It was contended that the injunction was wrong because it applied to tickets thereafter issued and those to points without the State, an interference with interatate commerce. The Supreme Court says all of these objections present no justification or excuse for violating an injunction. The court says that tickets issued in the future, under limitations, can be protected."




