Army National Speaker To Appear at Baird Lion's Meeting

BAIRD — Capt. Jack E. Mooney, who wears four military awards for valor and who was twice wounded while serving in the Vietnam jungle last year, will speak at 6 p. m. Wednesday, July 16, at the Baird Lions Club.

Captain Mooney is now a member of the Army National Speakers Program, an extension of the Army Speakers Program which has provided Army speakers on request for public platform for several years. The program provides audiences with an opportunity to hear the first hand experiences and observations of recent Vietnam returnees.

He was with the 9th Inf. Div., stationed in the jungle area near Bearcat, south of Long Binh, and the rice paddies near Bion Phuoc in the Delta. As a scout platoon leader for the 2d Battalion (Mechanized), 47th Infantry, he spent much of his tour in Vietnam looking for or in direct confrontation with the Viet Cong.

Captain Mooney earned the nation's third highest combat award, the Silver Star, two

awards of the Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for valor, the Air Medal, the Army Commendation Medal with "V" device, and two Purple Hearts, during his tour in Southeast Asia.

Captain Mooney is a member of Sigma Delta Chi professional journalism fraternity, a past member of the Kiwanis Club and Jaycees of Temple. Before entering the Army he was a newsmen for the Temple Daily Telegram.

SWEDISH YOUTH IMPRESSED WITH 'FRIENDLINESS' HERE

BAIRD — How does it feel to move 2,000 miles closer to the equator just about the time summer arrives? "Hot - but it has also been wonderful," says Erik Larsen, 16 year old exchange student from Malung, Sweden, who has been visiting in Baird for the past month in the homes of the Dick Vestals, James Paul Shanks and Fred Gobles.

Erik, who came to Texas June 15 with a group of students sponsored by the Lions Club Youth Exchange Program, says he has found our country very similar to Sweden in regard to living standards, agriculture, cultural interests, etc., despite the differences in climate. In Malung, Erik tells us, the temperature for this time of year would be about 70, sometimes 80 degrees, dropping to 68 to 80 degrees below in winter.

Some differences he noticed were in sports, religion, education and economy. Baseball games and rodeos were new to Erik. Of the two events he said "I didn't understand the baseball game much," and "rodeos are fun to watch but I wouldn't want to be in one."

He seemed surprised that we have so many church denominations here since in Sweden almost everyone attends the same church - Lutheran.

Erik also noticed that Cokes, cars and gas are cheaper here, comparing our 10c Cokes to 15c in Sweden and about 76c a gallon of 'petrol' there. Another difference is the fact that we have mostly 'big American' cars here and they have about an equal amount of cars from all countries, including American models.

Schooling there begins at age seven and can be completed in nine years. Erik plans to enter three years of study, which would be equivalent to our Junior College, after completing his studies, comparing to our high school. Only about three hours a week are devoted to sports - mostly gymnastics. They also may play soccer, basketball, badminton or handball, but do

not compete with other schools as teams, as much as our schools do. Erik's favorite sport is slalom skiing on the snow-covered mountain slopes about five minutes drive from his home.

Erik also told us that about 80 percent of the boys in Sweden wear their hair considerably longer than the youth in our area, but found his hair style, popular at home for five years, to be fairly well accepted in our predominantly close-cropped community.

Of special interest to Erik was a trip to Mexico with the Shanks, where he was amazed that the difference between the United States and Mexico was so immediately visible on crossing the border. It was the first time he had seen people living so differently so close together. Another 'first' for Erik was Mexican food, Okra, eaten here, was also new to him.

After a trip this week to the Big Bend area and Carlsbad, N. M. with the Gobie family, he will return to Dallas Sunday to join a group of students for a trip by bus to New York. From there he will return July 20 to his home in Malung, where his father does administration work in three hospitals and his mother is a district nurse.

A truly affable and interesting young person himself, Erik describes his visit here as wonderful experience for him "because the people in Baird are all so friendly," giving him an opportunity to learn so much by comparing different countries, as well as a chance to really practice our language. He would love to stay longer but if given the chance to return to Baird, says he would not bring three sweaters next time.

FCC APPROVES CABLE SERVICE

ANNUAL JUNIOR RODEO SET FOR JULY 30, 31 - AUGUST 1, 2

BAIRD — A total of \$1,800 in prizes will be awarded to young cowboys and cowgirls at the 1969 Annual Baird Junior Rodeo, scheduled to open July 20 at the Sheriff's Posse Arena in Baird.

Co-sponsored by the Baird FFA Chapter and Callahan Co. Sheriff's Posse, the sixth annual Junior show will open its first four-night run Thursday, July 30, and continue through Saturday, August 2. Also, for the first time, the street parade will be on Saturday, instead of on opening day of the show. Parade time will be 5 p. m. on August 2nd. Performances will begin each night at 8 p. m.

