



### J. W. Beverly Explains Texas Pension Matter

J. W. Beverly, who for a long period has shown much interest in Confederate veterans and the problems confronting them, has furnished The News with the following explan-ation in regard to Texas pensions:

Most of those who have been getting Confederate pensions in Texas are disappointed this month by not receiving the usual check. A few lines by way of explanation will show why this condition, exists. why this condition exists.

The money for this fund is collec-

ted by a seven cent tax on each one hundred dollars of taxable property in the state. Originally it was paid only to soldiers of the Confederate army who were residents of the state at a certain date after the war was over. Since that time allowances have been made to men who became citizens of the state at later dates. Also by acts of the legislature, more liberal payments have been paid to widows of the soldiers.

Some of these widows were born after the war closed. By reason of taking in so many, most of whom are women, the money for the current year is gone.

State treasurer, Charlie Lockhart, says that the deficit on June 30 is \$855,000 and only about one third of the June pensions have been paid. It is estimated that to pay all pen-N-1. sion demands will require a fund of about \$3,500,000.

The seven cent tax, if all paid each year, would be about \$2,575,-000. By this it appears that the deficit is caused mainly by paying pen-sions to so many of the younger women. Mr. Lockhart says the new law waives the necessity of an af-


