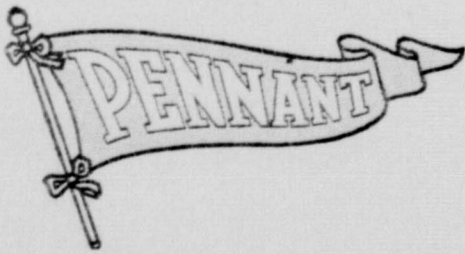

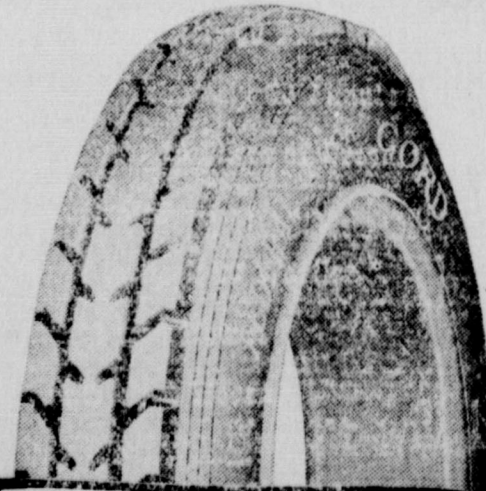

McFarlane Discusses Record of Opponent

In the discussion, at the Kutch Manning Reunion last Saturday at Newcastle, the 23rd Senatorial District had the first joint discussion between Mr. McFarlane and Mr. Parnell, the candidates for this office. Both candidates have served four years in the legislature. Mr. Parnell, in his announcement says: "I am willing to stand on my record in the 39th Legislature" and added, "I will permit no mud-slinging in my campaign." Mr. McFarlane accepted the challenge of both propositions and in his address made the following comparisons from their records in the 39th Legislature: He charged that Mr. Parnell was the joint author of the "three pass bill," and voted for it, and that, he, McFarlane, worked and voted against it. Mr. Parnell admitted he voted for it. He charged that Mr. Parnell supported S. B. 180 the corporation bill that permits foreign corporations, that have no permit to do business in the state, to buy and own stock in any Texas corporation who has such permit and to vote such stock so owned, and participate in the management and control of such domestic corporation, thereby permitting such foreign corporation to have all the rights and privileges of a domestic corporation without paying the fees to the state, or submitting themselves to the laws of the state, and that he voted against it.

Mr. Parnell admitted that he voted for said bill and justified his course by saying, "that Mr. McFarlane was a demagogue in opposing it."

Mr. McFarlane charged that the four states that join Texas have a gasoline tax that averages three cents per gallon, that the Texas tax is one cent. That in the 39th Legislature a bill was introduced in the House and passed, that he supported it and Mr. Parnell's committee in the Senate smothered it and prevented its passage, to raise this tax to 2 1-2 cents and at the same time to correspondingly lower the license tax on the automobiles and trucks and leave the automobile and truck tax in the county paying it. Mr. Parnell stated that he was opposed to raising the gasoline tax, and lowering the automobile and truck tax.

Mr. McFarlane stated that he supported the bill passed by the House that would have given the schools \$15.00 per capita and that Mr. Parnell voted against it in the Senate and that the bill was killed in the Senate. Mr. Parnell made no reply to this charge.

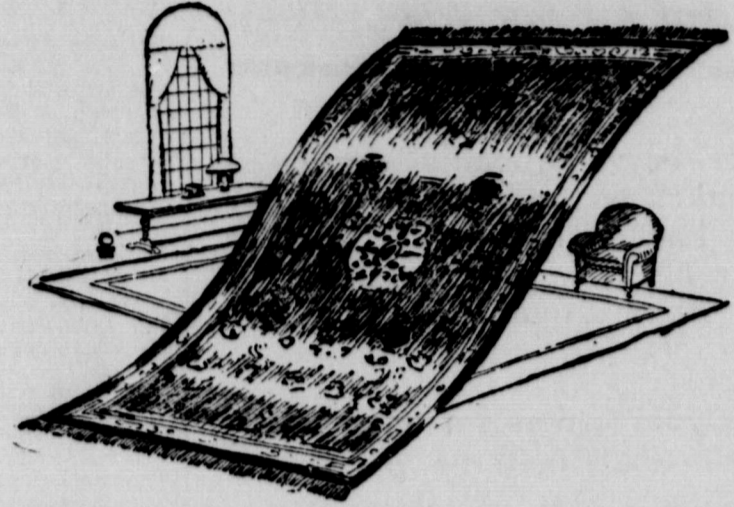
Mr. McFarlane said that the appropriation bills introduced into the House totaled over \$53,000,000, that the bills passed totaled a little over \$37,000,000. That by amendment the appropriations were increased, without exception in the Senate, that they increased one item over \$2,000,000. That these increases were defeated in the House and that he, McFarlane, belonged to the "hatchet brigade" that fought for lower appropriations in everything except for rural schools. Mr. Parnell made no reply to this.—Graham Leader.