Howard Heath of Grosvenor will again produce the show, which drew entries from 185 boys and girls from Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona last year.

Saddles will be awarded to the best all-around cowboy and cowgirl of the show. First place winners in each event will receive buckles, spurs and blankets will be awarded to 2nd and 3rd place winners.

There will be eight different events for boys and five events for girls, with three age divisions in each event. Age groups are 12 years and under, 13 - 15 years of age, and 16 - 19 years. Entry fee will be \$5.00 for each

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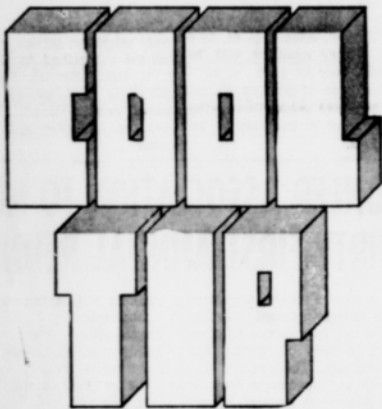
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It seems that our hot weather is here to stay, and no rain is in sight.

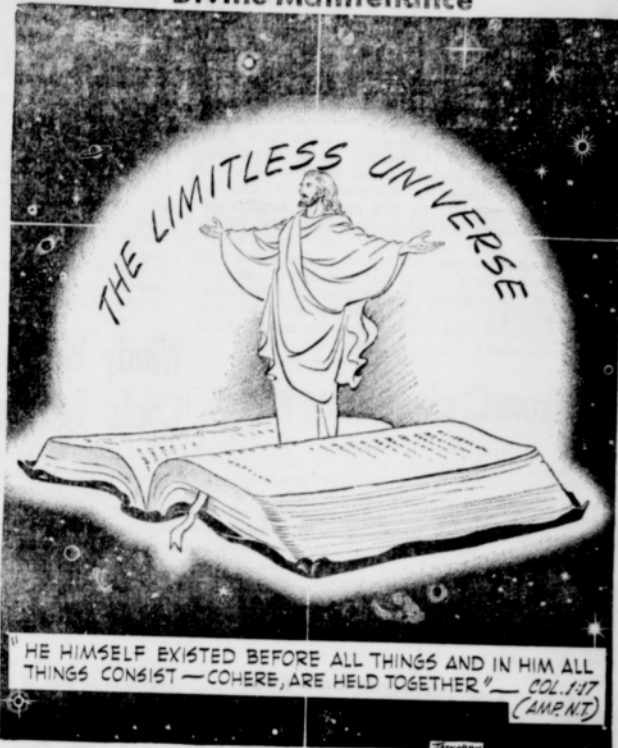

CTO TO HIRE FIVE TO WORK WITH FOOD, MEDICAL PROGRAM

Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., serving Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch and Rnuels Counties, has been approved for a \$40,000 temporary Emergency Food and Medical Services Program, funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

After consulting with some of the public officials in the six county area, it was found that there are those who do not have sufficient food from time to time. Several factors contribute to this condition. Over twenty percent of the population is 65 years of age, or older. The majority of these people are living on fixed incomes, such as Old Age Assistance or Social Security. With spiraling cost of living, it is increasingly difficult for these people to buy the barest necessities, especially if an emergency occurs in the family.

Another group which is in serious difficulty at this time are those who are drawing Aid to Dependent Children As of May 1, the allowance for a dependent child was reduced from \$25.00 to \$12.50 per month. The mothers of these children can not afford day care services to allow them to take outside work, and some of them are not physically or educationally qualified for work. As a result of this drastic reduction in aid to dependent children, malnutrition will often result.

In our counties, we have many seasonal workers who go to harvest fields during the summer. During summer months they must make enough money to see them through the winter when they are unable to find work. An unexpected illness in this type of family can cause extreme financial problems and lack of money to buy food.

Some of the most desperate needs arise when the head of the household loses a job, suffers an injury or becomes ill, has no savings to fall back on, and may be without income for varying lengths of time. Also, when a family breaks up, many times the wife and children are left in financial straits.

The Emergency Food and Medical Services Program is designed for the extremely needy, and to assure that people in

our midst are not being deprived of adequate food to protect their health.

Under this program, an Outreach Supervisor and four Outreach Workers will be hired. The Outreach Supervisor must be a person with sufficient education and experience to direct activities of the program. The four Outreach Workers will be hired from the poverty or low-income group. Their duties will be to contact the impoverished, counsel with them concerning their nutritional needs, ascertain that the person is eligible for help, and to issue vouchers for food.
