snorts

Assistant Attorney General Bob Eric Shannon of Brownwood has been appointed Chief of the Attorney General's Insurance, Banking and Securities Division.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson won a judgment recovering more than \$423,000 for the State in a suit alleging fraudulent sale of land in Kinney County to the Veterans Land Board.

Agriculture Commissioner John White predicted that the growth of the European "Common Market" will have a major effect on Texas farm economy. He said Texans will export some 25 per cent of their \$800 million cotton crop this year.

Accreditation standards was a much-discussed topic when 1,200 Texas school administrators met here last week.

## Tom Davis of Vernon to Seek Re-Election as District Judge

Tom Davis of Vernon, Judge of the 46th Judicial District, authorized the News to announce his candidacy for re-election Tuesday. Judge Davis issued the following statement:

Recently, the highway through the Valley was named the "Marshall Formby Valley Expressway."

Formby is a former county judge, former state senator, and

a former member and chairman of the Texas Highway Commission. He is a strong advocate of the state farm-to-market road system.

## George Corse Jr. of Graham Enters Race for State Senator

George Corse Jr. of Young County has announced his candidacy for the Texas 23rd Senatorial District for the May 5 primary. Corse will oppose incumbent Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe.

Corse is a businessman in Graham and a former resident of Megargel, Stamford, Bryson and Seymour when he taught school. He is married and has one son. Corse entered the senatorial race as a conservative in politics and opposing excessive government costs and the "something for nothing" philosophy. He opposed the general sales tax and believes many costly overlapping, red tape, paper work jobs could be eliminated.

In 1958, Corse was elected to the office of county superintendent of Young County on the platform of going to Austin and trying to persuade the state legislature to abolish the office.

He continued to carry the fight for abolition of this office until in 1961 both houses enacted the bill to permit the people within each individual county to abolish the post by popular vote.

The World War II veteran of the Air Force entered the race saying, "Knowing what I do about the Austin scene, I feel I can be of real service to my district and state as a state senator."

Three federal judges have clarified and bolstered the right of railroads to offer competitive rates as provided in an amendment made to the Interstate Commerce Act in 1958. They ruled in favor of 24 railroads which sought to upset an Interstate Commerce Commission report that fixed some rates at a level 6 per cent higher than comparable water carrier rates. The opinion said that the Commission's report amounted to an "erroneous interpretation" of the law in question.

### Science Aids Industrial Protection in Depth



Modern technology has adapted many complex devices to serve industry. Here, a safety engineer measures a worker's consumption of energy with apparatus derived from the medical profession.

From trucks to test tubes, from electricity to escalators, engineers and scientists are constantly at war with carelessness and negligence helping to reduce the industrial accidents that cost America more than \$4,000,000,000 each year.

To help prevent this waste of men, money, and machines, safety engineers have assembled a vast arsenal of sophisticated weapons from the many industries which they serve.

Electronics contributes apparatus for analyzing and eliminating harmful industrial noise, detecting flaws in critical structures and studying the hazards of radiation. The chemical industry provides the materials for analyzing industrial gases and dust. Industrial psychologists study men themselves, fitting the right man into the right job. Even motion pictures have been used to create training films and analyze the dangers of machines operating at

speeds faster than the eye can follow. Writer Says Peccary Not Too Dangerous

The javelina or collared peccary is a potent but not necessarily a dangerous game animal for hunters, according to Dan Klepper, outdoors editor of the San Antonio Express-News, writing in the current issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine.

Klepper describes the hunting of the javelinas west of San Antonio with dogs and 22 rifles and pistols.

"The stories about javelinas 'treeing' hunters usually are nothing but exaggerations of the truth or incidents involving hunters thoroughly unfamiliar with the animals," Klepper says. "In most instances when these near-sighted pigs burst from cover in all directions, two or three invariably realize the hunter, who doesn't realize that this is a natural occurrence."

Klepper also thinks that after the hunter has retold the story a few times it has been embellished quite a bit to make the javelina look much more dangerous than it really is.

Although the season is closed on javelina in many counties now, there are still some areas in the state where shooting the javelinas is permitted.

Balance the Budget!

Resolution for the New Year: Balance the federal budget. Reason:

The first child born in 1962 owed \$1,603. So will every other child born during the year. That figure is the per capita share of the public debt. Let's not make it bigger.

Wall Panel Is Developed for Farm Buildings

An experimental wall panel, made of a 2-inch layer of plastic sandwiched between half-inch layers of reinforced portland cement, has been developed by the USDA for use in constructing farm buildings.

These panels are light enough to be handled by two or three men and are cast with holes for bolting to wooden posts set 8 feet apart. No special tools or equipment are needed to erect a one-story building with the panels, the USDA says.

According to USDA scientists, an experimental panel building constructed at Belleville, Md., near two years ago has shown no signs of weathering. They estimate the panels will last more than 20 years.

Cost estimates indicate the panels are more expensive than concrete blocks for buildings of equal size. Total building costs would be comparable, however, because a panel building can be erected about four times faster than a block building.

The panels are suitable for milking parlors, chicken houses, barns and other enclosed livestock buildings where insulation is necessary. Tests simulating an animal falling or being pushed against the panels proved that the panels can withstand heavy or repeated blows by livestock.

Buildings constructed with these panels would be easy to clean and disinfect because the inside of the building is free of studs and the interior surface is extremely smooth. Joints are sealed with a caulking compound. The finished panels are light gray in color, but they may be painted.

Needed: Adult Education

One of the most revealing analyses of Britain's National Health Service—which is her system of socialized medicine—has been made by Professor John Jewkes, who occupies the Chair of Economics Organization at Oxford, and his wife.

Early in this work they write: "It seems easier to fall into gross error, to perpetrate elementary howlers, on the subject of medicine and health than on any other. At the inception of the National Health Service it was widely believed in Britain that if only sufficient money were spent on medical services, then sickness would be swept away and the need for medical expenditure would ultimately disappear; although the obvious truth is that every medical success in prolonging life tends to increase the amount of sickness there will be in the community. There are writers who quote scarily figures of the total cost of sickness as proof that more should be spent on medical services although to spend more on these must automatically increase the total cost of sickness. There are authorities who plead the case for new, special medical services for older people by quoting statistics of how much more frequently they go to the doctor."

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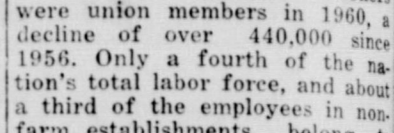
Continued Decline in Union Membership

From National Review: "A Labor Department statistical survey shows a continuing decline in union membership in the United States since 1956, the peak year of union enrollment; 17,049,000 workers were union members in 1960, a decline of over 440,000 since 1956. Only a fourth of the nation's total labor force, and about a third of the employees in non-farm establishments, belong to unions, and the percentage of union members in each of these categories has been declining. In 1956, 24.8 per cent of the total (farm and non-farm) labor force was unionized; in 1960, it dropped down to 23.3 per cent. . . In 1960 moreover, ten unions accounted for almost half the total union membership."