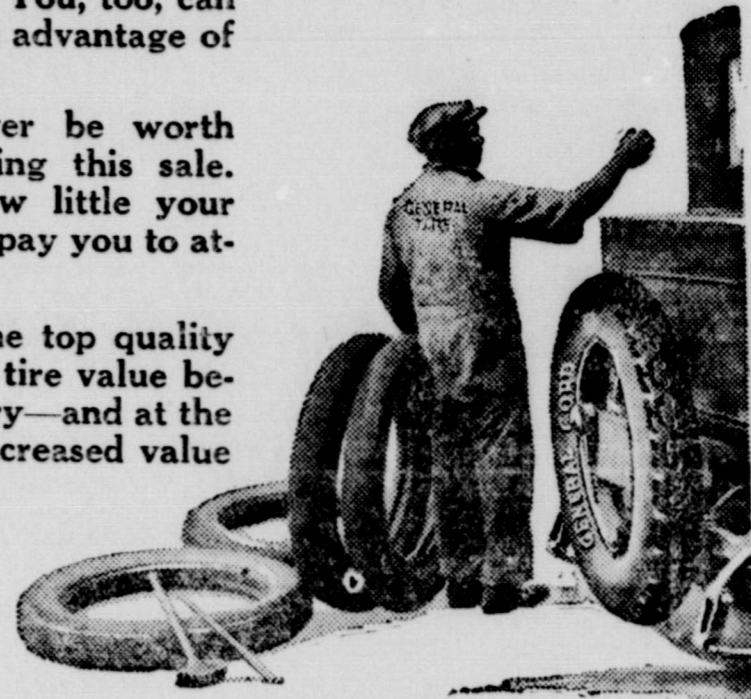

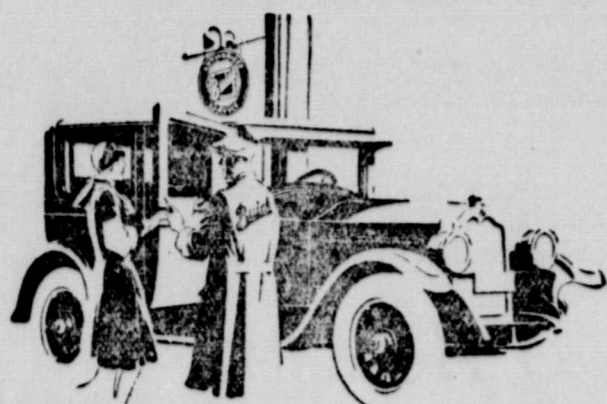

Doings in West Texas

(By West Texas C. of C.)

Miami—The White Lumber Company of Miami has shipped out four cars of sand to White Deer for use in the construction of the several large buildings now being constructed there. The company has also been sending truck loads of lumber to Pampa.

Plainview—A group of fifty students of Texas Technological College at Lubbock including an orchestra and male quartette entertained Plainview High School students with a short program. The Tech students are touring this part of the country.

San Saba—The membership committee of the local chamber of commerce reported excellent results during the past week, having secured a 15 per cent increase of new members to the organization. Many activities are being planned for San Saba by the chamber of commerce.

Leuders—The Leuders Baptist Encampment expect to spend between \$3000 and \$4000 on its grounds on the Clear Fork of the Brazos before the encampment opens in July. Cottages for speakers, teaching pavilions and a bridge across the Clear Fork are some of the planned improvements. The encampment will be held July 13 to 22 inclusive.

Harlingen—Among the entertainment features announced for the state firemen's convention to be held here June 8 to 11, are an old fashioned barbecue and automobile trips through the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas. \$7000 necessary for the entertainment of these firemen has been raised.

Hereford—Building in Hereford is now on the upward trend. The Kemp Lumber Company has under construction a new lumber yard, also work is moving rapidly on the erection of the office building for the company.

Amarillo—W. W. Flenniken has been named general chairman of the committee in charge of the staging of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in Amarillo, June 21-22-23. The housing committee is busy preparing to care for 50,000 visitors. Large sums of money are being collected for the entertainment of the convention crowd.

Merkel—All material and supplies necessary to erect a derrick and begin drilling an oil test have been placed near Merkel by the Phillips Petroleum Company. More than 5,000 acres of land have been leased by this company.

Midland—According to R. W. Baker, district road engineer, the new state highway from Midland to Sterling City via Garden City will be officially designated the first of July and maintenance will begin immediately.

Plainview—The Plainview band is working hard and giving concerts to get in shape for the 8th Annual Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Amarillo, June 21-22-23.

Comanche—The contract for the sedimentation plant for the Comanche water system was let by the city council recently. The building of the sedimentation plant is the last unit of the work to be done to get the water from the reservoir ready for use by the city.

Slaton—A house numbering and street marking plan worked out by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, is being carried forward to a rapid conclusion. The street markers will be erected at every main corner in the city.

WATCH THE PENNIES GROW

Every little child receives many pennies and nickels and dimes from its parents, and its brothers and sisters, and its uncles and aunts and cousins.

Let it spend a portion of its pennies—say one-half of what it gets in its youthful days—but in that expenditure teach it to select something of practical value, even though the cost be but a few cents.

Then teach the child to save the other half and watch the pennies grow. Encourage it to keep track of the increase and keep persistently on this course until the child instinctively places half of all it receives in the savings bank.

When your child learns these simple lessons of thrift, you need have no fear of the wolf crossing its threshold in later years.

BOYS' AND GIRLS' CLUB WORK

There is a reason why rural as well as town and city business men should support club work among boys and girls, who will be the men and women in a very short time.

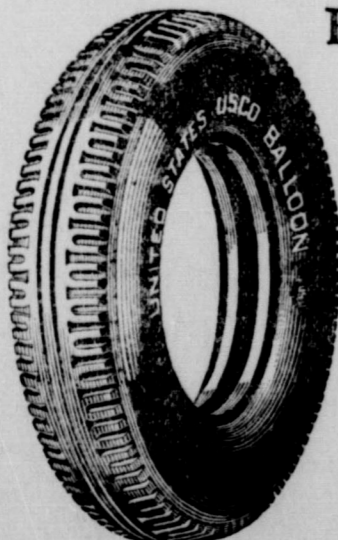
